CHANGE IN SCHOOL DISTRICT.

Another Election Made Necessary Be-fore Issuance of Bonds.

Many of them have heard but little of the Bible, out in their hearts they are reverent Their profound reverence for woman hood is a distinct mark of the cow boy's character. Everyone of them feels that he is on his most sacred honor to protect every woman and hence there is no place where women

are safer than in these widely scat-"Their love for each other and their boundless hospitality are com-mendable. 

The situation was referred to the Bureau of Animal In-dustry at Washington and an investigation requested. The bureau delgated the work of investigation Inspector Imes, whose station is at Roswell N. M. That gentleman has Roswell N. M. That gentleman has just finishen his work and finds that two districts are infected, one in and around Hale county, and the other in the vicinity of Hansford. His diagnosis of the trouble is that it is mycotic apthous fever, which, in plain English, is noninfectious foot and mouth disease.

While the disease is alleged to be noninfectious, the inspector found in some instances that whole herds noninfectious, the inspector found in some instances that whole herds were affected with it, but none of the animals have died. It is stated that the mannor in which the dis-ease is acquired is through the catcase is acquired is through the cat-ing of forage that is infected with the poison, and it is not capable of being transmitted from one animal to another through the medium of microbe or bacillus. The Washing ton authorities have agreed that the discussion of the discase is diagnosis of the disease is correct In the meantime the cattlemen in the infested districts are greatly re-lieved to find that the disease is not what it is generally feared to be.

ing and the goat and cattle industry. Cattlemen are the heaviest losers. For several months past cattle have been dying for the want of grass and water. Goats have fared better bewater. Goats have fared better be-cause they are easier taken care of and looked after, although goat breeders report that kids have died within a few weeks after being drop-ped and the increase in herds has

en light this season. Truck farmers have suffered great-ly and no work in their line has been done till recently, and in con-sequence all crops will be late. Alfalfa and fruits are raised extensively in irrigated localities, but these have been cut short this year on account of the prolonged drouth.

Now that the rainy season is on, we may look for rain till the winter snow comes, about November or December.

The rainy se n here usually be-Sept. 15. Last year the rains ceased about Sept. 15 and all winter there was no snow, not even in the moun-tain districts, and for that reason the drouth just broken has been the most severe and destructive in the memory of the oldest inhabitants.
