moving on its water projects. Vandertulips staff has just completed a water study outlining ways in which Texas cities and industries could meet their water

needs for 1980. Sales Tax Modification State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert thinks it's time to change the oil tax plan just adopted by the

Legislature.

Constitution allocates the new sales tax on motor oil to the State Highway fund for road building. Consequently the corner service station man must keep books on this tax separately from sales taxes he collects for the State's general fund.

Calvert plans to suggest to the Legislature that this oil tax be levied at the jobber level, same as gasoline sales taxes. This will simplify bookkeeping and collecting. Speaker Jas. A. Turman agreed that there are inequities in the new sales tax which the Legisla-

ture should correct.



B. E. Moore Completes 20 Years With S. C. D.

After having served 20 years as a Soil Conservation District supervisor, B. E. Moore, Eldorado farmer and stockman, was re-elected to serve another five year term in an election held Tuesday, October 3rd, at the Bearce ranch.

Mr. Moore was elected as supervisor of this district in the spring of 1941 when it was organized. He has served as supervisor continuously since then. Upon finishing this newly elecetd term he will have served the community for a quarter of a century as a soil conservation district supervisor. Soil conservation districts have come a long way, Mr. Moore says, since this district was first organized and he was first elected. Now districts blanket the nation which includes about 95 per cent of the farms and ranches and more than 90 per cent of the agricultural land in the United States.

Each district has a conservation program and plan to fit its local problems. Districts are an effective means for both individual and community action to deal with local soil, water, and plant conservation problems. Districts are not branches or agencies of any Federal department.

All districts are based on the principle that local land owners and operators should take the initiative and responsibility in directing conservation programs aimed at solving local soil and water problems.

The Soil Conservation Service has the major job of providing technical assistance to farmers and ranchers in planning and doing soil and water conservation. The SCS has a supplemental memorandum of understanding with each district stating the kinds of services to be provided an the conditions under which they are to be

The main objective of all soil conservation districts is to have a complete soil and water conservation program in effect on every farm or ranch within its boundaries. As each land user takes care of his own acres the goal of community-wide conservation is approached.

The district enters into co-operative agreements with farmers and ranchers who are willing to participate in such a program.

Present supervisors of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation district include Merton Shurley of Christoval, zone 1; Doyle Johnson, route 1, San Angelo, zone 2; B. E Moore, Eldorado, zone 3; Ben Hext Eldorado, zone 4; and J. Forrest Runge, Christoval, zone 5.
