In Screwworm Eradication

Officials in charge of the screwworm eradication program have recently announced new screwworm cases extending north and east in the state at a fairly rapid rate, this being due to very favorable weather, warm temperatures, and high humidity. The increase of the number of screwworm cases points up the importance for individual livestock producers' part in this eradication program. Cases have been reported as far north as Scurry county.

Stockmen in the county are urged to inspect livestock frequently for possible screwworm cases, treat all wounds promptly collect speciment from such wounds, and if you have the proper vials, send to the address on the collection kit. 





of the yards at Big Shanty, the Confederate crew pursued the Yankees for a short distance on a handcar, then took over another locomotive, and finally set out on foot when they ran into a section of track that had been ripped up. After walking some three miles, the men took over another locomotive and set out in hot pursuit of the Yankees who now had a substantial lead. The name of that 2nd locomotive was the "Texas." For the rest of the chase the Confederates in the "Texas" stayed so close on the Union raiders that there was no time to burn bridges or do anything else except try to escape. The "General" ran out of steam just before reaching the Georgia-Tennessee line and was

abandoned. Within a week all the raiders were captured and placed in prison at Chattanooga. On June 7, 1862, less than two months after the raid, Andrews

was hanged as a spy and 11 days later, seven others were also hanged. Several of them escaped from prison the following October and the remaining six were paroled in March, 1863.

The newly-authorized Congressional Medal of Honor was presented to each of the members of the raiding party or to their next

of kin. On Saturday, April 14, 1962, the 'General," which has been put in operating condition in the shops of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, made a re-run under its own ower over the territory of the famous chase. All along the route, there were celebrations and commemorative events to mark the 100th anniversary of the event. And following the re-run, the 'General' will go on a tour of the principle cities in the L & N Area so that more people may see it in actual operation. What happened to the "Texas" used in the final 51 miles of the chase? It is on exhibit in the basement of the Cyclorama Building in Grant Park in Atlanta. It has been restored to look as it did during the War but is not in operating condition. And by the way, the "Texas" was running backward while it was chasing the Yankee operated "General." 
