

Kansas City, Mo.—Sharon Sue Edmiston, Eldorado, was recently named to junior membership in the American Hereford Association, the world's largest purebred registry organization, with headquarters in Kansas City.

Sixty-three junior Hereford breeders were placed on the Association's official roster during April. The Association maintains active accounts for more than 80,000 breeders of registered Herefords over the nation.

The Hereford Association during the last fiscal year recorded 476,-367 purebred calves. The year's total recordings were the eighth highest on record and almost twice the combined registrations of other major beef breeds.





Home Demonstration Agent's Column By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

Mrs. J. B. Montgomery called me the other morning for a recipe for making a rose jar or rose sachet from rose petals. I didn't have one, but I checked with Miss Ruth Baker, the county librarian, and she had not one but two. The one given here is the easier to make and I believe that many of you will enjoy a jar of fragrance which can be added to as long as the roses last. Just for pleasure try this

Rose Jar

Gather your roses only in the early morning before the hot sun shines on them. Spread the petals on brown paper and sprinkle lightly with salt (not iodized).

Place in a sunny place, tossing

lightly every day until perfectly dry. For more color and character add honeysuckle blossoms and larkspur flowers that have been gathered and dried too.

When all the flowers are dry, fill your jar, sprinkling each layer of dried petals with mixed spices nutmeg, allspice, cinnamon and cloves. When the jar is filled, pour a tablespoon of your favorite perfume over the leaves. Close tightly and there it is.

And while we are on the flower subject, let me repeat a direction which was given to the Garden Club by Mrs. Tommy Ridgeway, florst and garden club member

of San Angelo.

Maggie told us to place cut flowers from our own yards in warm water immediately on cutting. Not hot-about bath temperature. And, to treat cut flowers from the florist in the same way. On getting flowers which have been cut for some time, remember to cut about an inch or so from the stem ends before placing in the warm water.

This works. I know it doesn't sound exactly right as stacked against what we have "always" thought. Last Saturday afternoon I cut a bunch of petunias and put them in medium hot water. Today, Thursday, they are still fresh and standing upright. Water is absorbed by the plant cells more quickly when the water is warm than cold; that is the reason it works. Try it.

As an old time educator has said: "You may well doubt what you hear, you can doubt what you see but you can not doubt what you do."

Do your meringues always fall? Or, are they tough? Perish the thought-but if they do, take these tips:

1. Add the sugar—2 tablespoons to each egg white-before beating if you use an electric beater. If you use a rotary hand beater add

the sugar just at the foamy stage.

2. Try a high baking temperature (400 to 420 F) and bake from 3 to 5 minutes. The meringue will cut more easily, be more tender and have less tendency to "weep."

And painting time is the right time to know what a color is going to look like when it's dry. The best way to do this is to drop a few drops on a white blotter; in a few minutes you can tell what that wall and woodwork is going to look like BEFORE and not the next day after it's painted.

Sometimes a varnished piece of furniture or woodwork doesn't need a new coat of varnish but

instead, just cleaning. In a double boiler combine 1 quart (4 cups) hot water

1 tablespoon gum turpentine (cuts the dirt and grease) 3 tablespoons boiled linseed oil,

or lemon oil (to lubricate, feed, and polish the wood).

Keep the mixture hot in the double bolier while you work. Dip a soft cloth in the solution, wring out excess moisture and apply to furniture doing only one part at the time. 

Motorists driving along the Dallas-Fort Worth Turnpike may have been wondering about the old time wooden oil derrick that has just been constructed in the 110-acre tourist attraction... SIX FLAGS Over Texas.

Master plans in the projected expansion of SIX FLAGS included the construction of an oil boom town, and the oil derrick is the initial structure. Following its policy of striving to attain authenticity in the Park, scouts from SIX FLAGS boarded the SIX FLAGS helicopter and headed for Breckenridge, Texas. They had heard that an old wooden derrick, complete with rigging was located somewhere in the area.

About four miles North of Breckenridge the old wooden structure was spotted and pilot Clifford Place settled the whirlybird down nearby. The owner of the property on which the well is located came out to investigate and purchasing agent Roy Day made arrangements on the spot to buy the derrick. However, some of the old mechanical equipment was not intact, and the SIX FLAGS group went into Breckenrdige to visit an oil well equipment supplier.

The supplier, G. T. McNallen, was asked if he had any old rig "iron," or a complete old unit that was for sale. McNallen replied by asking if the Six Flaggers had seen the old Crowley Number One well, out North of town. Day answered by saying, "Yes, we just came from there, and bought the thing." McNallen replied, "Oh, yeah." Day explained that he had just made a deal with the man that owns the property. McNallen, quipped, "That's funny, I thought I owned it."

It seems that when the property was sold McNallen had retained rights to the well, of which the current owner was unaware. After some complicated dealing, the derrick finally became the property of SIX FLAGS Over Texas, along with a complete 1920 vintage "cable tool" rig. When SIX FLAGS construction supervisors and mechanics trekked to Breckenridge to move ago. and mechanics trekked to Breckenridge to move ago.

Then, the Park hired Charlie Fox, an old-time oil rigging expert who had built many wooden derricks in the past. As a consultant, Fox took measurements of the old derrick and secured a quantity of number two rough pine, and began building the replica in the SIX FLAGS Park. The floor of the old derrick was good enough to use in the new 68' high derrick, and was moved complete from Breckenridge, along with all the drilling equipment. This included gears, a walk-side reel, a backside reel, a bull wheel, sand reel, calf wheel, band wheel and pittman.

The original Crowley Number One well was a producing oil well in the Breckenridge area, and was constructed and drilled in the year 1920. It was 3,500 feet in depth — an extremely deep well for those days. Then, the Park hired Charlie Fox, an old-time

At SIX FLAGS Over Texas the "cable-tool" rig will actually operate, as wheels turn and

cables roll over pulleys.

The derrick and its rig in operation can be seen at SIX FLAGS from two rides that were popular modes of transportation during the days that Crowley Number One was pumping its 250 barrels a day. One is the Chaparral Antique Carride, where guests drive ¾ scale models of 1911 antique cars. Another is the narrow-gauge steam engine train that encircles the Park. 


