## Edwin M. Jackson Dies At Age Of 66; Funeral Services Held Here Monday

Edwin Jackson, 66, well-known Schleicher county ranchman, civic leader and political figure, died Sunday morning at 12:45 a.m., from a heart attack. The fatal attack followed two other severe heart attacks in the preceding week.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Monday at the First Presbyterian church conducted by the pastor, Rev. Dan Sebesta.

Interment was made in Eldorado cemetery under direction of Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home.

Pall bearers were: B. L. Blake-way, John Mayo, Jack Montgomery, Bernard Carr, Bob McWhorter, L. L. Baker, R. J. Page, and Jack Hext.

A Schleicher county rancher for 30 years, Mr. Jackson was identified in a number of fields—civic, political and religious. An active member of the First Presbyterian church, he was also county Democratic chairman.

Mr. Jackson was president of the Mohair Institute of America and chairman of the International Wool and Mohair Committee of the San Antonio Livestock Exposition.

He was a director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

Edwin M. Jackson was born Sept. 23, 1897 at Round Rock, Tex., the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Jackson. He was married to Winnie Barnett on Sept. 21, 1921 and moved to Eldorado in 1934.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Edwin M. Jackson Jr. of Eldorado; his mother, Mrs. J. T. Jackson Sr. of Menard; a brother, J. T. Jackson Jr., sister, Mrs. Curtis Stockton, three grandchildren, Sherwin, Cindy and Edwin M. Jackson III, all of Eldorado.

## Oil News

Ever since February 27 when Forward Oil & Gas Co. brought in their No. 1 Case well for 11½ million cubic feet per day, oil men have been speculating on a gas area between there and the T. K. Jones gassers about two miles northwest of Eldorado.

A look at a county map shows that the Case well is about midway between the Roach and T. K. Jones gassers.

Tucker was the first to make an exploratory test when they moved out to the southwest and drilled their No. 1 Schrank. It was abandoned as a dry hole.

Under way in the same area at the present time is the Skelly No. 1 Wade test, which was drilling around 3000 feet early this week.

The Jack Wade test was reported down to a depth of 3460 Tuesday night.

In the meantime Gulf Oil Corp. has announced it will drill two tests in that neighborhood. One will be Gulf No. 1 Sauer, est., which will be 1320 feet from the north and west lines of Sec. 8-LL-TCRR.

The other will be Gulf No. H. J. Case, 660 feet from the south and east lines of 21-TT-TCRR. Both projects are contracted to 8500 feet, sufficient to test the Ellenburger.

As of this week neither of these projects have been started. One unofficial opinion was that the Case well would be drilled first, which would be located close to the Mertzon road.

## Post Script

We found ourselves somewhat bewildered Sunday morning when we first heard of the death of Edwin Jackson. He was often a source of news because he was identified with so many different things.

We remember him as one of the chief actors in the big Lueddecke Day celebration held here nearly seven years ago.

There was his Santa Claus business which he had carried on each Christmas for the past 30 years, traveling over a wide of southwest Texas. Lots of people remember him about that and our waitress at the cafe Sunday mentioned it during our lunch period. "He was always our Santa Claus," she said.

Here at the Success office we dealt with him in his capacity as County Democratic Chairman, and just last week we turned out his ballots for the first primary. These ballots now contain Jackson's name, and will undoubtedly be done over. The county committee will handle that problem.

But that should be the least of the problems brought on by his death. They can't appoint anybody to fill all the other places he filled.

We're all going to miss Mr. Jackson and we extend our condolences to the bereaved family.

We welcome this family to Eldorado and we know their greenhouse project will be watched with a great deal of interest.

Mrs. West is staying in San Marcos with the family.

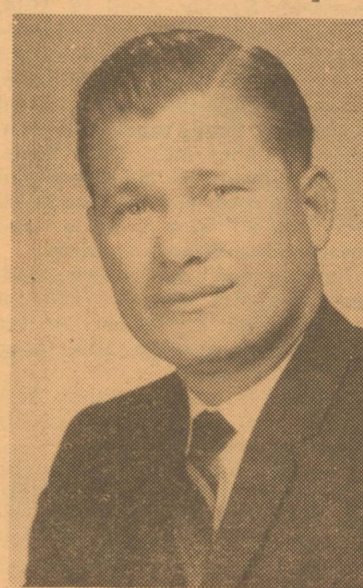
## Alderman Election Held

## Tom Ratliff Assumes Duties Of County Democratic Chmn.

A special meeting of the County Democratic executive committee was held Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of naming a chairman to fill out the unexpired term of Edwin Jackson.

Dick Preston was named executive committee chairman of Precinct No. 1 to succeed Tom Ratliff, who resigned, and Ratliff was appointed County Chairman to succeed the late Mr. Jackson.

The executive committee also ordered changes to be made in the Primary election ballots before they are delivered to the clerk's office for absentee voting next week. The name of Edwin Jackson will be stamped out on the ballot and Ratliff's name will be substituted under the spot for County Democratic chairman. Preston's name will be submitted for Ratliff's as committee chairman on the ballots for voters in precinct No. 1. The ballots were printed over a week ago and are still in the hands of the printer, and will be corrected this week.

# Medallions On Historic Buildings To Be Dedicated Sunday

Dedication of historical markers with appropriate remarks by state officials is on the agenda for this Sunday afternoon when the Schleicher County Historical Society and other interested citizens gather first on the parking lot west of the jail here in Eldorado, and later go to the C-B Ranch in the eastern part of the county.

The program will get under way at 2:00 p.m. when the historical medallion is officially placed on the county jail building. This substantial rock structure, two stories high, is a landmark of Eldorado and Schleicher county.

For many years the lower floor has served as living quarters for the county sheriff and his family while the upper floor with barred windows serves as the jail.

Until a few years ago, there was a tower or cupola on one corner of the building and there were facilities in it to serve as a gallows for executing condemned prisoners.

This was in the early days when each county in Texas was authorized to execute their own condemned prisoners instead of taking them to the state penitentiary at Huntsville as would be done now.

It is understood that the gallows here were never used to execute anyone; apparently the need never arose.

The cupola was removed from the structure several years ago and the county jail building now present a somewhat different appearance from the earlier period.

Don McCormick, long-time local resident, will read a history of the

jail building at the program Sunday afternoon.

Near the jail building, on the parking lot facing the San Angelo highway, is the newly installed marble marker honoring Gustav Schleicher for whom this county is named. It too, will be formally dedicated Sunday afternoon.

State Senator Dorsey Hardeman is to have a part on this phase of the dedication program, and John Ben Shepperd, now of Odessa and former Attorney General of Texas, has indicated that he will also try to be on hand.

Time will be allowed for the local history buffs to make the 35-mile trip east to Fort McKavett to the C-B Ranch for the dedication of the medallion at the north gate of the ranch house.

The ranch house, along with the county jail building, was approved for a historical medallion some time ago by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. These medallions are put on buildings deemed worthy of preservation for future generations.

The Black Ranch was founded and the ranch house erected by Col. William L. Black before Schleicher county was created.

During the War Between the States, Col. Black, a Confederate, was wounded at Shiloh, and later ran the Union blockade to ship cotton to England. He was captured, eventually released, and became the paymaster in the Confederate Navy. He was again captured and imprisoned at Fort Alcatraz where he kept the prison's books and

eventually was pardoned.

In 1872, Col. Black became a charter member of the New York Cotton Exchange. It was while dealing with cotton that the 30,000-acre Texas ranch was purchased. In 1884, he left New York and the cotton business to assume personal charge of his ranch he called the "B. S. Ranch." He also rented an additional 30,000 acres.

In 1927, Col. Black wrote an article in "The Cattleman" entitled "Ranching On Ten Cent Land In

Texas" in which he recalled making the location of 30,000 acres of land back in 1876. Col. Black said in the article:

"I only paid ten cents an acre for the land, and I was thought to be an escaped lunatic from a St. Louis insane asylum, for buying the land and I think my good friend, Billy Bevans of Menard, was one of the old Democrats that had this opinion; but the land suited me, and I thought, with the splendid spring I got with my

purchase, and 300-acre grove of fine pecan trees, it was reasonably cheap."

After first raising cattle and sheep, Col. Black started raising goats. When he found no local market for goats in Iowa, he went into the slaughtering business and established a local cannery. Then he founded a tannery to utilize the hides. For his numerous employees, he built a community of small houses and a general store.

In 1890 he was the Texas dele-

gate to the National Wool Growers' Association. Finally in 1931, the year of his death, he succeeded in establishing a wool exchange.

The ranch first established by Col. Black is still intact and has been owned since 1921 by H. Leslie Jones who now makes his home with his mother, Mrs. Camilla Black Raggio, in San Angelo.

Col. Black erected the ranch house in 1884 and it is on this property that the historical medallion is located.

Mrs. Camilla Black Raggio was one of Col. Black's eight surviving children at the time of his death. Until a few years ago, she and her son, H. Leslie Jones, made their home at the ranch before moving to San Angelo.

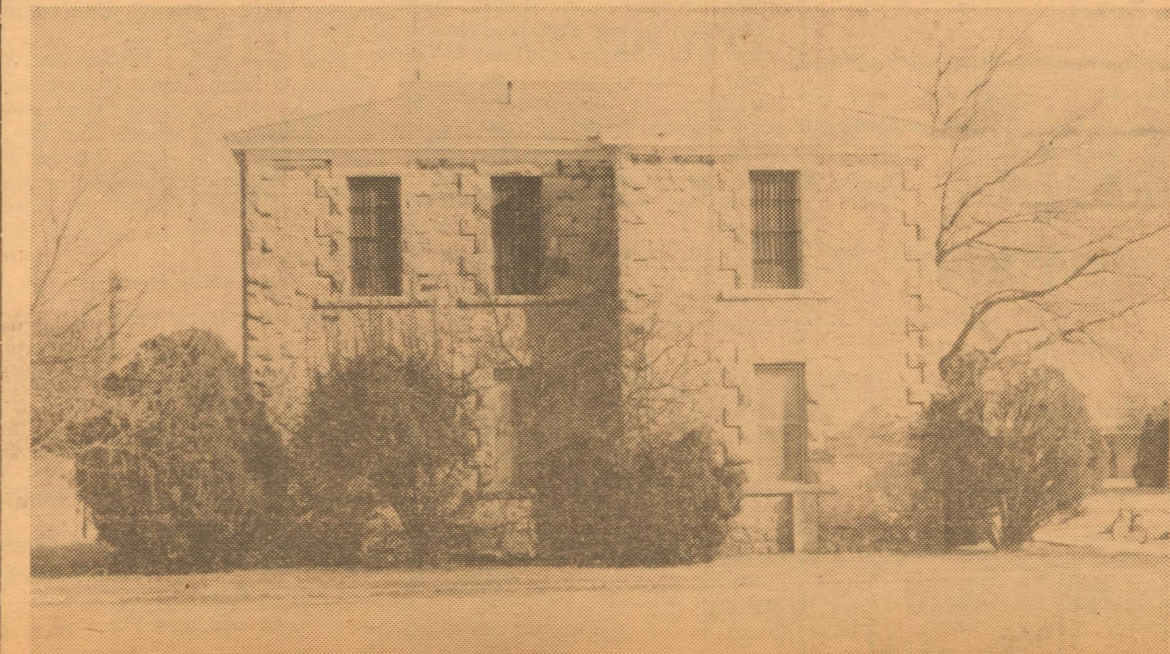
At present, Robert Kelley has the place leased.

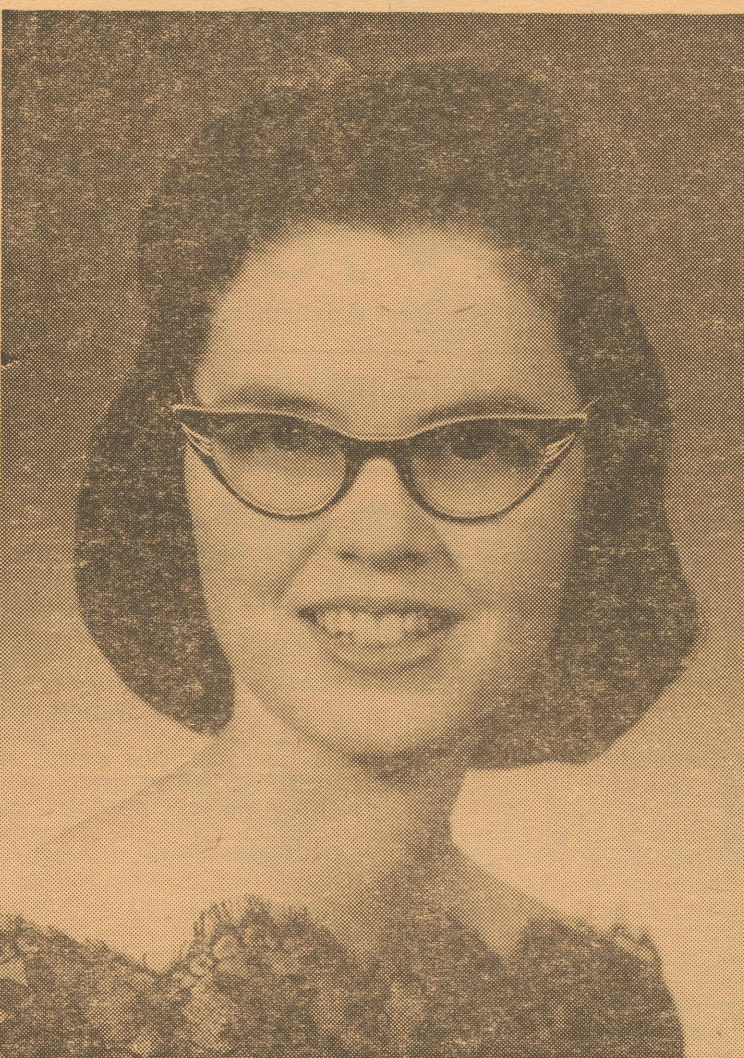
Two other granddaughters, Misses Kay and Lynn Jenkins of Big Spring, will register guests.

## Garden Club Hears Ozona Speaker

Mrs. Bailey Post of Ozona was a featured speaker at the Eldorado Garden Club at Wednesday's regular meeting. Eight members and five guests heard Mrs. Post, a prominent garden club member in the State of Texas, give a stimulating and informative illustrated talk on the native succulent.

"All cacti are succulents, but all succulents are not cacti," Mrs. Post said in her opening statement. She continued with these general rules for the successful growing of cacti and succulents: choose hardy plants to start with; don't waste time on a sickly plant; always examine plants for mealy bugs before taking them in ones garden; buy mixed soil or make your own as it's easily done by adding equal parts of garden soil, decayed leaf mold and coarse sand.

Following the instructions on growing cacti and succulents Mrs. Post made an attractive arrangement from native greenery and flowers.

On showing leaves which had been cured into a colorful and pliable state, she told the group that anti-freeze and water make a solution for curing leaves which was much cheaper and just a good as glycerin. The formula called for one third part anti-freeze and two thirds parts water. Loquat, shumac, photenia, laurel and many other leaves are kept for years after the curing process.

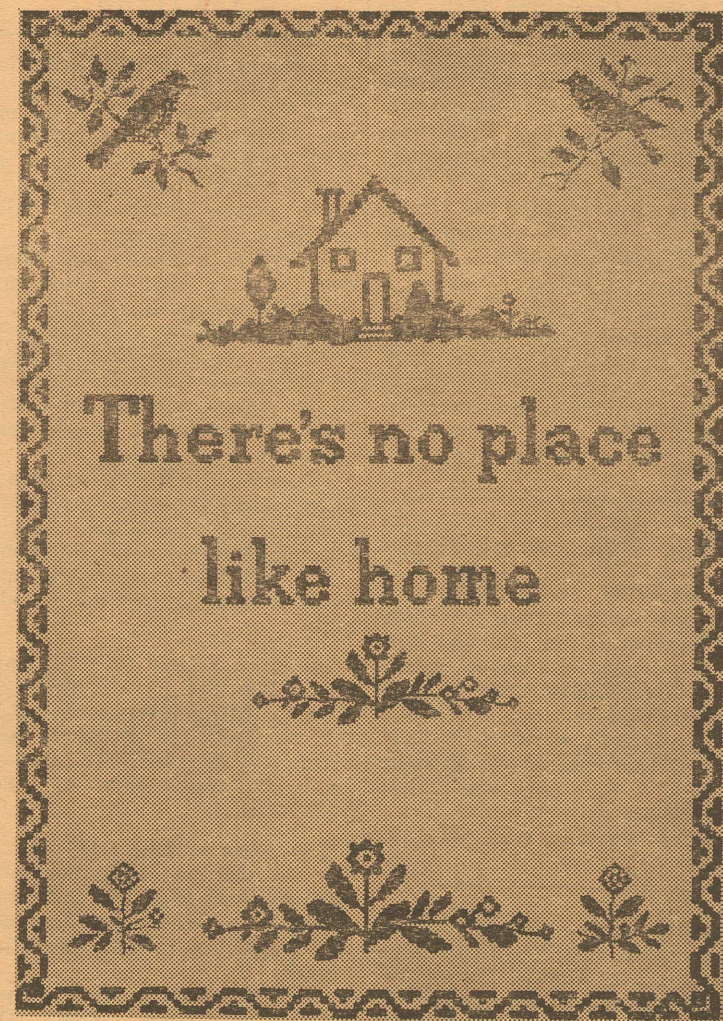
### BROWNIE TROOP MEETS

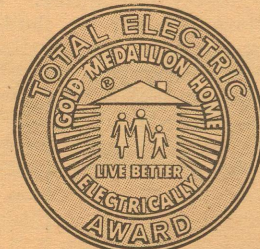

### Soil Stewardship Week Observance

The materials were prepared by the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, in cooperation with a Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee composed of leading churchmen in the nation.

Members of the Eldorado-Divide Conservation District Stewardship Committee are Ben Hext, Murton Shurley and Otis Deal.

Through the 1964 theme and in the attractively illustrated booklet, emphasis is placed upon the fact that there is a clearcut need and opportunity to improve upon the conservation, wise use, and development of the nation's valued soil and water resources. In this year's booklet each citizen is asked to consider his share—

"In the great Society of mankind, (since) each of us has a God-given purpose for being. In our time each among us fulfills a mission in the long progression toward the ultimate design of our Maker. "To each among, God has assigned a share in the expanding brotherhood of stewards. It is a membership of service, dedicated to the husbandry of lands and waters, forests and ranges, and the fish and game He has placed at our disposal."

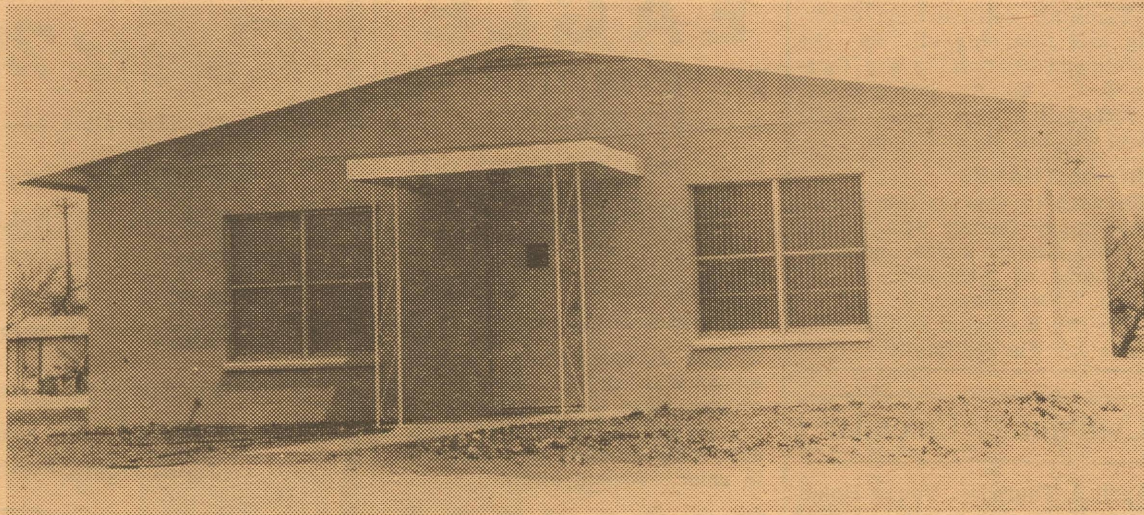
#### JIMMY DAN IS FOUR

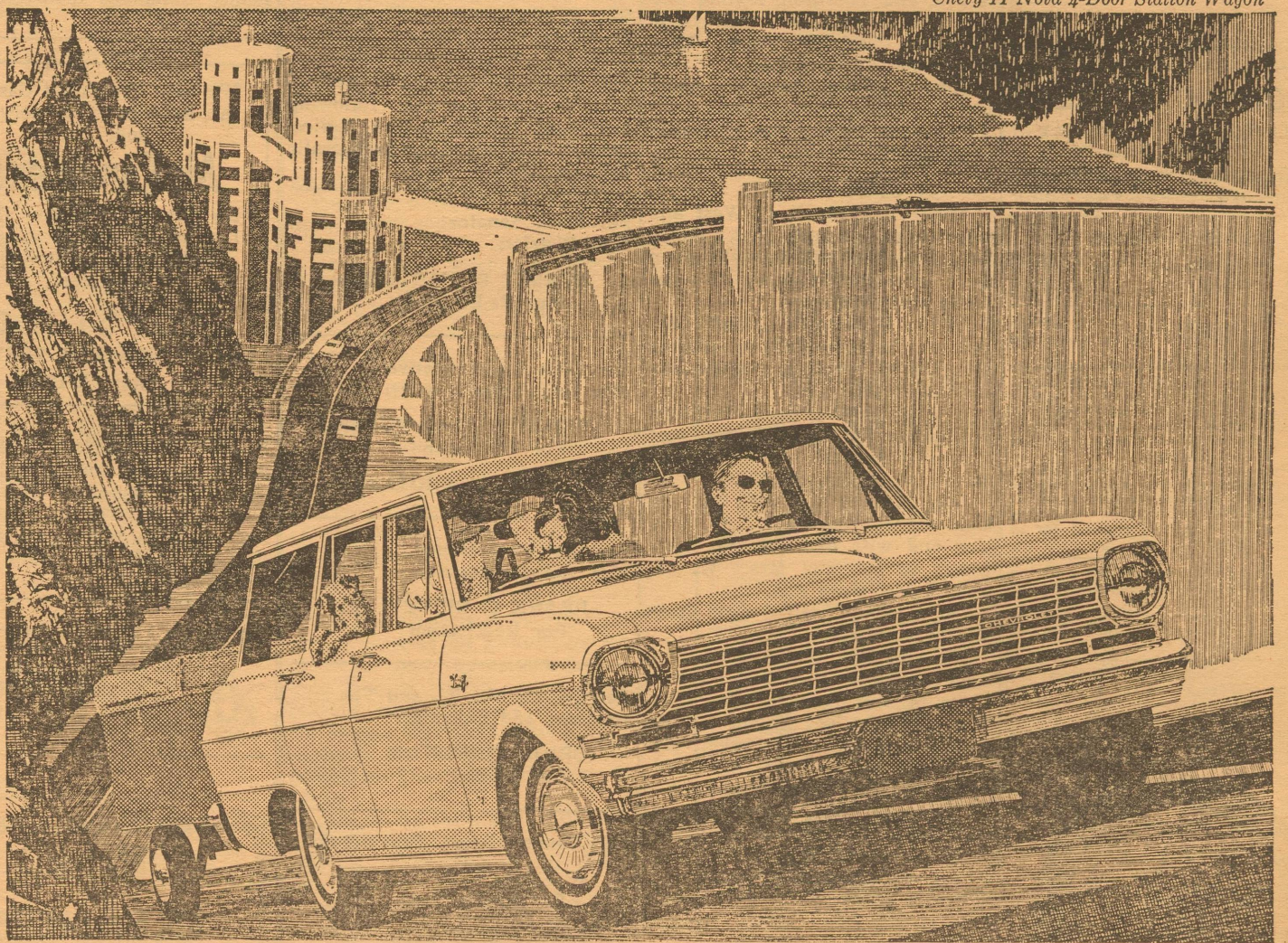

**Old Masonic Hall Holds Many Memories**



When the current officers of the Masonic Lodge meet in the old hall tonight for the last time to begin their stated meeting, and then recess to continue the meeting in the newly completed temple, they will be leaving behind many memories in the landmark frame structure that has stood on Eldorado's South Main street for well over half a century, and which has been associated with the town and county development all that time.

B. E. Earle, early druggist here in Eldorado, built the structure with the Masons back in about 1909. Mr. Earle sold out to L. M. Hoover who operated his drug store in the lower floor for many years until he built his new building before the start of World War II.

Ernest Finnigan's Western Auto store and the Eldorado Success newspaper and publishing business were subsequent occupants of the lower floor. Since the Success moved out four years ago, the lower floor has been used for storage.

Doctors maintained offices in the side rooms some years ago.

The upper rooms which face Main Street housed the telephone

offices and switchboard until 1923. That year, the late John Y. Rust arranged sale of those rooms to the Masons.

Eldon Calk bought the lot the building is on and the lower floor of the building a while back from Mr. Hoover and it is understood that he is to gain title, too, to the upper floor.

Orval Edmiston and his building committee formally accepted the new temple from the contractor last Friday.

An open house in the new temple will be held in the near future. At that time the public will be invited to come and see the building. A formal dedication program in which Grand Lodge officials will participate, will probably be held in the summer. All these arrangements are still pending as the transition is taking place from the old quarters to the new.

District Deputy Grand Master E. B. Keng of Sonora is expected to be on hand tonight, and all other Masons have been urged to try to attend.

The regular meeting of the Eastern Star chapter will be held this coming Monday night in the new hall.

**Home Demonstration Agent's Column**

We are a country of beef eaters. Beef and potatoes — that's what we say we like. But, the homemaker is asking for a special kind of beef these days. She wants less fat, which means more lean, and she wants less wasteful cuts. She not only wants this new kind of beef, she is telling the whole industry about it and as usual when the customers hollers loud enough somebody listens.

That's why the beef industry is looking for ways to produce a trim, high quality beef carcass at moderate cost. It may take a few years but they will do it.

Beef is in abundance right now (the over the counter price may not reflect the fact yet but it is), and there's dozens of ways to prepare meat other than the ever present roast and the never ending hamburgers.

Mrs. Orville Freeman, wife of the Secretary of Agriculture, says that her favorite recipe is a pot roast made with round steak.

Chuck steak will do just about as good and costs less. Either will do.

**Mrs. Freeman's Pot Roast**  
Brown 2 pounds round steak in a heavy frying pan or roaster. Sprinkle over top 1/2 envelope dried onion soup. Spread over this one can undiluted Cream of Mushroom Soup. Cover Pan. Bake at 300 F. for about 2 1/2 hours, or until tender. Serves four. (Warning: Use only a tiny bit of salt; the onion soup is salty!)

It just does not pay to save flower seeds today. Many of the most beautiful are F1 hybrids and you can't save from them. The second generation goes back to the general characteristics possessed by the original parents.

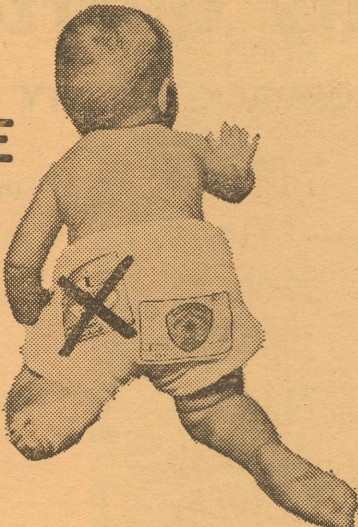

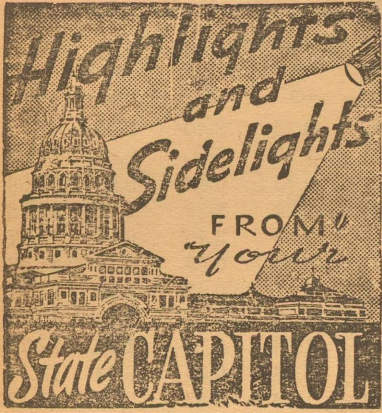

Austin.—A mighty head of tension which had built up at the state capitol eased as the Houston federal court agreed to postpone effect of its congressional redistricting order until the next elections.

Top Democratic officials and members of the Legislature kept close watch on the news wires out of Houston as they sweated out the decision following four days of hearings and argument.

Their optimism had wilted in the last 24 hours before the ruling was announced. More than one legislator reportedly had his bag packed ready to return to Austin for a special session.

Gov. John Connally apparently had indicated he would call the session immediately if the court stuck by its original October 19 order for at-large (statewide) elections in all districts unless the Legislature adopted a redistricting bill.

As it is, although the court postponed effective date of its ruling, it kept the case on its docket and will take further action if a constitutional redistricting bill is not passed by August 1, 1965.

Major officials applauded the ruling.

Republicans, who brought the original suit, were disappointed that the equal population-for-each district order will not take effect until congress after next. But they took comfort in the fact that their principal goal was achieved.

Governor Connally said redistricting will be given "highest priority" in the 1965 Legislature and "every attempt will be made to have a thorough redistricting consistent with the opinions of the Supreme Court and the Houston federal court."

Frank C. Erwin Jr., State Democratic executive committee chairman, said redistricting will be the main plank in the State Democratic platform this year.

An "entirely satisfactory" solution will be found by the Legislature next year, predicted Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

George Bush, Republican U. S. Senate candidate from Houston who filed the suit with four other GOP's, said the group would file no appeal since "further delays" would lead to turmoil.

Democratic Congressman at large candidate Bob Looney, an intervenor in the action, didn't agree and promised a new appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court for redistricting this year. He called on Texans to petition Governor Connally for a special legislative session on the subject.

For all practical purposes, the judicial chapter on redistricting is closed for the year. Congressmen will run in their old districts one more time.

Major surgery must be performed on the districts next year. And while they are carving, state legislators in all probability will have to re-divide their own districts. Another suit is pending to force state legislative reapportionment. For lawmakers, that will be even more painful.

**Record Voter List**

There are more Texas voters this year than ever.

A record total of 2,888,183 have paid poll taxes or obtained exemption certificates, the State Comptroller reports.

That's 292,929 more than in 1960, the previous record year, and 533,024 more than in 1962. Even so, the report does not include the free registrations for federal elections or voters over 65 who do not have to get exemptions because they live in cities of less than 10,000 population. Addition of these two categories could swell the qualified voter list to more than 3,000,000.

Eighty-eight percent of the qualified voters cast ballots in the 1960 presidential election. If they turn out at the same rate in this year's presidential general election, more than 2,500,000 votes will be cast.

Texas Republicans, aiming at getting a larger share of those votes, say they will have at least one polling place in every county for the May 2 primary.

**Salt Water Pollution**

Texas Railroad Commission is putting more teeth into its orders against unlined earthen surface pits for salt water disposal.

At last 30 oil leases in the Hubbard Creek watershed have been severed because operators failed to comply with the Commission's no-pit order which became effective for that area on March 1.

The Commission says it will inspect every lease in the watershed. Oil cannot be moved by pipeline or truck while the leases are severed.

**Savings Bonds**

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin has been named chairman of a payroll savings campaign for the purchase of U. S. savings bonds by state employees.

Governor Connally, honorary chairman of the Texas Savings Bonds Committee, named Martin to the post of co-ordinating efforts of state agencies to encourage their employees to buy savings bonds through payroll savings plans.

**Parks and Wildlife**

Texas game wardens and biologists are making a spring survey of wild turkeys in many parts of the state, to get an idea of their population trend. They also have begun their spring squirrel census in counties where the squirrel is an important game species.

Two key regulations for state parks (1) Permit camping and shelter occupancy for a 14-day limit during the regular park season between May 1 and September 13, and (2) Make radios, recorded music and musical instruments subject to a 10 p. m. curfew in picnic, camping, shelter and other overnight facility areas. However, they will be permitted in concession buildings and immediate areas until 11 p. m.

Sheldon Reservoir, a 1,200-acre lake 15 miles northeast of Houston, has been opened to boat and wade fishing.

**Candidates Polled**

Texas State Teachers Association polled legislative candidates on their stand on education and reported they endorsed a \$45 per month pay raise for school teachers and strongly favored five other measures which would benefit Texas schools.

Replies to the questionnaire, sent by TSTA's magazine "Outlook," came from 26 of the 35 Senate candidates and 269 of the 406 House candidates.

**Highway Projects**

Texas Highway Department tentatively approved a \$33.4 million freeway, Interstate 20, through the Fort Worth-Dallas area.

Dallas, Houston and Fort Worth delegations asked approval of highway projects costing \$42 million.

A Rusk county delegation sought \$16 million worth of improvements and a Dawson county group asked the Highway Commission for \$2 million more in the Lamesa area.

**Industry Research Centers Planned**

Governor Connally's Committee on Education Beyond the High School has taken a look at plans to use Texas industries as "great research centers" and to launch brand new types of graduate degree programs.

Committee studied these proposals and 14 others in a recent session as it continued to seek ways to achieve top ranking for the Texas college system by 1975.

Its final meeting, before writing a tentative report, is scheduled for April 18.

**They're Smoking Again**

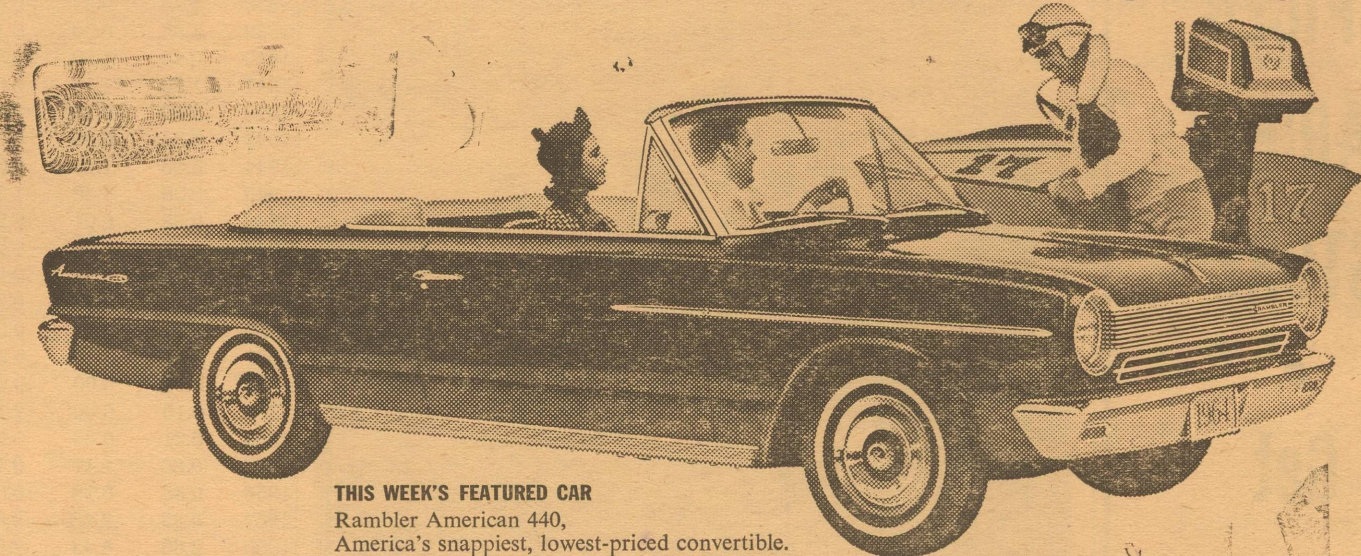
Texans, who showed signs of slowing down on their smoking in February shortly after medical scare reports, are now at it again as heavy as ever.

Tax revenue from cigarette sales dropped sharply after the federal report on smoking dangers was released, jumped nearly \$1.4 million during March, according to State Treasurer Jesse James.

"It looks like they have gone back to smoking," shrugged James. "At least, there's not any big wholesale quitting."

**Bar Seeks To Ban Belli**

Fed up with the antics of bellicose California lawyer Melvin Belli, the Texas State Bar Association is seeking an order from the State Supreme Court to keep him from practicing law in Texas.

Claimed the Bar, in requesting an injunction against the onetime chief defense counsel for slayer Jack Ruby, "(Belli's) conduct has been so grossly and flagrantly unethical, intemperate and abusive in nature as to weaken the administration of justice and to lessen public respect for the courts and laws of this state."

**Jerry Shurley Withdraws From District Race**

Jerry Shurley announced Wednesday that he is withdrawing from the race for State Representative of the 66th District.

Shurley said, "I am very disappointed that I will not be able to continue my race for representative, but recent Texas Supreme Court decisions have prompted officials to remove my name from the ballot in several counties after the question of my eligibility had been raised.

"This is a perfect example of the type of situation that persists in our State. Legislators pass laws to perpetuate themselves in office without giving the people an opportunity to make a choice at the ballot box. Under this law, all office holders at the city, county, state and federal level who receive any compensation for their services in office are disqualified to run for our State Legislature unless they stay out of office for at least one term.

"I will not be able to oppose Mr. Nugent as a candidate for State Representative this year, but I intend to be qualified in 1966 to run for this office unless legislators find another way to disqualify prospective candidates.

"This is exactly the type of condition which I am opposed to in our government, whether in the local, state or federal level. I pledge to the people of this district that if they will send me to Austin in 1966, I will exert every effort to see that legislation such as this is not enacted and that the present law is changed so that voters will not be deprived of a choice of candidates because of technicalities created by the Legislature.

"I want to express my sincerest thanks to the wonderful people who have supported me in this campaign. I have no doubt but that

if I had been allowed to remain in this race, these supporters would have assured my election by a great majority. It is my intention to campaign during the next two years for the office of State Representative from this District and I will appreciate the continued support of these wonderful friends."

**Noisy Turkeys Get Counted**

Austin.—Biologists and wardens are now engaged in a spring survey of wild turkeys in many parts of the state.

This is the season when the turkeys move from their wintering grounds to nesting areas. Old toms, attempting to accumulate their "harems" of nesting hens, gobble frequently in the early mornings and later afternoons.

Census takers, aware of the noisy habits of breeding males begin their 20 mile census runs at daylight. They stop for two minutes of careful listening at each one-mile interval and record all gobbles.

First hand information gained from the survey establishes areas of heavy useage by breeding turkey populations. Continued counts along the census lines may produce information on the number of turkeys in a general area; peak breeding periods; or conditions of the turkey range.

The spring count is a check on the population trend of wild turkeys. Conducted from year to year, it provides a good index to total turkey numbers and is a valuable aid to turkey management.

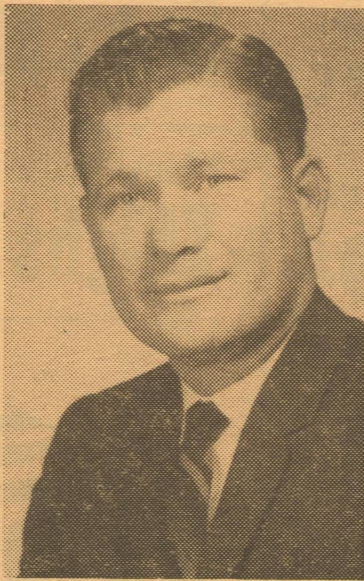




