## Candidate Visits Here



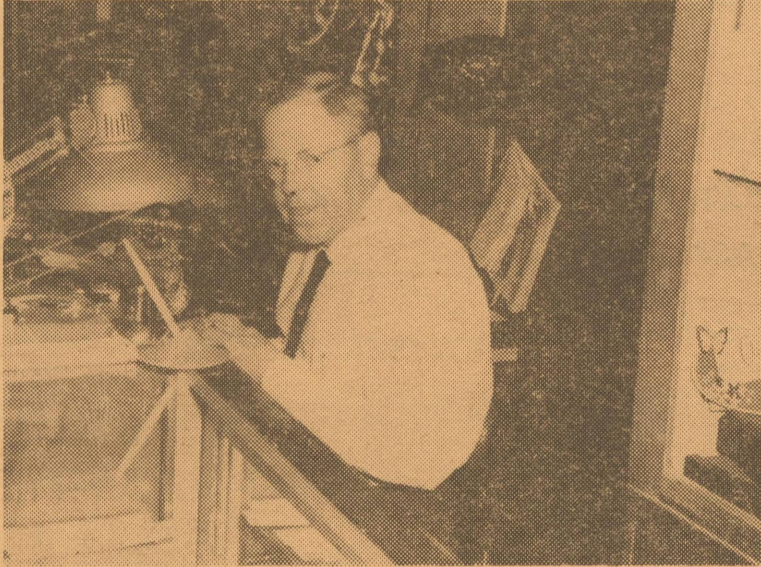

In 1925 they moved to Schleicher county where Mr. Alexander has been engaged in stock farming the

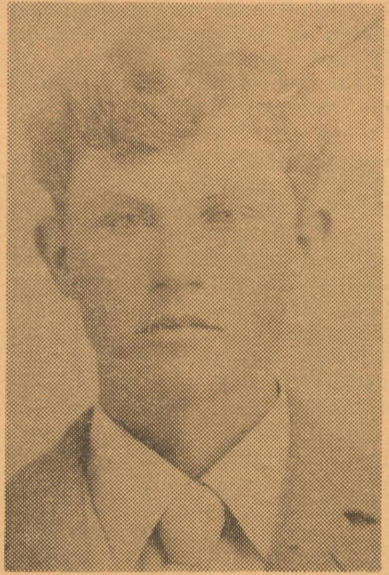
past 33 years. He retired two years ago at the age of 80.

Sunday School as usual at 9:45 and morning worship at 11:00, announces the Rev. C. M. Nyquist. Lenten self-denial folders are to be turned in.

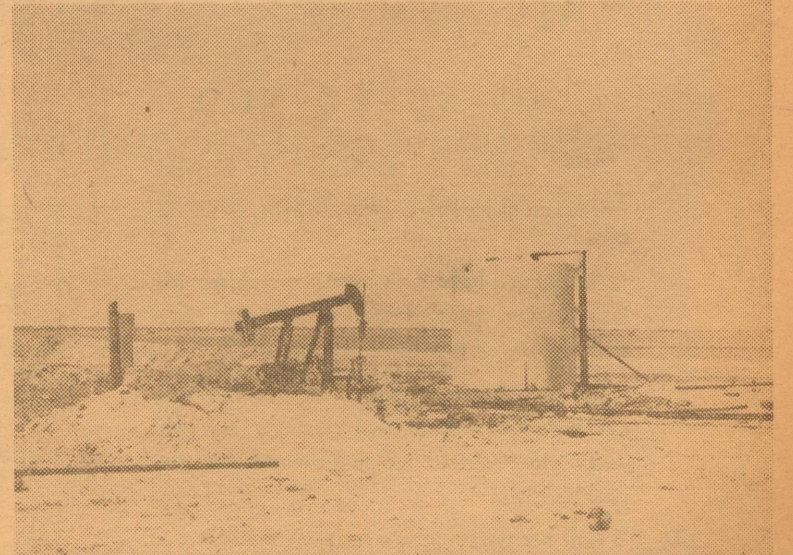
"The Sunrise After Darkness" will be Rev. Nyquist's sermon subject at morning worship.

