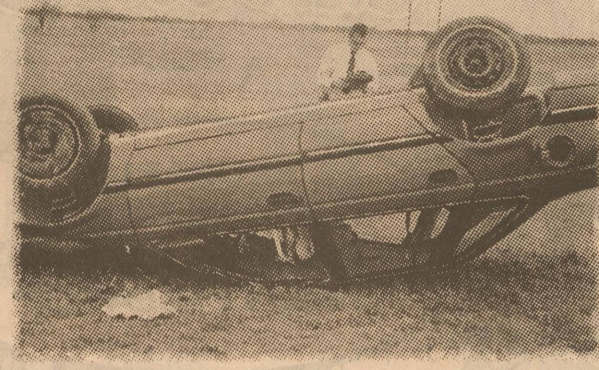
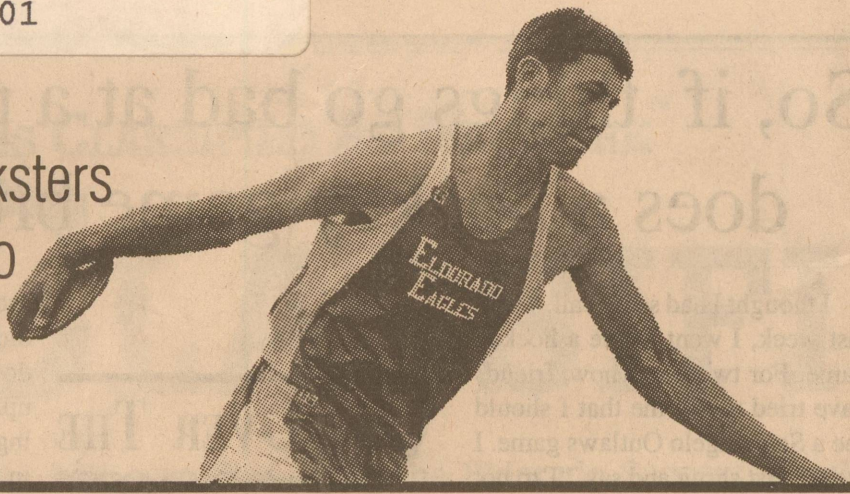

Explosion and fire claim West family's historic home

Eldorado landmark completely destroyed

An explosion and resulting fire Sunday destroyed a house belonging to Barbara West Clark, one mile west of Eldorado. The house was vacant at the time and there were no reported injuries.

According to firefighters at the scene, a gas leak in the basement was the apparent cause of the explosion which collapsed the back wall of the rock house. Fire quickly spread throughout the structure.

A phone call to the Schleicher County Sheriff's Department reporting the blaze was logged in at 8:29 a.m. Lead units of the Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department reached the scene to find the house ablaze.

The department's two pumper trucks and tanker were pressed into action along with several grass-fire trucks. Niblett's Oilfield Service also dispatched a transport load of water to the fire. Still, water was in short supply and firemen laid hose to a nearby stock tank.

"It was pretty far along when we got here," said Fire Chief Jerry Jones. "For a minute there it looked like we were gaining on it then the roof caved in."

The home was a built in 1925 by C.C. "Charley" West, one of the early pioneers of Schleicher County and first Postmaster of Eldorado. A mailbox attached to a mesquite tree near the home became known as the "Post Office Tree" and was where Eldorado's

first residents received their mail. Charley West died in 1932. His wife, Augusta, passed away in 1956.

The house then passed to Agnes West Womack. It is reported that she was the first child born in Eldorado. After her death, her heirs sold the house to her brother, Jimmy West, who in turn left it to his daughter, Barbara West Clark.

To accent the historic character of the house, Barbara West Clark had, in recent years, filled it with antiques. In 1995 the "West House" was featured in the Eldorado Centennial Celebration. Tours of the house were given as Schleicher County residents and visitors alike sought to catch a glimpse of Eldorado's past.

