





Wool Incentive Deadline Is Tuesday

Tuesday, April 30, is the last day in which producers may apply for wool incentive payments for the marketing year 1962.

Producers will also apply for mohair incentive; however, sales of mohair the last two months has been above the incentive payment of 74 cents. Whether or not it will average above 74 cents is questionable. The national average including January 1963 was 62 cents over-all received by producers. The support price on mohair for 1963 will be 76 cents.

Then too, producers will be get-ting a break starting January 1, 1962. The marketing year will be January 1, 1964, to December 31, 1964, instead of from April 1 to March 30th of each year.

Extra precaution should be taken by ranchers during shearing and marking time. "Dope" all marked livestock and spray all sheep out of the shearing pen. Should a screwworm case go unreported, you increase within three days the chances of additional screwworm cases 100-fold. To elim-inate the screwworm it is essential for the eradication authorities to know where the outbreak is. Your vigilance in this matter is the important thing in the screwworm fight! Screwworm vials are at the County Agent's office.

DeMille Made 1927 **Silent Version**

The late Cecil B. DeMille ran into a blur of dramatic art and great intentions when he produced 'The King of Kings" as a silent superspectacle.

The first "The King of Kings," financed by a passionately anonymous Wall Street financier, Jeremiah Milbank, has lasted until the present, has been seen all over the world by an estimated audience of 800,000,000 and still earns money which, as net profit, has always gone to charity.

DeMille's "The King of Kings" cost \$2,700,000 of 1927 dollars. De-Mille in those days made much of the assignment of Christ to the Broadway-Hollywood actor, H. B. Warner. After years of subsequent obscurity, his last important part was that of the Head Lama in "Lost Horizon." When he died a few years ago in Hollywood, Warner was virtually forgotten, his funeral attended by 13 people.
