### Armed Forces Quotas Given

Texas Local Board No. 45, Plainview, has been called upon to furnish 36 men for the armed forces in September; and 56 men in October. The quota for August was 50. The pre-induction examination calls were for 80 men to be examined in August and 40 for September. The pre-induction quota for October will not be received until about Sept. 10. With these high calls, it has been necessary to call married men to fill the calls, according to the local board.

Voting will be by mail, the chairman explained, and ballots have been sent to each known eligible voter. In case eligible voters fail to receive a ballot through the mail, one may be obtained by calling at the Hale County ASCS Office. Generally, a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper is eligible to vote if he is eligible to take part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASCS committees. Eligibility to vote or to hold office as a committee member is not restricted by reason of race, color, creed, or national origin.

Envelopes containing marked ballots may be mailed or returned to the ASCS County Office, anytime before 5 p.m., September 7. Ballots will be tabulated publicly by the county committee at 9:30 a.m., Friday, September 9 at the Hale County ASCS Office, Plainview, Texas. The public is invited to witness the vote counting.

### Wheat Program Information

Wheat growers who participate in the 1967 Wheat Program will be eligible for domestic marketing certificates for about the same amount of wheat as in 1966 but the percentage of allotted acres is less because of the increased allotment according to E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman of the Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said today. The percentage is 35 compared with 45 in 1966.

The expected domestic food use for 1967 is 520 million bushels. Pope explained that the law requires domestic certificates to be issued for no more than the expected domestic food use. The 520 million bushels is 35 percent of the projected production of the 68.2 million acre national allotment.

In the 1966 program, the 45 percent of the farm project yield for which program cooperators earned certificates was estimated to equal 500 million bushels. Thus, cooperators in the 1967 program will be eligible for certificates on 20 million more bushels, Pope said.

Domestic certificates, which are issued to help maintain farm income, will be valued in the 1967 program at the difference between the national average loan rate of \$1.25 and parity next July 1. The certificates are valued at \$1.32 in the 1966 program.

Details of the 1967 Wheat Program may be obtained at the Hale County ASCS Office.

A starting line averaging only 132 pounds per man plus making their initial appearance in Class A grid circles could add up to a long, dry season for the New Deal Lions.

Coach Sam Mayo had 17 lettermen and 36 squad members to quit when the Lions jumped from 3-B to 4-A after the 1965 football season. The entire interior line from a team that won seven of 10 last fall while finishing third in their district was lost. Another letterman, Charles Hamilton, moved to Friona.

At the present time only 20 boys are out for football at New Deal. Four of the nine returning lettermen started at one time or another last year. Tommy Haggard is the lone defensive starter back while Gary Justice, Gabe Holdner and two-time All-District performer Dwaine Agnew are the offensive returners. Both Justice and Agnew are three-year lettermen.

Mayo feels the Lions' passing game will be their weakness while the running game and depth in backs and ends will be to their advantage.

Justice and Holdner have the end spots wrapped up at this time. Jimmy Attebury and Al Griffith are challenging Roy Ballinger and David Nuss for the tackle positions.

Felix Tovar, Haggard and Drew Poe are in a three-way battle for the guard assignments. Letterman Ronnie Agnew is slated to start at center.

Dwaine Agnew and Gary Hamilton are the top halfback candidates with L. J. Bradley close behind. Robert Morris is in a two-way fight with Jerry Cooley for the fullback slot. Joey Sherman and Wayne Price, both non-lettermen, are the top quarterback choices.

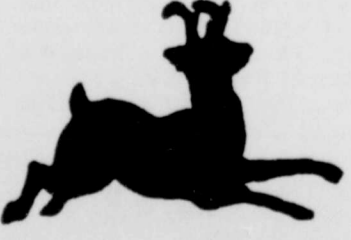
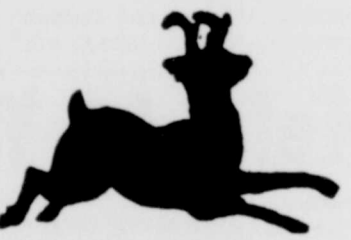
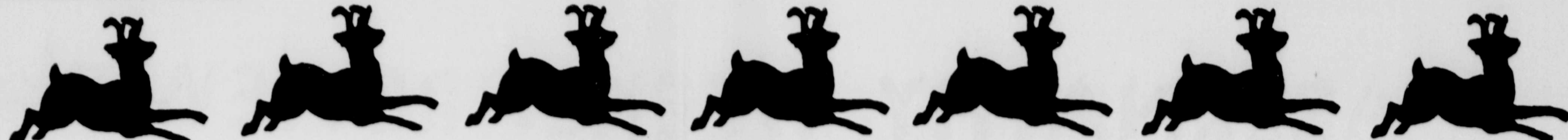
