Graveside Rites For Manley Baby

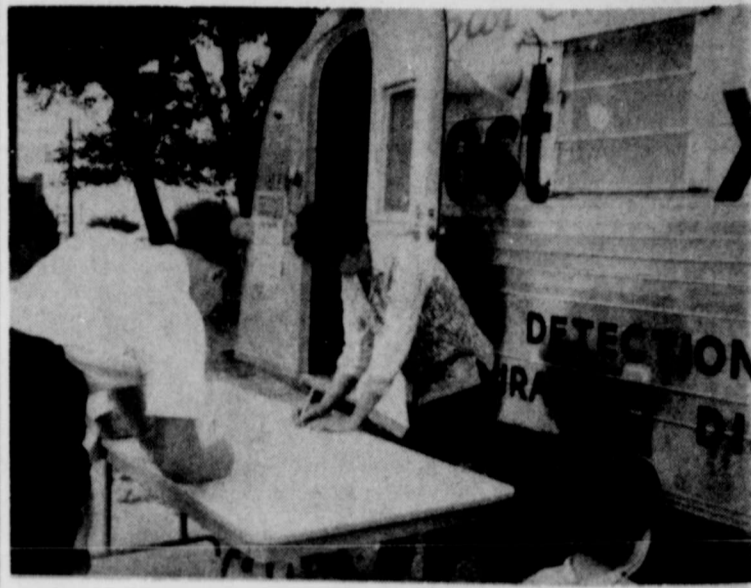

Registration Dates Given For Students Of N. D. H. S.

New Deal School will open for regular classes on August 29, at 8:30 a.m. School buses will run regular schedule and school will be dismissed at 3:45 p.m.

The senior class will register on Monday, Aug. 22, from 8:00 a.m. until noon. Junior class will register from 1:00 until 5:00 p.m. on the same day. Sophomore class will register all day Tuesday, Aug. 23. The Freshman class will register all day Wednesday, Aug. 24.

All teachers will meet in the school on August 25 and 26 for in-service training.

The School Board set the price of school cafeteria lunches for the 1966-67 school year at 35¢ for elementary students and 40¢ for high school students. Elementary lunch tickets good for 20 meals will sell for seven dollars. High School lunch tickets good for 20 meals will sell for eight dollars. Medicare Information

By July 1, 1966, 823,000 Texas people 65 or older had signed up for the voluntary doctor bill insurance part of medicare, Mance King, officer in charge of social security in Plainview, announced today. This represents 92 percent of Texas' 896,000 of residents of medicare age, he said.

As of the same date, out of a national total of 19.1 million persons 65 or older, 17.3 million, or 91 percent, had signed up for the medical insurance protection to help pay their doctor bills and other medical services. This part of medicare is financed by a \$3 monthly premium paid by the beneficiary with the Government paying a matching amount out of Federal general revenues.

King explained that most people have the premiums deducted from their monthly social security, railroad retirement, or civil service retirement cash benefits. Others who have enrolled for the supplementary medical insurance protection, but who are not receiving cash benefits, pay the premiums quarterly by check or money order to the Social Security Administration or the Railroad Retirement Board.

However, elderly people who may not be able to pay the \$9 quarterly payment at the time they receive the quarterly premium notice may pay \$3 or \$6 and send in the remaining amount later, King said. But they should make sure that payments are made in time to keep this protection in force.

King advised all Hale and Floyd County residents signed up for the medical insurance part of medicare who have questions about how premiums are paid, to get in touch with the social security office at 1401-B West 5th Street, Plainview, without delay. The phone number is CA3-4371.

If I can ever assist you as your United States Senator, please do not hesitate to call upon me.

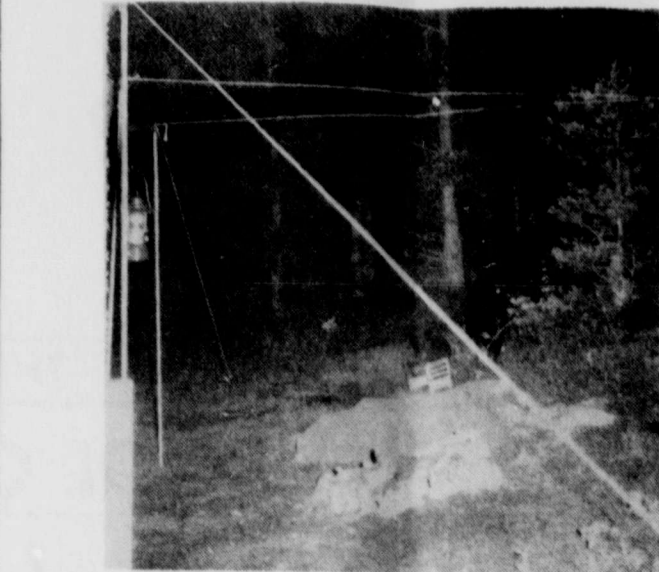

No Wheat Diversion In '67

Wheat farmers were reminded today that no diversion program will be in effect for the 1967 wheat crop. Wheat program participants will be able to qualify for domestic marketing certificates and price-support loans.

E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Hale Committee, said that it is particularly important for farmers with small wheat allotments to remember that diversion payments are no longer available. Many of these farmers have been diverting all or a part of their wheat-allotment acres for payment in recent years; however, no income can be derived from the wheat program in 1967 unless the crop is planted.

