Electronic Brain Speeds Work For Highway Department
Austin. An electronic brain
that can read 8,000 cards per min-
ute is helping the Department shorten the time between planning another Texas high-
way and seeing it opened to trafKnown as "the 1401," this lightning fast computer teams up with equipment to solve the intricate engineering problems involved in
building today's highways. These
are proble are problems in geometric bridge land measurement, and traffic sig-nalization-to list just a few!
Housed in the basement of the Austin, the 1401 consists of a card reader punch, a lister, a central
processing unit, and four tape This complex "brain" does work
in one day that used to require weeks-li human hands. For example, in addition to reading as many as
8,000 taped IBM cards per minute, it can also-in that same length or
time-punch 250 cards, print 600 lines on paper, and read 800 (un-
taped) IBM cards. Machines such as this have be-
come a necessity to cope with the come a necessity to cope woder
increasing complexity of modern
highway-building. 1401 moved into Highway Department operations, it replaced two
obsolete computing machines, that could read "only" 150 lines per And Highway Department offi-