Although the fire destroyed most of the house, a stained glass window in the northeast corner of the structure survived. According to Barbara West Clark, the window was from a Lutheran Church in Boerne. She had installed the window in memory of a friend who died of cancer.

Following the tragedy, debris from the explosion and fire was scattered around the rubble of the burned out house. Amid that debris was found an undamaged crystal vase, some children's books and other items. Also, a slightly charred guestbook, containing the names of the fortunate people who had visited the historic home in recent years.

City, school and water district plan elections

Election Day is set for Saturday, May 1st for City Council, School Board and Water District Board of Director races. The election will be held in the Schleicher County Memorial Building with the polls opening at 7:00 a.m. and closing at 7:00 p.m.

The City of Eldorado will be electing one council member from each of its three wards. In Ward #1, Juquin Rojas and Robert E. Bybee will be seeking the post currently held by Jeri Whitten, who is not seeking reelection. Bybee was elected last year in Ward #2, however, he recently moved into Ward #1.

In City Ward #2, a pair of former council members, John Callison and Richard Mendez are seeking the seat currently held by George Gower. Gower is not seek-

ing reelection. John Callison most recently served as the Eldorado City Administrator.

In City Ward #3, incumbent Dora Bosmans will face challenger Eddie Rodriguez.

Only one ballot is being prepared for the Schleicher County ISD Board of Trustees election. The only contested race is for Single Member District (SMD) #6 which is being sought by Sidney Reynolds and Jo Helen Kotsch. Incumbent William Edmiston is not seeking reelection.

In School SMD #1 and SMD #5, the election is scheduled for cancellation since only one candidate is running in each race. In SMD #1, Steve Sessom is running unopposed for reelection. In SMD #5 Roxanne Adame is the only candidate to fill the unexpired term of

Ruby Minor.

The Plateau Underground Water District is seeking an at-large board member. Vying for the position are incumbent Raymond Mittel and challenger Tom Enochs. The election for the unexpired term in Precinct #3 is scheduled for cancellation. That seat is currently held by Lynn Griffin.

The election for three at-large seats on the Schleicher County Hospital District board of directors was cancelled when only the three incumbents, Judy Christian, Randy Mankin and Lanis Mikeska filed for election.

KIDY-TV grants waivers to Schleicher County viewers

KIDY-TV in San Angelo began issuing waivers this week to some Schleicher County viewers who wish to receive FOX network programming via satellite.

An engineer from KIDY reportedly made two trips to Eldorado in recent weeks to test the strength of KIDY's signal. Eldorado Mayor John Nikolauk talked with the man by phone.

"He said that he was recommending that the station grant waivers to people down here who request them," Nikolauk told the

Several local citizens reported receiving waivers this week. The waivers will allow them to continue receiving FOX network programming over their satellite dish.

The waivers were made necessary last month when a Federal Judge ruled that satellite TV subscribers must receive network programming from their local network affiliate. KIDY-TV in San Angelo is a FOX network affiliate. Schleicher County is considered to be within the stations local broadcast area.

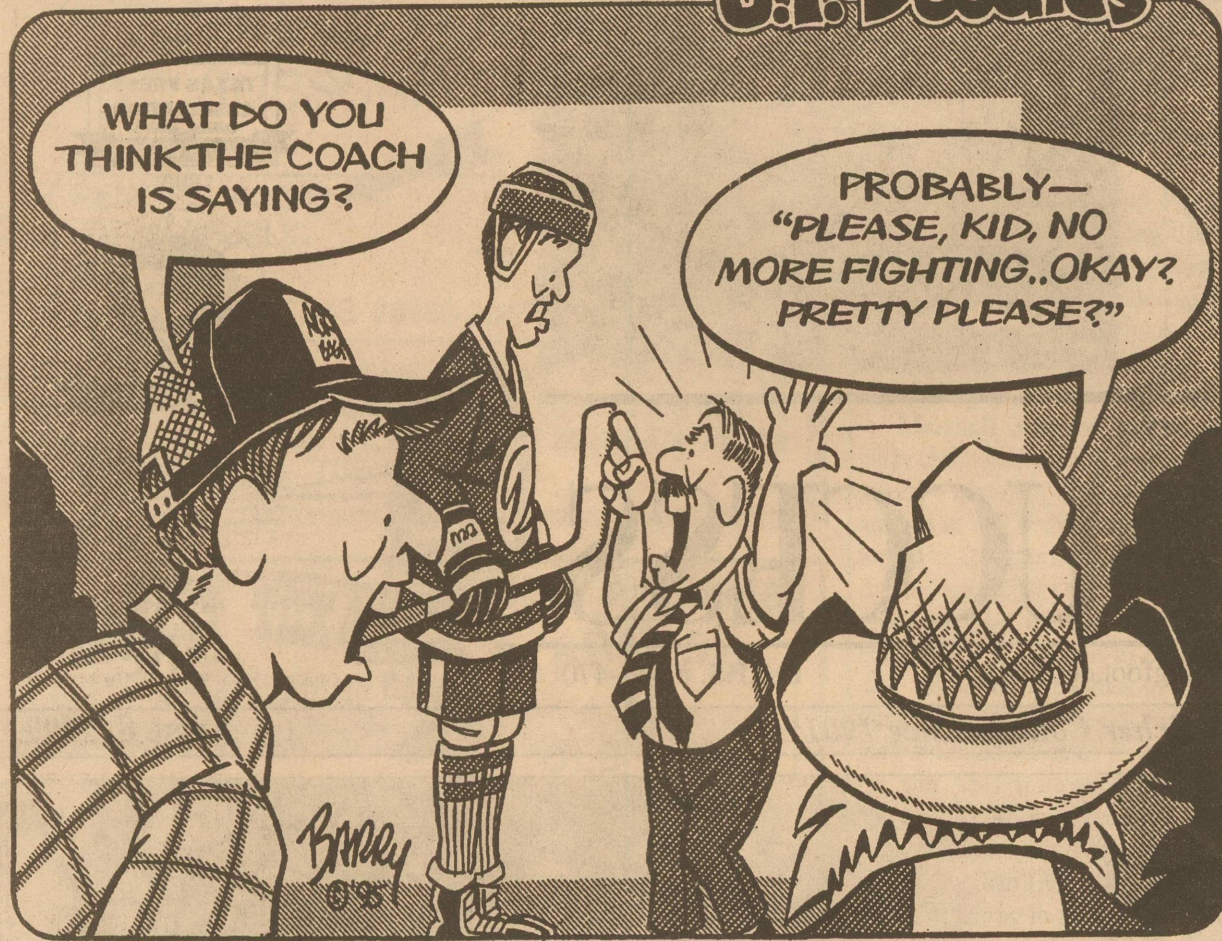

I didn't then and still don't understand the rules of the game. I couldn't tell you the difference between icing and high sticking if I had to. I do know this much, it was very entertaining. But, I had as much fun watching the hockey fans as they did watching the game.

There was this one lady, who

University fund manager to disclose more about investments

AUSTIN — The private board that manages \$12.5 billion in public university money has agreed to be more open about its high-risk investments.

The University of Texas Investment Management Co. on March 30 told the House Appropriations Committee it will name all principals and disclose annual rates of return when making future investments with riskier private firms.

UTIMCO also said it will ask private firms to which public university funds already are committed for permission to disclose the information.

"That goes a long way toward addressing my concerns. This will provide some comfort as to how public funds are being managed," state Rep. Sylvester Turner, a member of the Appropriations Committee, was quoted by the Austin American-Statesman.

Turner, D-Houston, earlier had criticized UTIMCO's confidentiality policy. He was responding to a Houston Chronicle article citing alleged conflicts of interest involving UTIMCO chairman Tom Hicks, a Dallas investor who recently completed a six-year term as a UT System regent.

The article said Hicks had directed \$252 million to private funds run by business associates and friends and \$205 million to funds run by major Republican donors, the article said.

UT System Chancellor William Cunningham, one of UTIMCO's nine board members, said he was confident no conflicts of interest occurred.

Lawsuit-Squelching Bill OKed

Local governments would be unable to sue the sellers and mak-

ers of firearms under legislation approved last week by the Texas Senate on a 22-7 vote.

"My intent is to stop frivolous lawsuits and make sure gun control does not become a local issue in Texas," said the bill's author, Sen. Jon Lindsay, R-Houston.

Cities in other states are considering suing gun and ammunition makers and sellers to recover medical costs and other expenses related to gun violence.

Senators voting against the bill have argued against limiting the attorney general's power to file such a lawsuit, and pointed out that it was good there was no lawsuit ban shielding tobacco companies.

Board Changes Clemency Policy

The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles last week enacted a 21-day deadline for the filing of clemency applications.

The previous deadline had been five days before scheduled execution. Board chairman Victor Rodriguez earlier complained that the five-day deadline made it hard for board members to evaluate applications.

But defense lawyers argued executions often are scheduled 30 days in advance, giving them little time to file an application.

Airport Anticipates Clinton Visit

Air Force One will land at the new Austin-Bergstrom International Airport in mid-April.

President Bill Clinton will be the first passenger to tour the Barbara Jordan Passenger Terminal.

The president also will appear at an Austin fund-raiser to help retire the gubernatorial campaign debt of his friend and former Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, who lost a 1998 bid to unseat Gov. George W. Bush.

Other Highlights

Last week, after completing a performance review of the El Paso Independent School District, state Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander said, "I am going to be the education watchdog for the people of Texas, seeing to it that

more of every education dollar goes directly into the classroom where it belongs."

Republican legislators say there is growing support for shaving the state's 6.25 percent sales tax rate. Democrats raised concerns that important programs might be whittled down to pay for the tax cut.

About 40 people gathered before the state Capitol on March 28 to protest NATO bombing raids in Yugoslavia. The gathering was sponsored by the University of Texas Anti-War Committee.

Almost 40,000 specialty license plates emblazoned with the Texas A&M University logo have been sold to date, making it the best-selling plate.

Make Mine Paper, Please

At the super market checkout, they used to ask you if you wanted your items put in paper or plastic bags. They don't ask anymore. They just put your items in plastic sacks about the size of a woman's purse. When you get home to unload, you have about sixty little bags to haul into the kitchen.

What in the world do you do with all those little bags? In our house, we throw most of them away, saving a few to line small trash containers. When we throw them away, we put them in our pantry trash can, which is huge and lined with a heavy duty plastic bag. When it gets full, we tie it up, put it in our big trash container, take it to the curb and the city guys come by and pick it up.

What happens after that is a mystery to me. Why is that in every vacant lot you see about thirty seven of those sacks stuck on scraggly mesquite trees, flapping in the breeze. Where do they come from? I guess people buy some small item in a store that dutifully puts it in a plastic bag. Then when the item is taken out, the bag is discarded, floats around the car for awhile, then ends up blowing out when the car door is open. It is then at the mercy of the wind, which eventually takes it over to those mesquite bushes.

My wife says she notices a great number of city trash containers which have unbagged household trash dumped into them. That drives her crazy. The lids fly open in the wind and all the light garbage escapes. We enjoy the system we have in our town. The city supplies the large containers on wheels which homeowners fill up with trash and roll out to the streets and

alleys twice a week for pickup. It makes for a quick and easy way to get rid of garbage.

Sometimes we take for granted the things that make our life easy. When we lived in Iowa during the sixties, we ran into a different kind of trash disposal system. All the cans had to be in one container. All the bottles had to be in another. There was one for the paper trash. We had to wrap all our food scraps in newspaper before placing it in still another container.

One day there was a knock at the door and the garbage men were there with the supervisor to inform us that we were using too much paper in wrapping our food scraps and could be subject to a fine. They actually took the time to go through our trash and examine it, confer about it and then make a house call. We mended our ways and from that day on were much more careful about the amount of wrap we used around our table scraps.

Our trash guys don't have time to sweat that small stuff. They do their job quickly and efficiently. They are good at what they do and take pride in their work. We do have a good trash system in Texas. We just need to find a way to keep those plastic bags from getting loose and blowing all over the place.

I know plastic bags are good for the oil industry, which is having its problems right now. They serve a purpose and fill a need. But what happened to those big paper sacks that held so much and were so easy to handle. Spring housecleaning might be a good time to devise some way to make sure those plastic sacks end up somewhere else besides a vacant lot.

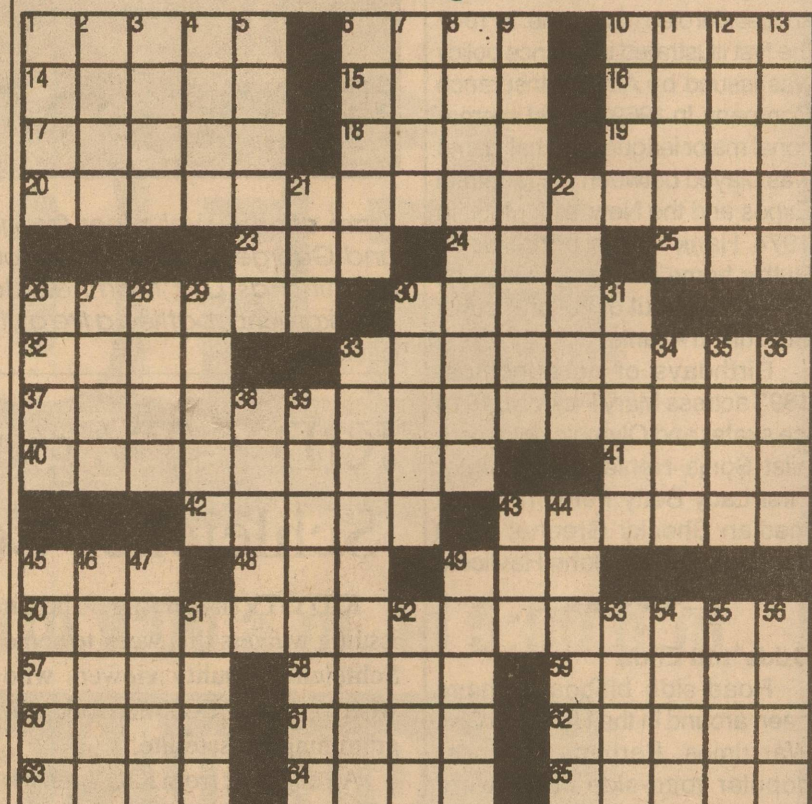


14-13 win over Ozona helps Eagles sweep 1st half of district play

the recipients of 2 forfeit wins from Ft. Hancock who was unable to compete due to eligibility problems.

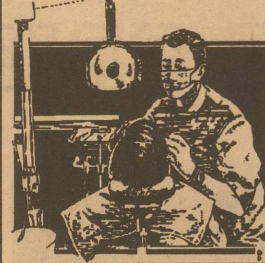

Step and throw — Lady Eagles infielder Tana Williams fielded a grounder a fired it to first base for an out in softball action against Wall here Tuesday night.

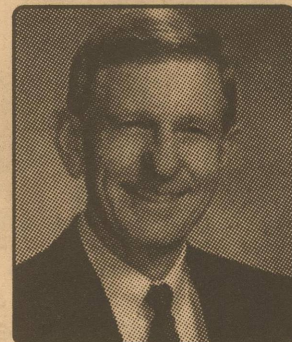

Wildlife enhancement workshop focuses on growing trend

Interest in West Texas wildlife revenue is on the rise. As ranchers and others become more interested and educated on wildlife and recreation matters, their demand for more information increases. A step toward meeting this growing need is a Wildlife Enhancement Workshop scheduled from 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. April 29 at Fort McKavett's Camp Sol Mayer.

The workshop is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Agricultural Committees in Menard and Schleicher Counties. Camp Sol Mayer, a well-known Boy Scouts of America summer camp facility, is located between highway 190 and Fort McKavett on FM 864. The program has been approved for three Continuing Education Units (CEU's) in the "General" category.

The morning's first two speakers are Drs. Dale Rollins and Allan McGinty, both of San Angelo. Rollins, an Extension wildlife specialist, will speak on Brush Sculpting, the art of strategically removing brush from pastures to enhance its aesthetic, wildlife and livestock value. McGinty, an Extension range specialist, will talk on the popular Brush Busters program he helped originate. The procedures use the best, cheapest and safest methods available to remove individual noxious woody plants and prickly pear.

A break is scheduled at 10:00 a.m. followed by "Range Management 101" with Steve Nelle, Carol Green and Charles Anderson. All

three men are with the Natural Resources Conservation Service in San Angelo, Eldorado and Menard respectively.

Raymond Jaramillo, Game Warden from Menard will wrap-up the morning program with an update on game laws.

A catered barbecue lunch is scheduled at noon.

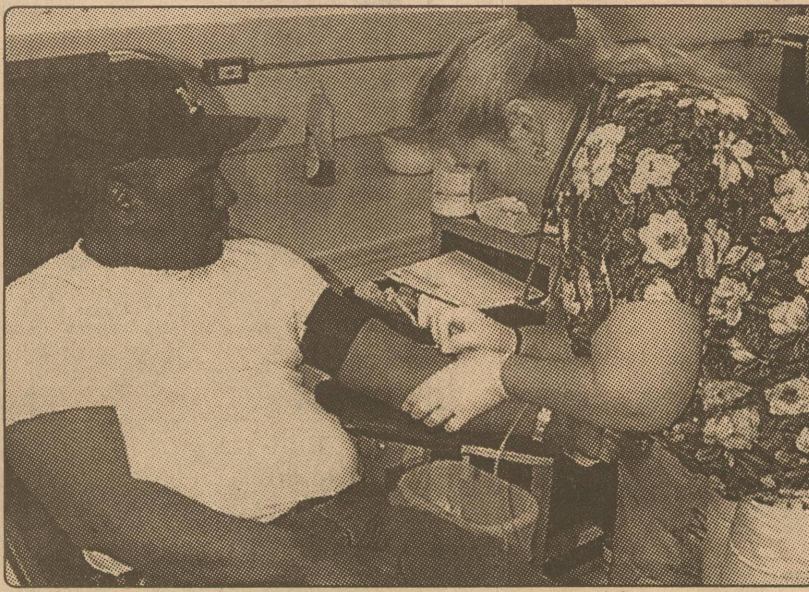

Focus on the Family

Human chemistry goes haywire during adolescence

QUESTION: My teen-age son is becoming increasingly difficult to get along with. Isn't there some way to avoid this black-out period and the other stresses associated with the adolescent voyage?

DR. DOBSON: Not with some teen-agers, perhaps not with the majority. Tension occurs in the most loving and intelligent of families. Why? Because it is driven by powerful hormonal forces that overtake and possess boys and girls in the early pubescent years.

I believe parents and even some behavioral scientists have underestimated the impact of the biochemical changes occurring in puberty. We can see the effect of these hormones on the physical body, but something equally dynamic is occurring in the brain. How else can we explain why a happy, contented, cooperative 12-year-old suddenly becomes a sulen, angry, depressed 13-year-old? Some authorities would contend that social pressure alone accounts for this transformation. I simply don't believe that.

The emotional characteristics of a suddenly rebellious teen-ager are rather like the symptoms of premenstrual syndrome or severe menopause in women, or perhaps a tumultuous midlife crisis in men. Obviously, dramatic changes are going on inside! Furthermore, if the upheaval were caused entirely by environmental factors, its onset would not be so predictable in puberty.

The emotional changes I have described arrive right on schedule, timed to coincide precisely

with the arrival of sexual maturation. Both characteristics, I contend, are driven by a common hormonal assault. Human chemistry apparently goes haywire for a few years, in some more than others, affecting mind as much as body.

QUESTION: I made a little offhanded comment the other day about my daughter's hair, and she cried for an hour. I didn't mean to hurt her. I guess she's just more sensitive than I thought. Do I have to walk on eggshells around her?

DR. DOBSON: You should always be mindful that your daughter is listening to what you say about her and that she's "reading" the subtle attitudes you might like to conceal. Kids are extremely sensitive to their parents' love and respect. That's why adults must learn to guard what they say in their presence.

Many times I have been consulted by a mother regarding a particular problem her child is having. As Mom describes the details of the boy or girl's problems, I notice that the subject of all this conversation is standing about a yard behind her. His ears are 10 feet tall as he listens to a candid description of all his faults. The child may remember that conversation for a lifetime.

Parents often inadvertently convey disrespect to a child whom they genuinely love. For example, Mom may become tense and nervous when little Jimmy speaks to guests or outsiders. She butts in to explain what he is trying to say or laughs nervously when his remarks sound foolish. When someone asks him a direct question, she interrupts and answers for him. She reveals her

frustration when she is trying to comb his hair or make him "look nice" for an important event. He knows Mom thinks it is an impossible assignment. If he is to spend a weekend away from the family, the mother gives him an extended lecture on how to avoid making a fool of himself. These subtle behaviors are signals to the child that the mother doesn't trust him with her image and that he must be supervised closely to avoid embarrassing the whole family. He reads disrespect in her manner, though it is framed in genuine love.

The first step in building a strong self-concept in your child is to be very careful what you say and do in his or her presence. Be particularly cautious about the matters of physical attractiveness and intelligence. These are two primary "soft spots" where boys and girls are most vulnerable.