Workmen have been installing the new air conditioning equipment and it is to be in use by this Easter Sunday morning.



**On The Screen . . .**

A Jerry Lewis comedy, an off-beat thriller in color, and An Elvis Presley movie with a Hawaiian setting, also in color, are the current offerings of the Eagle Drive-In Theatre.

**'The Errand Boy'**

Jerry Lewis has come up with his finest comedy since the Dean Martin era in "The Errand Boy," which is playing tonight and Friday night at the Eagle.

The fair-haired boy at Paramount Studio (every one of his films have shown a profit) runs the gamut from the ridiculous to the sublime this time around and he has written in some masterful comedy sketches.

While "Boy" may sputter and stall occasionally, writer Lewis has provided director Lewis with some comedy situations which enable him to get a good performance out of actor Lewis. There is even a poignant bit with a puppet to satisfy those who demand a tear mingled with their laughs.

Jerry is cast as an errand boy at Parimutual Studios. The firm is losing money and Mrs. Parimutual has the solution:

Plant an "office spy" on the company's sprawling lot to expose the deadwood.

Most humorous scene in the film involves a bit with statuesque Felicia Atkins, who portrays a movie queen attending a premiere of her latest hit. Through a hilarious series of circumstances, Lewis becomes her date. It's a delicious piece of comedy, and Jerry carries it off beautifully.

**'Blood and Roses'**

If horror can be beautiful, then "Blood and Roses" which will be shown Saturday night at the Eagle Drive In, is 74 minutes of a most unique beauty. From the film's Cinerama-type opening aboard an ascending jet liner to its closing, aboard the same jet liner, the cinematography at times leaves the moviegoer suddenly as breathless as does the story itself.

Combine the sight with the surprisingly different sound of the background music and you have a picture which, as the old Hollywood cliché boasts, keeps you on the edge of your seat. If you aren't worried about what mysterious event will happen next, you are at least never really sure what unusual camera shot will next bathe the screen in pastel terror.

In this film there is Technicolor, a haunting background score that actually borders on the symphonic, and a chilling new camera effect that allows your leading lady's 200-year-old bleeding heart slowly and eerily to turn her dress crimson. And what comes out on the Eagle screen is a strangely low-keyed, off-beat shocker.

Directed by Roger Vadim, one of the most controversial of the "new wave" filmmakers, this is the story of a girl, Carmilla, driven by passions . . . some natural, some supernatural. Her love for cousin Leopoldo is natural enough. Her haunted mind is not. What her mind dwells on is the history of vampirism in her otherwise aristocratic family tree.

Follow this plotline with an almost ethereal masked ball, a fireworks display, and a dream sequence which makes the most gruesome nightmare seem like an airy fairy tale, and you have a witches' brew as visually exciting as Shakespeare's literary scare in "Macbeth."

The picture is a success because of the trio: actresses Annette Vadim and Elsa Martinelli, and actor Mel Ferrer. Adding greatly to its value is another trio—director Roger Vadim, cinematographer Claude Renoir and French composer Pordromines.

Vadim, in his first directorial efforts in an American film, moves his cast with a capable and strong hand, painting a picture that is historically convincing. His players' naturalness makes the terror more terrifying because it preys on the viewer almost unnoticeably.

Using his camera as masterfully as his grandfather, Auguste Renoir, used the painter's brush, Claude Renoir etches scenes worthy of being made into stills and put on any wall.

Podromines, one of France's leading composers, has carried through Vadim's theme of tender thrills. When the scenes are the most shocking, the music is the most soothing. This makes for one of the most unusual approaches heard or seen in a horror epic. There is no ominous up-beat in tempo to warn of impending fright. It just happens.

The players, under Vadim's guidance, do justice to this tale.

