"Two other recent projects designed to improve service was the complete routining of the local Class Officers: Mike McCravey, office bringing the dial equipment up to exact manufacturers specifications, and the reworking of every single rural line owned by the company in Schleicher county. School Lunch Program Continues To Expand

College Station.-More than 14 to go Communist if we don't give million of the expected record enrollment of 46 million children in the nation's schools will participate in the National School Lunch Program this year, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Last year, well over \$1 billion worth of foods, equipment and services were required to provide the 2.3 billion lunches consumed by the 13.5 million participating school children. Payment of this billion dollar check comes from three basic sources—roughly 60% is paid by the children with the remaining cost about equally divided between state and local sources and the Federal Government.

The program, in its present form, began in 1946 when Congress passed the National School Lunch Act "to safeguard the health and well-being of the nation's children and to encourage the domestic consumption of nutritious agricul-

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

Dean climaxed what was considered by many to be his greatest role, in a superbly acted drunk scene, with Rink passing out and coming hazily back to life to deliver a speech to an empty

banquet hall. It was on September 30, 1955, that Dean smashed his Porsche Spider sports car on a California highway. He met his death the same day that "Giant" was fin-ished in the Warner Brothers studio. Although he was in only two other motion pictures, "East of Eden," and "Rebel Without a Cause," James Dean achieved what many actors work for throughout a lifetime and never attract: a fervently devoted following among movie fans.

For his role as Jett Rink, Dean was nominated for an Academy kimo. In "Cimarron" it is the Red Indian. Invariably the younger it, it would have been the first posthumous award in the history of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.
