The Bennie Harkeys will be assisted by some other parents in giving a dance and party to officially close out the year for the 1964 graduating class of Eldorado High school.

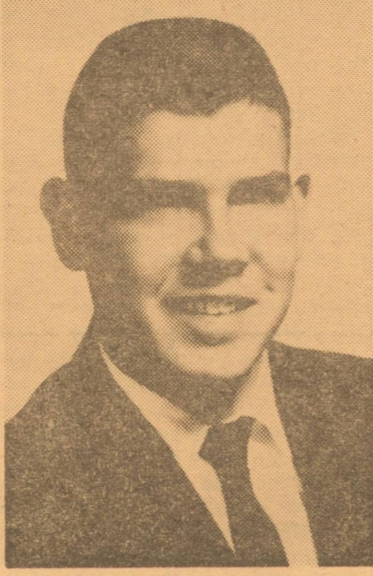


JANE SANDERS

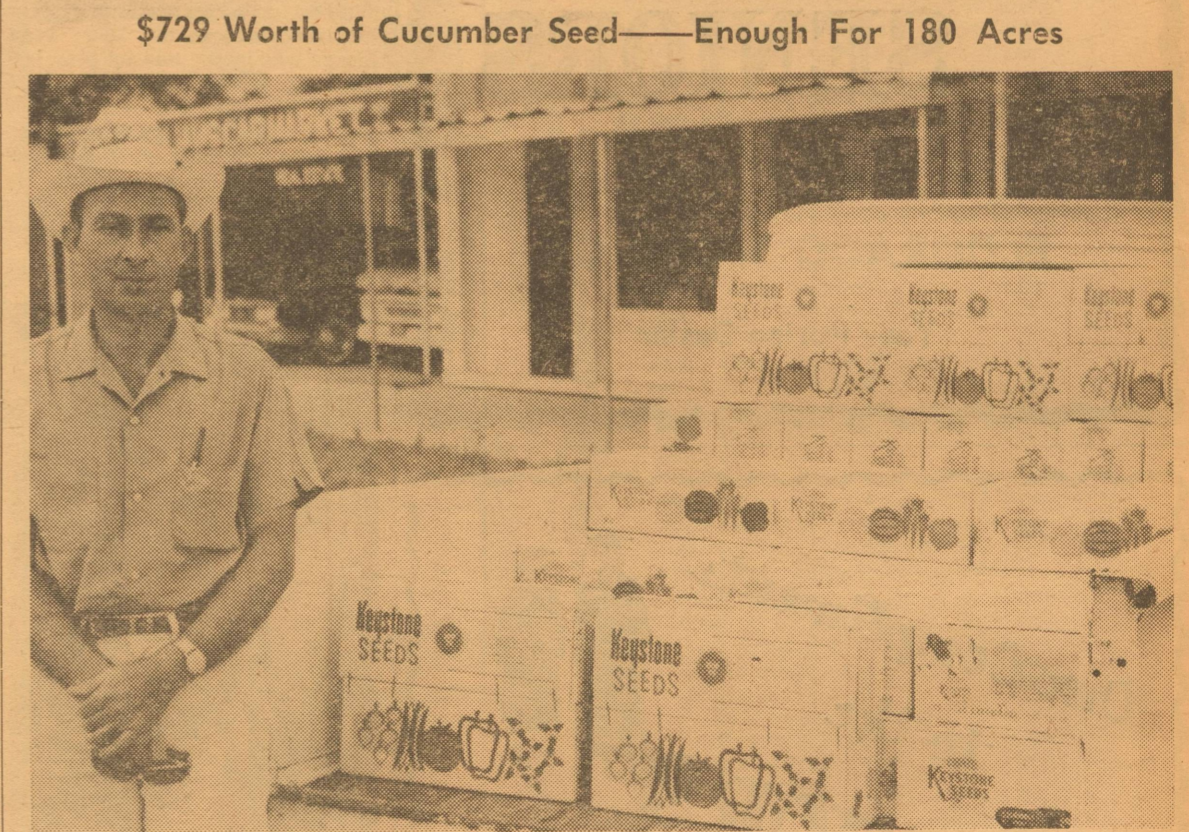
Drivers Ed. Starts June 1

The seed which came from the Brown-Miller company in Texarkana was delivered here last Thursday and since then has been delivered to the local growers.

Seed are tested for germination and are packed in one-pound cans. Each of the above cartons contains 12 cans.

Growers and their acreage as reported yesterday are—

Ben Keel	100 acres
Johno Mayo	20 acres
Leonard Lloyd	20 acres
Bill Moore (Dyer)	5 acres
Clifford Schooley	5 acres
Jack Hext	2 acres

Some of these growers have already planted and others are pre-watering.

Keel planted about 13 acres early this week. After opening 40 cans with a hand opener, he came to town and bought an electric can opener, when he realized he had 240 more cans to go.

All of the growers are expected

to have their seed planted by Monday, May 25, and the project will then be off to a running start. July 12th should see the crop ready for harvest, and for as many as perhaps 500 braceros for stoop labor.

From the time the project was first proposed a few weeks ago, Mr. Keel says he had splendid cooperation and specially wanted to thank Ed Meador, Tiny Godwin and Johno Mayo for the time and effort they contributed.

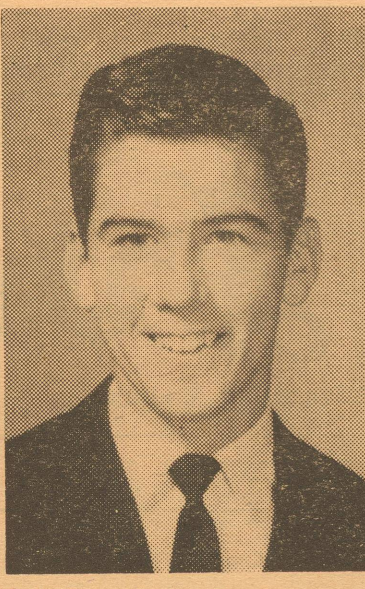

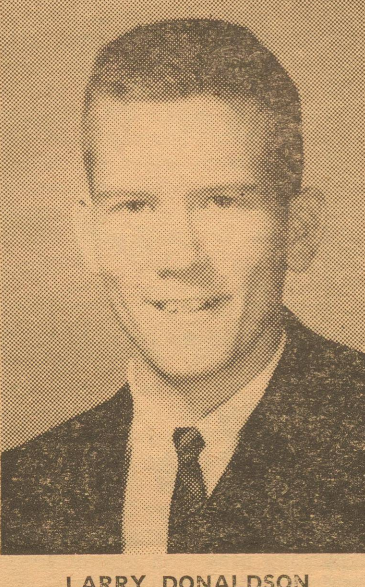

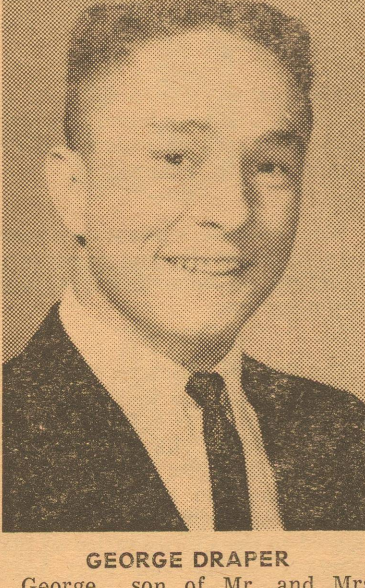
Reynolds H. D. Meets

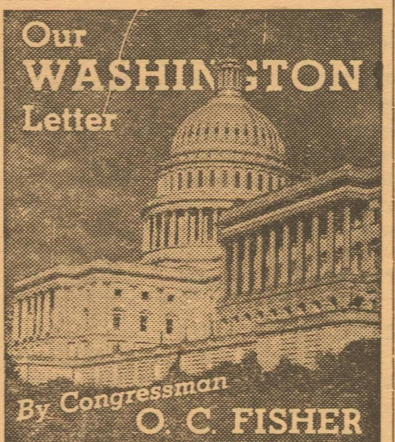
Garden Club Meets And Installs Officers

POVERTY! Poverty! Poverty!
Ah, what sins are committed in thy name!

Anyone who is in favor of poverty should be ashamed of himself. Everyone is against it. And any sensible antidote has a natural and proper appeal. But many remedies recommended for sick patients turn out to be phonies. And that can happen to anti-poverty remedies.

Actually, we have been up to our necks in a so-called anti-poverty war for years. Indeed the combined federal, state and local governments pay out \$40 billion a year now to bolster the income of at least 25 million people, with a wide range of programs.

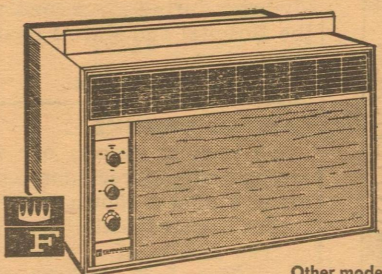
These include old age assistance, social security, food stamps for the needy, school lunches, WPA projects, retraining and rehabilitation programs for disabled and unemployed, unemployment payments (which cost \$2.8 billion a year); aid for the blind, dependent children, widows, and a multitude of others. And we give the Indians \$150 million.

Now, the Congress is asked to fork up \$1 billion for a down payment on another anti-poverty attack, to be added to the other programs. This includes the Kennedy proposals for a new Youth Employment program, a Domestic Peace Corps, and even more of the WPA projects.

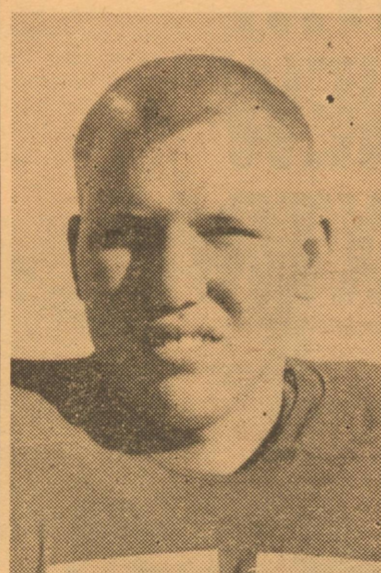

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

The real name for the programs being given to Home Demonstration clubs during May is "Better Home Management." But the thing which interests the women the most is the short cuts or as we call them, "slick tricks" which we demonstrate or pass on to each other.

For instance the other morning at Mrs. Vernon Bailey's home Ann Doyle (Mrs. Jimmy) answered the roll call with this most usable idea. Ann said that before she and Jimmy moved into their new house that the one they lived in needed paint and so they painted it. They slipped plastic bags over their shoes and secured them at the ankles with rubber bands and thus kept their shoes clean of paint.

At a following meeting I told the group what Ann had done and one woman said, "I wish you could have been a little earlier with your hint—I've just done some painting and my best every day shoes are a lovely shade of pink."

Throughout these meetings the central theme which runs all the way through is that good management is simply getting what we want with what we have. What may seem to be excellent management for one may be dismal failure to another.

Regardless of who we are, what we do, where we live or how we make a living all of us have the same three things to manage:

- time
- energy
- money.

Many variations may show up but actually they finally all boil down to the same three things.

Some people have set high standards for themselves; in fact much too high for their own good. On the other hand we set ourselves up in the judgment seat and say the other people have standards which are much too low.

Let me quote from a teacher of mine of a summer or so ago at Colorado University.

Mrs. Louise Crandall said this: "Standards come from our mental image of a finished job. We want to do what we think is important, thus our values help to form our goals. The ability to tell that which is truly important out of all the too many choices which confront us today will determine how satisfactorily we live."

Now—after this exposition on management maybe you can manage to get around to making this most delicious cookie or confection called "Lemon Squares." I am indebted to Mrs. Bill Sims of Merton for this very good recipe. I feel that Mrs. Sims is a real part

of the Extension Service since Bill is the county agricultural agent of Irion county and Mrs. Sims does some wonderful work with the 4-H Clubs in that county.

Miss Myra Tankersley, a good friend and former Home Demonstration agent gave me the recipe at our hat making work shop.

Lemon Squares

Mix in the order listed:
 ¼ cup confectionery sugar
 1/8 tsp. salt
 1 cup flour and ½ cup butter or margarine.

Bake in 8" pan for 15 min. at 350 F. Remove from oven. Spread with mixture below mixed in order listed:

- 1 cup granulated sugar
- ½ tsp. baking soda
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 2 Tbsp. lemon juice and rind of one lemon.

Return to oven and bake 20 minutes longer at 350 F.

When cookie mixture is cold spread with following glaze:

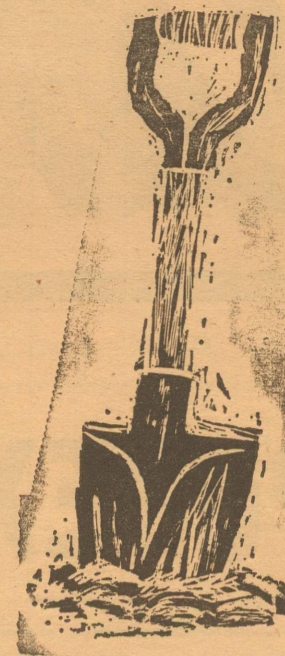
- 2 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 3/4 cup confectionery sugar
- 1 Tbsp. butter

(These freeze well.)

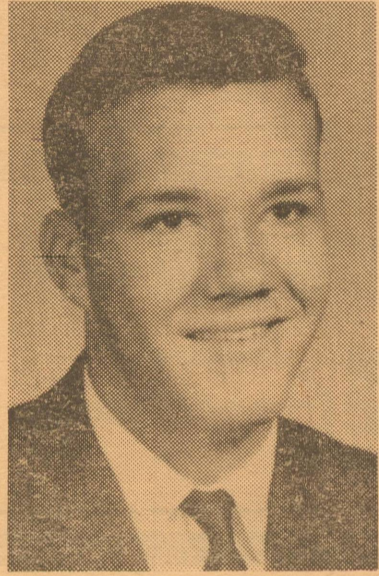

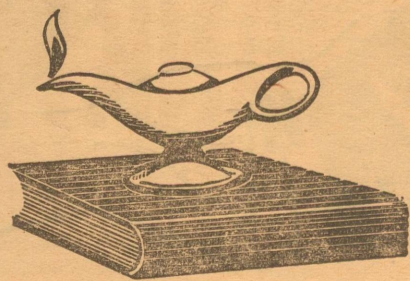

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