**'Blue Hawaii'**

Hollywood has taken two of its proven money makers—Hawaii and Elvis Presley—and come up with "Blue Hawaii," which will be on view at the Eagle Drive-In Sunday and Monday nights.

Presley is lightly cast as the son of a prosperous American pineapple tycoon. For 101 Technicolored minutes and through 14 musical numbers he fights papa's help, mother's meanderings and numerous romantic entanglements and misunderstandings to make good

on his own.

Angela Lansbury, who spends all her time crooning "my baby" to screen son Elvis, has some superb moments as a mother who drives her offspring to the beach with her doting, dictatorial ways. Howard McNear, as the forgetful owner of a tourist agency, has not forgotten how to get the best out of a small role. Roland Winters casually plays Presley's father.

Joan Blackman is Presley's love interest.



#### Eldorado Wins Second At Regional Meet

O'Donnell won the Class A Regional meet at Lubbock last week end, with 55 points, and Eldorado came in second with 40. Eldorado was one of the favorites in Class A as the Eagles qualified both relay teams and three individuals in the preliminaries. Mikel Jurecek qualified for shot-put and discus throw; Jim Runge for the 440-yard dash, and Denzel Fsher for the 220-yard dash.

The sprint relay team ran a 44.5 to win and the mile relay team had a 3:32.6. Jim Runge ran a 50.5 in the open 440 (preliminary).

Jim Runge uncorked a 49.5 anchor lap to give Eldorado second place in the mile relay, as he fought from about 15 yards back to overtake O'Donnell, but he couldn't catch Sonora, who won in 3:28.3.

Runge tied his own record in the Class A 440 with a 49.8 but the Eldorado sprint relay team failed to qualify for state despite the fine finish by Runge.

Top two qualifiers in each event will go to the State Meet to be held in Austin at Memorial Stadium on May 4 and 5.

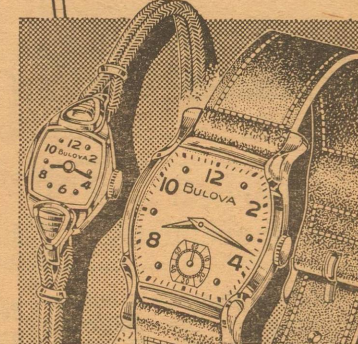

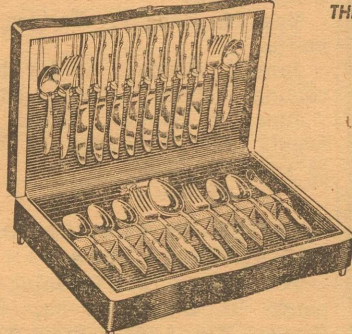

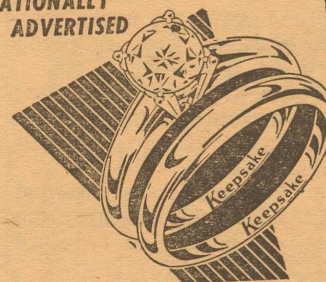

### Highlights and Sidelights FROM your State CAPITOL

Austin.—The hundreds of candidates who are running for places in the Texas House of Representatives and the Texas Senate have plenty of problems. But when the victors get to Austin they'll have a new one. Big question will be "where to park their cars?"

Lack of parking facilities on the Capitol grounds causes a maddening game of musical chairs—or musical cars—at each legislative session. Speaker of the House Jas. A. Turman says the problem is "growing more acute each day."

So, Turman appointed a committee which may have the longest title in the history of the state-house: The Interim Committee To Study State Owned Lands Around the Capitol Concerning the Possibility of Converting Such Into Parking Lots.

Rep. Obie Jones of Austin was named chairman. Two other Austin members, Reps. Wilson Foreman and Charles Sandahl, will serve on the interim study committee.

### Cut The Property Tax?

For three years now a legislator-citizen study committee—the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy—has been mulling the possibility of state abandonment of the property tax. Texas Research League has helped with the study.

The committee should have recommendations ready for legislative action in the January session. Outcome may rest on voter pressure between now and the November general election.

