Unofficial reports from the Meadco well is that it was making about 2 million cubic feet of gas and a certain amount of distillate. More wells are to be drilled in the area according to the same report.



According to Department of Health, Education and Welfare officials on the Civil Rights Law, all the answers won't be known until new regulations are drawn late this month.

But the law has been interpreted as banning federal aid to segregated facilities.

Texas schools now get about \$30 million a year in federal money for such programs as the national defense education act, vocational education, school lunch and milk program and aid to districts where federal installations bring in a large number of pupils.

HEW personnel indicate "tenof Title VI (of the Civil Rights Law) will require assurance from local school boards of compliance or intention to comply before federal funds will be awarded.'

County Game Warden Bill Works reports that a recent survey made in this county shows that the dove population has tripled over what it was a year ago. This will be good news for

The Treasury has issued two four-page leaflets—one of Series E Bonds and the other on H bonds -containing basic information any bond owner might like to have. Here's what they say about taxes:

"INTEREST is subject to Federal income tax but not to state or local income taxes. The BONDS are subject to estate, inheritance, gift, and other excise taxes-both Federal and State—but are exempt from all other taxation imposed on the principal or interest by any State, U. S. possession, or local taxing authority."

Recommended Reading for This Week: A new book to be published soon by Bobbs-Merrill treats of the unusual Port Royal Experiment of 1861 when Federal troops occupied the Sea Islands of South Carolina. More than 10,000 slaves were left on the islands by their Confederate masters who fled before the invading army. According to the author, Willie Lee Rose in her book "Rehearsal for Reconstruction," this was the first opportunity for Northern interests to gain status for the slaves and her treatment of the delicate subject is a praiseworthy one.

In 1963, 657 antelope with 227 legal bucks were counted, but this year only 348 head with 106 bucks were tallied.




