motorcade was led into Iraan by E. H. Topliffe driving his 1917 Maxwell automobile. The barbecue was served at the football field by the Iraan Lions club.

The 30-mile road link east of Iraan has been under construction for the past three years. It called for making cuts and fills for the roadway which are among the largest such jobs ever done on Texas

The new road gives motorists almost a straight-as-an-arrow drive to Eldorado from Iraan. At Eldorado the new road connects with State 29 and there are plans for obtaining a State 29 designation for the new road which would be an extension from Eldorado. There also is a chance that the new road might carry a dual designation-State 29 and US 190, which would be an extension from Brady where US 190 now terminates.

Beauty of the original wood was thus restored. So a new light blond look has taken over the Capitol.

Lower Chamber also is getting new flooring and carpets. The House gallery, where so many Texans have sat in hard chairs watching legislation move through the House, is getting new upholstered chairs to make the taxpayers more comfortable. Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont, whose Rules Committee chairmanship puts him in a general supervisory position on the work of the State Board of Control, thinks it will be finished by November 1.

What It Costs

Texans who pay taxes to the tate government got an idea of what the new school and welfare programs are costing when Comp troller Robert S. Calvert added up costs for the fiscal year which ended August 31.

State aid to public schools and colleges came to \$533,541,099, up nearly \$100,000,000 over the \$431, 974,434 of the previous year. Wel fare spending went up from \$188, 875,904 to \$212,765,629. Increased Federal aid for welfare paid most of the increase.

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

"Sausage Corn Bread Supper" is one example. Add a tossed green salad, milk and fresh fruit, and you have a quick easy meal ready. To make this tasty dish follow these directions. Brown a pound of sausage links in a skillet over low heat. Drain the drippings. Arrange 10 sausage links over 6 apple rings in a platter or in the bottom of a skillet. Save the extra sausage links and cut into pieces to blend in with the batter.

For the corn bread, sift together 1 cup corn meal, 1 cup flour, ½ teaspoon salt and 4 teaspoons baking powder. Add one egg, 1 cup milk and 2 tablespoons sausage drippings. Beat with a rotary beater until smooth, about one minute. Blend in the chopped sausage links. Pour the batter over the apple rings. Bake at 425 F. for 20 to 25 minutes. Invert immediately. Serve with warm apple sauce. Serves 6 to 8.



It is obviously the responsibility of the Congress to prevent such abuses of this privilege. I have introduced a bill to prohibit the use of counterpart funds by any committee, member or employee for any purpose. As I see it, about the only way to prevent such misuse of funds is to stop the practice in its entirety.





A sprawling American Odyssey, 'State Fair" has been around for a generation. This third filming, with "the largest annual exposition in the United States" as its backdrop, is the costliest and most spectacular.

It is in CinemaScope and Deluxe color and will be shown Sunday and Monday nights at the Eagle Drive-In Theatre. It was filmed mostly on the grounds of the State
Fair of Texas at Dallas.

The most ingratiating new num ber by Rodgers is "It's the Little Things in Texas," sung in sensuous contralto by Miss Faye with frogvoiced Mr. Ewell.

Pat Boone, teamed with the Swedish-born Ann-Margret, have a fresh goody, "Willing and Eager.

More the scrubbed, milk-fed type is Pamela Tiffin who doesn't have the blight of most ethereal screen personalities, lapses into coarseness. She warbles early, "It Might As Well Be Spring," Academy Award tune in the 1945 version, which comes out torchy, choppy and scenic.

Both Boone and Darin have strong numbers. An oldie from 1945, "Isn't It Kind of Fun" is turned into a big production number.

The most durable song of the score, "It's a Grand Night for Singing," is staged perfunctorily.

Photographically, "State Fair" does handsomely by the Dallas freeways, the Dallas skyline, and the Midway by night.





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