Under the current system, schools get 42 per cent of the property tax dollars; cities take 29 per cent; counties, 18 per cent; and the state government and special districts only get five per cent each.

Texas Municipal League has urged the state to abandon the ad valorem tax and let the cities increase their property taxes.

Hale-Aikin committee asked the state to abandon the tax and let the schools levy it.

Tax experts often have declared that county assessors might place higher values on property, if they felt more of the ad valorem tax dollar would stay in the county.

### College Funds Short

Presidents and business managers of Texas' 19 state-supported colleges and universities were stunned this week when Texas Commission on Higher Education reported they will get only 54 per cent of the funds they requested to meet increased enrollment in 1963.

Administrators had set their future needs at \$2,770,951. But the Legislature only appropriated \$1,500,000 to supplement teaching salaries for enrollment increases. So the commission's staff prorated the fund among the 19 schools.

Dr. F. L. McDonald, president of Lamar State College of Technology in Beaumont, didn't take the news quietly. "This is one of the reasons why we are never able to raise salaries," he protested. He said the colleges are never allotted enough money, and "have to dig it up."

While the 19 presidents are trying to balance their budgets, Commission on Higher Education will be studying requests from three more colleges which want to join the state system: Odessa, San Antonio and Laredo junior colleges.

Recommendations will be made when the 58th Legislature convenes.

### New Shell Game

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler predicts that Texas never will yield control over any part of Padre Island to the federal government. He charged that some Texans have been "deceived" by talk of an 88-mile-long national park there.

He said the U. S. Senate did not approve a PARK, but a "National Seashore Area."

"This status," says Sadler, "would keep Padre Island and Laguna Madre in an undeveloped state."

Sadler urged Attorney General Will Wilson to push recovery of Laguna Madre acreage from private owners before they convey their rights to the U. S. Department of the Interior.

Meanwhile, U. S. Congressman Joe Kilgore of McAllen said the House National Parks Subcommittee will make an on-the-ground survey of the island from May 11 through May 13. They will return to Washington, D. C., to consider legislation on May 14.

