

History of Mother's Day

The first recorded celebrations of Mother's Day were held in ancient Greece. In more modern times, Juliet Ward Howe, author of "Battle Hymn of the Republic" suggested a U.S. holiday for mothers in 1872. But, it was Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia who convinced the State of West Virginia to set aside a day to honor mothers in 1910. In 1914 President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed Mother's Day a national holiday and set it permanently on the second Sunday in May. By 1923 Anna Jarvis turned against the idea of an official holiday and filed a lawsuit to stop a Mother's Day festival. Jarvis said she regretted the holiday had become "too commercialized"

On this date in 1851 Dr. John Gorrie of Apalachicola, FL, patented the mechanical refrigerator. Also in 1851 Linus Yale of Newport, NY patented the "clock type" lock...or as we know it today, the padlock. In 1915 Babe Ruth hit his first major-league home run. 

Law enforcement database would curb gang activity

AUSTIN - A bill to provide law enforcement with a database of information about gangs and gang members won Senate approval last week.

The measure, sponsored by Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, and cosponsored by Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, would track movements of gang members in order to slow or halt the spread of gangs.

Referring to the April 20 shootings at a Littleton, Colo., high school, Duncan said the legislation could give law enforcement "some additional tools to be able to hopehappening in Texas.'


