



The Texas Legislature has the right to re-district the state to provide for an extra Congressman. But the Legislature has not yet done so. Alternative therefore is

to create a statewide position. Therefore, the following candidates are competing against each other for this high post and not against any present office holder. 



Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundredweight of live animals marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis comparable to the national average incentive payment per pound of shorn wool.

The chairman emphasized the importance of keeping adequate records on sales, which must support the information on payment applications. Thus, producers' sales records for shorn wool should show name and address of buyer, date of sale, name and address of producer, net weight of wool sold, and net proceeds to producer after



General George B. Crittenden, the Confederate commander at the Battle of Mill Springs, was a member of the U.S. Mounted Rifles who came to Texas following the Mexican War.

He, like Thomas, was torn between two loyalties. His father, Senator John J. Crittenden, and his brother, General Thomas L. Crittenden, both remained loyal to the Union although the future Confederate was reported to have said while in Texas "I am sure I shall find my father with the South when I get home.'

He, too, must have been quite disappointed when both his father and brother chose to remain with the Union.