Mr. Pope pointed out that wheat growers participating in the 1967 wheat program will again be guaranteed full parity on the part of their wheat crop which is allocated for domestic food use. For each participating farm, this will be the projected production on 40 percent of the wheat allotment.

The domestic marketing certificates, available on this "domestic" wheat, will be valued at the difference between full parity as of July 1, 1967, and the \$1.25 loan value announced for the 1967 crop. (The certificate value for the 1966 crop is \$1.32 per bushel.) The regular price-support loan will be available on all the wheat produced on a participating farm (except extra wheat produced under the "excess wheat" option).

The increased national wheat allotment acreage for the 1967 crop is expected to increase wheat producer income by from \$75 million to \$100 million (because of increased marketings) in 1967. Complete details of the 1967 wheat program have not yet been determined or announced, but eligibility to participate in the program undoubtedly will include filing an application indicating performance intentions under the program. The sign-up for the 1966 wheat program was held in the early months of 1966.

Freeman To Speak At Field Day

HALFWAY, Texas -- Frank Moore, President of the High Plains Research Foundation, has announced the acceptance of Secretary of Agriculture, Orville Freeman, as guest speaker at the Foundation's Tenth Annual Field Day. Moore revealed that he had been contacted by Congressman George Mahon, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, of Freeman's acceptance.

The Field Day, to be held on Thursday, September 8, 1966, is expected to be the largest in the history of the High Plains Research Foundation. Last year, a stand-out crowd of over 6,500 attended. Officials at the Foundation are expecting an even larger turnout this year.

Tours of the Research Farm will begin at 1:00 p.m. and will continue throughout the afternoon until approximately 4:30 p.m. Secretary of Agriculture Freeman's address will be delivered at 5:00 p.m. following an introduction by Congressman Mahon.

Moore states that this year, in case of inclement weather, provisions have been made to hold the evening program in the Plainview High School Auditorium and Cafeteria. The High Plains Research Foundation is located fifteen (15) miles West of Plainview, Texas on Highway 70 in the community of Halfway.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President, and on all state-wide offices, questions or propositions by persons qualified to vote in this State except for meeting county or district residence requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to read:

"Section 2a. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time of such registration, permitting any person who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements within a county or district, as set forth in Section 2 of this Article, to vote for (1) electors for President and Vice President of the United States and (2) all offices, questions

or propositions to be voted on by all electors throughout this State.

"(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting any person (1) who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements of Section 2 of this Article, and (2) who shall have resided anywhere within this State at least thirty (30) days next preceding a General Election in a presidential election year, and (3) who shall have been a qualified elector in another state immediately prior to his removal to this State or would have been eligible to vote in such other state had he remained there until such election, to vote for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in that election.

"(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting absentee voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in this State by former residents of this State (1) who have removed to another state, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residence requirements, for voting for electors for President and Vice President in this State at the time of the election, but the privileges of suffrage so granted shall be only for

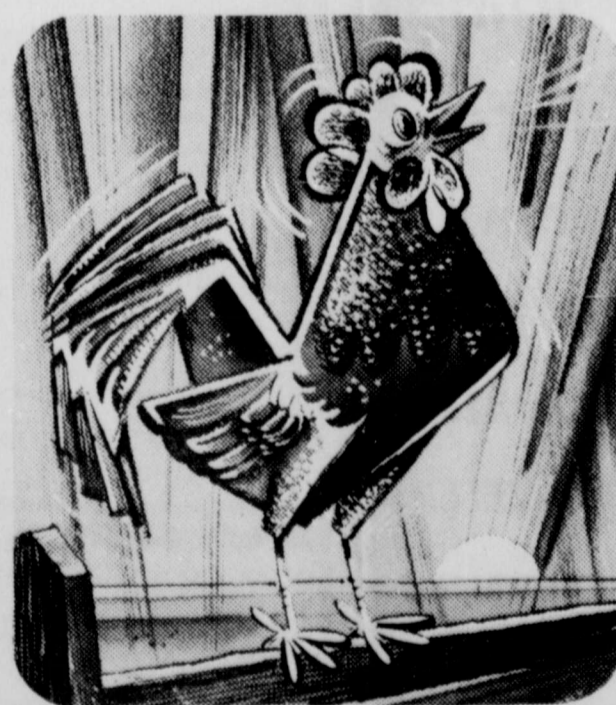
such period of time as would permit a former resident of this State to meet the residence requirements for voting in his new state of residence, and in no case for more than twenty-four (24) months."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

July Report On Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 23 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of July, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in sixteen persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$17,830.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1966 shows a total of 136 accidents resulting in 6 persons killed, 80 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$124,500.00.

The Sergeant reminds all motorists of the State Law regulating traffic in regard to school buses. "The drivers of a vehicle upon a highway outside the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

Livestock Eat Less in Summer - Ever wonder why cattle lose weight or make low gains during the summer months? The common answer is that summer pastures are not as high in quality as in the spring. This may be true but Marvin Riewa of Texas A&M's Gulf Coast Pasture-Beef Research Station, says a good part of the blame is simply that ruminants (cattle, sheep and goats) eat less during hot weather. His research shows that as temperatures climb, intake of ruminants declines. For example, animals eat about 19 percent more ryegrass at 60 degrees F. than they eat when the temperature is 90 degrees F.

The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment.

Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election."

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified."

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned."

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law."

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Ap-

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court."

Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:
