out lightly as expected Saturday in the states to outlaw the poll tax as the Amendment election, and went a pre-requisite for voting for fedalong with the rest of the state of eral officials in national elections, Texas in rejecting the proposed amendment that would have done states approve it as expected beaway with the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting.

Schleicher voters turned the poll tax repealer down by a vote of 158 to 71, and the amendment also failed to pass on the state level. Our citizens voted as follows on Amendment 1 (poll tax repeal):

In regard to the three other proposed amendments, the local total

vote was as follows: 2. Welfare Payments increase: Approval 130, Against 92. 3. Jefferson County Pensions:

Approval 60, Against 144. 4. Veterans Land Fund: Approval 131, Against 90.

Rejection by Texas voters of the poll tax was reported to have 'stunned" state officials headed by Governor Connally who were on the record as favoring the amendment. Also the daily press, overall, was in favor of voters approving the proposal.

The local sheriff's office has started sale of poll taxes and deadline for this will be Jan. 31st, as usual. You will still need the poll tax receipt in order to vote throughout 1964 in Democratic or Republican primaries, school trustee, and city alderman elections, in addition to any special elections that might be called.

Persons who wish to vote in the

ational election in November of

1964 and who have not paid their poll tax, will vote using a "bobtailed ballot" with just the federal races on it (President, Vice-President, Senator, Congressman). All races from state governor down Eldorado. will be marked out. Such voters, too, will have to be otherwise qua lified to vote, having lived in the state a year, in the county six months, be at least 21 years of age and be a citizen. These are the same requirements of voters who pay the poll tax each year by Jan. 31st and thus qualify themselves to vote.

Back-tags and glue is available at the county agent's office.


