Enrollment is open now through June 5, 2000. For today's newborn, a our-year college plan costs \$121,448; without a TTF plan, when that newborn enters college, the cost is expected to top \$52,000.

On This Date

On this date in 1940 the British launched their first major offensive of WWII when they attacked the Italian forces massed at Sidi Barrani in Egypt. In 1958 Robert H. Welch, Jr. founded the John Birch Society, a right-wing organization dedicated to fighting communism in American society. In 1987 the Palestinian "intefada" erupted in the Gaza Strip region of Israel. In 1990 Lech Walesa, leader of the Solidarity trade union, was became the first democratically elected President of Poland in six decades. In 1992 Charles, Prince of Wales and heir to the British throne, and his wife, Princess Diana announced the end of their marriange, saying that they were separating "amicably."

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Tortilla Sales Not Flat

The tortilla, long a Texas favorite, is the rising star of the baking industry. Tortilla makers are creating tortillas with flavors such as tomato, spinach and, of course, jalapeno and turning them into "wraps" for an increasing variety of nontraditional ingredients. Even national sandwich shop chains have added tortilla

wraps to their menus. Such innovations, combined with the increasing popularity of Mexican foods, will make the tortilla-making business a \$4 billion industry by 2000, up from \$2.9 billion in 1996, according to the U.S.Çensus Bureau. Tortillas have outpaced the rest of the baking industry, growing at a 17 percent rate compared to 2 percent for other, more traditional bakery products.






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Straight Talk About Y2K

As the new millennium approaches, Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative has taken all prudent steps to help keep the lights on.

Although no electric utility can guarantee service at any given time due to storms, fire, and accidents. 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PUBLIC NOTICE OF APPLICATION TO INCREASE RATES

Pursuant to Tex. Utilities Code § 104.103 (1999), TXU Lone Star Pipeline, a Division of TXU Gas Company ("Applicant") hereby gives notice of intent to change the city gate rate of TXU Lone Star Pipeline (formerly known as "Lone Star Pipeline Company") established by Order of the Railroad Commission of Texas in Gas Utilities Docket No. 8664 ("GUD 8664").

Applicant proposes a two-part transportation rate that consists of a demand charge per MMBtu based upon the contractual demand for city gate service and a volumetric charge per MMBtu based on actual delivered volumes. This transportation rate would result in a revenue increase to Applicant. Applicant also proposes to increase the storage rate applicable to city gate deliveries established in GUD 8664. The storage rate would consist of a monthly demand charge for capacity and a monthly demand charge for deliverability. The deliverability demand charge would only be charged during the months of November through March.

The proposed effective date of the change is December 20, 1999. The change is a major change, and will result in an increase in annual revenues of approximately \$20.3 million or sixteen percent (16%). The change will affect 1.3 million residential and commercial customers. The rate change will affect transportation and storage rates at the city gate for TXU Lone Star Gas-Transmission, who in turn sells the gas to TXU Lone Star Gas which serves 1.3 million residential and commercial customers in Texas under the rates established by the local regulatory authorities in municipalities and the Railroad Commission in environs areas.

A Statement of Intent to make such a change has been filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas in GUD 8976 and is available for inspection at the Commission's office at 1701 North Congress in Austin, Texas, and at the offices of Applicant at 301 South Harwood in Dallas, Texas. Copies of the Statement of Intent have also been sent to the appropriate city official of each incorporated city served by TXU Lone Star Gas. Any affected person may file in writing comments or a protest concerning the proposed change in the rates with the Docket Services Section of the Office of General Counsel, Railroad Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 12967, Austin, Texas 78711-2967, at any time on or before 4:00 p.m., Thursday, December 30, 1999. Any person or agency who has a justiciable or administratively cognizable interest who desires to be designated as a party may petition for leave to intervene and request to become a party to this proceeding. The final date for intervention in this case shall be 4:00 p.m., Thursday, December 30, 1999.