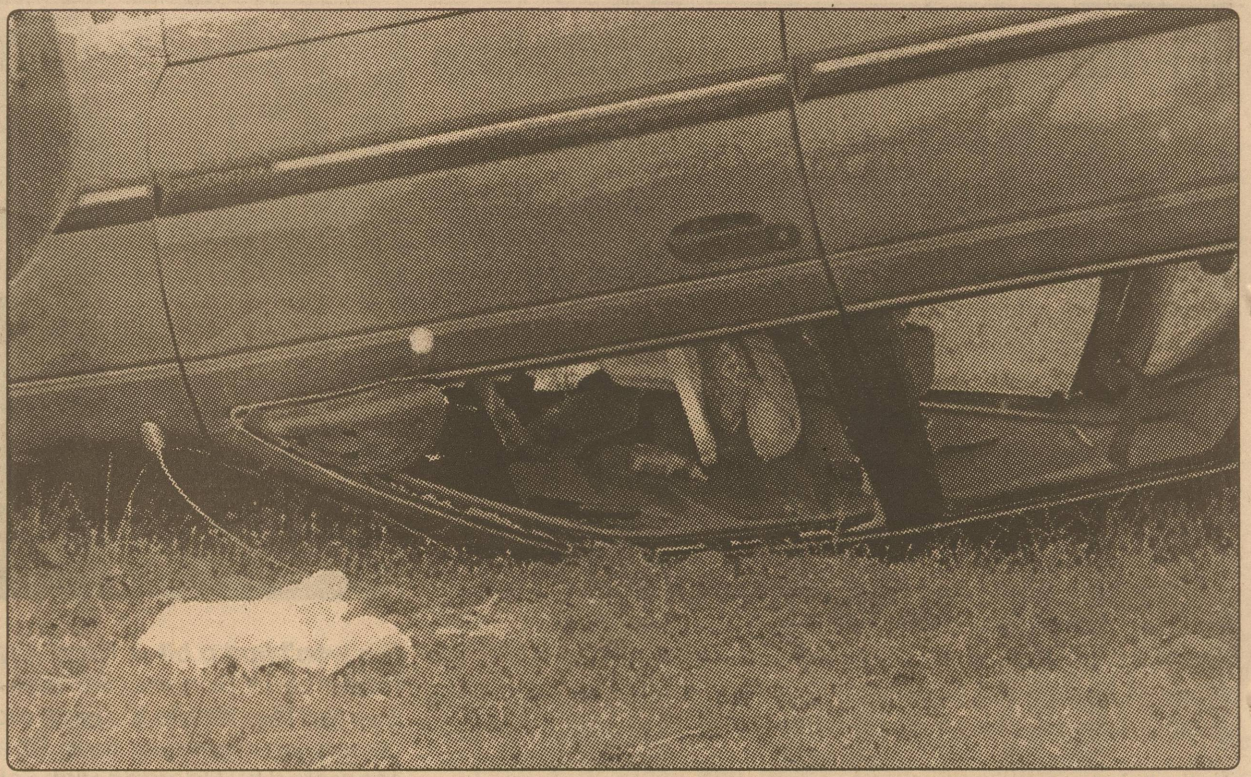

Local college students listed in Who's Who

Jennifer Marshall and Pepper Nix of Eldorado are among the 80 students from Angelo State University who have been included in the 1999 edition of Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges.

Marshall, a senior majoring in early childhood education, and Nix, a junior majoring in history/social studies at the University, were selected by campus nominating committees and editors of the annual directory based on their academic achievements, service to community, leadership attributes in extra-curricular activities, and potential for continued success.

The ASU students honored in this year's edition of the annual directory join an elite group, selected from more than 1,900 institutions of higher learning in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and several foreign nations. Outstanding students have been honored in the annual volume since its initial publication in 1934.

Federal charge filed in Bald Eagle shooting case

In a case similar to one currently under investigation in Schleicher County, a Lake Palestine resident has been charged with shooting a Bald Eagle. Fred Lee Sparks, 51, was charged by the U.S. Attorney's office in Tyler with the unlawful taking of an endangered or threatened species. If convicted, Sparks could face penalties of a fine of up to \$100,000, a prison sentence of up to one year, or both.

"Texas game wardens and agents from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service worked together closely on this case," remarked Jim Robertson, Texas Parks and Wildlife Law Enforcement Director. "The combined investigative skills of Texas game wardens Mike Warren, Tony Norton, Kenneth Head and Mike Pike along with special agent Steve Hamilton of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service were integral in gathering enough evidence to formally charge the subject. The case has now been turned over to the U.S. Attorney's office for prosecution."

Sparks is accused of shooting the immature bald eagle which was sitting in a tree near his residence on Feb. 10, according to the affidavit filed in federal court in Tyler.

The eagle was found struggling on the ground that morning by two men who were installing cable in the area. When the men realized that the bird had been shot, they contacted game wardens from the TPW Tyler office.

The young eagle, believed to be female, is being cared for at the Last Chance Forever raptor rehabilitation center in San Antonio. Staff veterinarian Dr. Melissa Hill says that the eagle sustained injuries to the leg and wing, resulting in a broken wing and some bone loss. Although the bird is "alert and spunky" it is not known at this time whether the bird may be re-released to the wild.

"It is important to note that an information is merely a charge and should not be considered as evidence of either guilt or innocence," noted Duncan Woodford, public information officer for the U.S. Attorney's Office in Beaumont.

Game wardens who worked on

the investigation include: Commander Larry Williford, Capt. Robert Carlson, Mike Warren, Kenneth Head, Mike Pike and Tony Norton. Also involved in the case were USFWS Special Agents and personnel of the National Fish & Wildlife Forensics Laboratory in Ashland, Oregon.

Locally, a Bald Eagle was found on October 14th of last year, hanging between the Eldorado High School field house and the football field. A sign affixed to the dead bird appeared to taunt the EHS football team, whose mascot is a Bald Eagle.

Special Agent Curtis Graves of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service was called in to investigate the case and a reward of \$2,500.00 was offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the culprit.

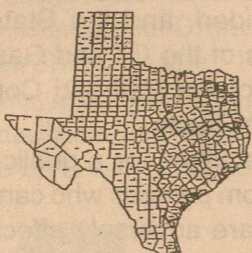
