## Colorado Harvest Accident Fatal To Clarence Fish

Funeral services for Clarence Alvin Fish, 54, harvest accident victim, were held at the West Side Church of Christ here at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, July 11.

Mr. Fish, a resident of Eldorado for about four years and a brother of Mrs. W. F. Edmiston, was a custom combine contractor who followed the grain harvest each year from North Texas on up to Northern Montana. He left here in late May with three combines and crew of Eldorado men including Phil Edmiston and Billy Edmiston, taking in the oat harvest around Coleman and continuing on north, through the Panhandle of Texas and on up into Eastern Colorado.

Mr. Fish was killed Wednesday, July 8th ten miles north of Cabin Creek, Colorado. He was working in the fields with his crew when the accident happened. Colorado investigators said he had crawled under the combine to restart the engine. When it started, it was apparently left in gear and rolled over him.

The body was flown to Eldorado and funeral services were held at 10:00 a.m., at the West Side Church of Christ, conducted by Bro. E. B. Cowan assisted by W. W. Sudduth. Interment was in the Eldorado cemetery under direction of the Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home.

He was born May 2, 1910, in Fort McKavett and had lived in Eldorado four years where he and his wife operated the Western


Cameron is the county seat of Milam county and has a population of about 6,000. It is located 53 miles south of Waco and has a double-A school.

#### Fire Department Is Now 25 Years Old; Palmer West Has Remained Chief

As the Eldorado Fire Department was observing the 25th anniversary of their founding Wednesday of this week: they could look back on a quarter century of faithful service to the town and county.

The Fire Department is not planning any special celebration in connection with their Silver Anniversary. but it is a time for taking stock in the progress of the department by the firemen and by the townspeople.

Palmer West was the first and only fire chief. He and Jack Kerr went to a short course at A&M just before the local department was founded that July day in 1939. Previously, around 1932 or '33,

Eldorado merchants set up a forerunner of the fire department when they bought a 40-gallon chemical extinguisher, which was hand drawn. When it was needed, citizens spread the alarm as best to fight the fire.

July 15, 1939, is the date of the first recorded meeting of the Eldorado Fire Department. 

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


# Palo Duro Canyon State Park

Etched deeply in the high plains of the Panhandle, just south of Amarillo, lies a spectacular gorge, widely renowned for its scenic beauty. This is Palo Duro Canyon, a great 15,000 acre state park of Texas. You enter it on a road which winds for miles along the bottom of the vast gorge. You see many remarkable formations such as the "Lighthouse" and "Balanced Rock" which have been formed by centuries of erosion which created the Canyon. As you drive slowly along the Canyon's beauty is enhanced by constant changes in delicate coloring. Coronado explored the Canyon in 1541, and in 1876 Col. Goodnight drove the first wagon train down a huge rock slide into its great gulf. Palo Duro Canyon is easily reached on major highways through many of our towns, and is a high spot in places to go and things to see in General Telephone Country.