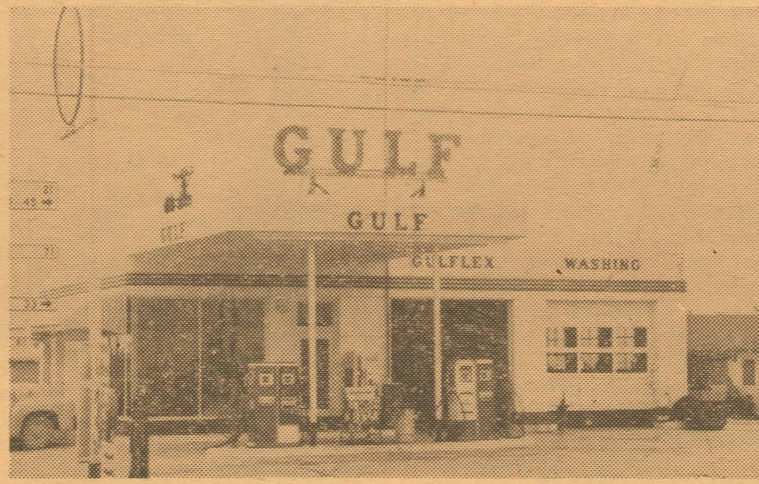

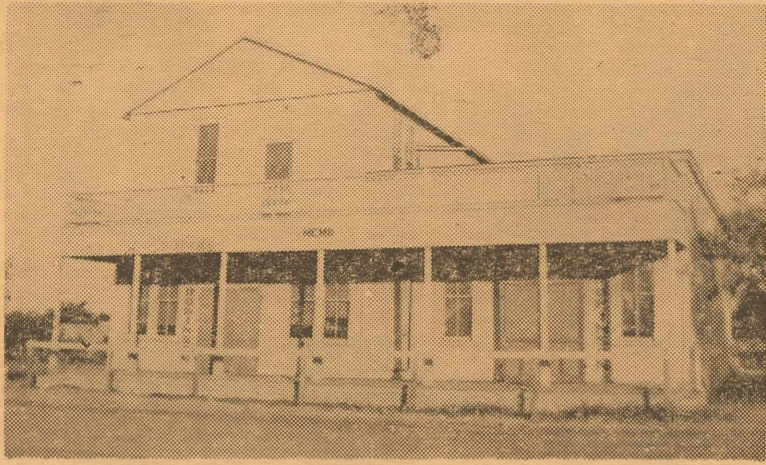

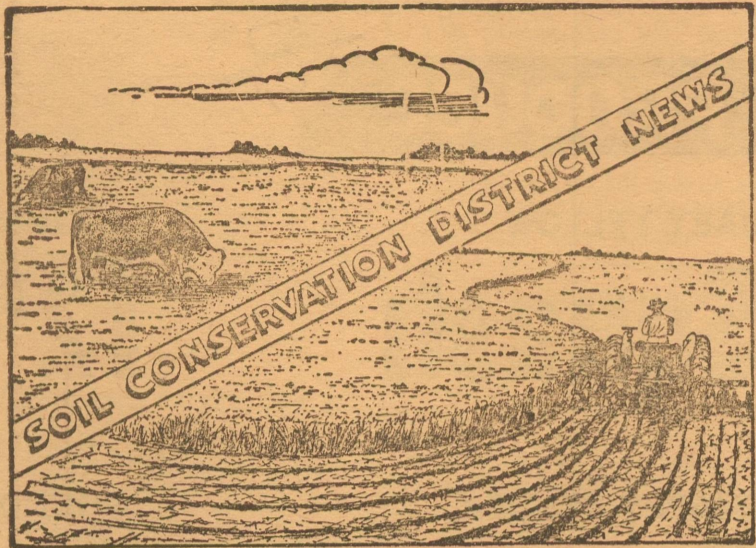

**Great Plains Conservation Program**

According to Donald A. Williams, administrator of the Soil Conservation Service, "The Great Plains Conservation Program continues to draw the attention of soil and water conservation districts and other interests elsewhere in the country, because of its basic feature of being tailored to fit the specific needs of an area having common climatic erosion, and other problems, thereby setting a pattern potentially applicable in other areas."

William M. Rountree, work unit conservator of the Soil Conservation Service, assisting the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation district, states that the local work unit is receiving applications for developing Great Plains contracts.

This program, Rountree says, is designed to promote soil and water conservation through a more coordinated conservation program. Emphasis is to be placed on the more enduring or permanent practices based on land capabilities, he said. Long term financial aid is being offered through cost-share contracts to carry out needed land treatments. He emphasized that it is not a disaster or drought relief program, a replacement of other programs, an annual program, a production adjustment program, nor an income supplement program.

Any landowner, or operator who has control of his land for a period of time equal to the life of the contracts, eligible to participate in the program. Contract periods are from 3 to 9 years. The producer

must develop and carry out a complete conservation program on his land to be eligible.

Rountree said that technical assistance may be secured from the Soil Conservation Service and other agencies working in the county. The Soil Conservation Service is responsible for the administration of the program and other agencies of the Department of Agriculture are called on to help plan and carry out the program, he said.

Contracts may be amended, modified or canceled under certain conditions. Acreage allotments and marketing quotas will not be decreased during the life of the contract. Cost-share rates are based on the average cost of applying a practice. Maximum cost-share rates vary from 50 to 80 per cent of the average cost.

This program has no more compulsion than any commercial contract. Under this program, the landowner makes up his own long-range conservation plan to suit himself. He is not later subject to any restrictions to which he has not previously agreed, Rountree said.

Every time we go to the bank to borrow money, we commit ourselves to certain contract regulations. The Great Plains contract is no different. In it the government agrees what it will do, and the landowner agrees what he will do. There is nothing in it that a conservation ranchman or farmer would object to.
