On New Water Well

Drilling started Tuesday on a new city water well to forestall water shortages of the future, as the one of 1964 apparently was at an end.

Leonard Lewis of Menard set up his rig Tuesday on the city property just west of town, near the waterwokrs, with plans to drill to a depth of about 600 feet, if necessary.

The well will cost the city \$3.50

per foot, including casing. Lewis stopped drilling Wednesday morning to case off the waterbearing stratum with supplies the present city wells.

It is expected that about a week will be required to drill to the projected depth, if it is necessary to go that far. —Menard News.



from hands by rubbing with a piece of lemon dipped in salt. A brisk scouring with tablesalt will remove the most stubborn tea stains in your teacups.

The greasiest iron pan will wash easily after you have put a little salt in and wiped it with paper. Unpainted breadboards and cutting boards will clean lighter and brighter if rubbed with a cloth dipped in table salt after their regular soap and water washing. While you are still in the kitchen you may remove stains and discoloration from china and earthenware by rubbing them with a alted cloth moistened with water. If you have been so busy cleaning up stains with salt that you let your coffee cook too long-try a little salt in that coffee and it

will take out the bitter taste. Stained carpets may often be cleaned with salt alone. Grease stains which regularly occur near the dining table may be removed by sprinkling with salt and rubbing vigorously. Several applications may be necessary to remove the grease stains. Soot and dirt stains near the doorways may be removed the same way. Older stains may be cleaned considerably by rubbing with a salt and water paste. Freshness may be restored to the whole carpet area by wiping with a cloth or sponge which has been dipped in a strong salt solution and wrung out to remove excess moisture.

If there's a hard-to-clean yellow stain on the wash bowl or bathtub, you might try a solution of salt and turpentine to restore the whiteness. Apply with a washing cloth.

And in the attic, remember that beautiful antique vase that is all stained? Try a cleansing solution of salt and vinegar, let it stand for a few hours, then shake vigorously and rinse with clean water. Most anywhere in the house you are liable to have a piece of furniture marred by a heat-stain left after a hot cup or utensil was placed without protective cover for the furniture. Most heat stains will respond to this treatment: Apply a thin paste of salt and salad oil, let stand an hour, then remove. * ** *

a feeling of apathy. With the fall bloom. months coming along, which in the past has been the beginning of our fall buildup in the number of cases, extra precaution needs to be taken by everyone in inspecting livestock and submitting worm samples for identification. An

extra concentrated effort to treat all man-made wounds when they occur should be made by livestock producers to prevent possible inestations. Other wounds should be reated as quickly as observed. Every single case that can be prevented brings the eradication program nearer to a successful completion.

Be courteous to all, but intimate with few, and let those few be well tried before you give them your confidence.

Does ingestion of minute residues of agricultural chemicals create a hazard to well-being? Is the use of pesticides to control insects on our livestock and crops necessary? These questions are worrying many persons who are neither frantic nor food faddists. The pesticide issue deserves some

factual answers. For the past ten years the average population of the U.S. has been about 150 million. 450 million meals are eaten each day in homes, in restaurants, trains and planes for a total of 165 trillion meals, yet in this time the U.S. Public Health Service, which montors the incident of illness, has been unable to substantiate even one case of serious illness caused by residue caused by consumption of permissible residue on animals

or crops. We consume every day crops that have required chemical protection from insects and plant diseases, just as we consume frequently other chemicals prescribed by medical doctors to cure or alleviate our body ills-and for precisely the same reason: less potent products will not get the job done. Farmers do not spend money without reason. The American people have made

the decision. Accept minute chemical residue or reject the benefits of pesticides and resign us to short supplies and high food costs. There are only two choices. doubt that Americans will choose malnutrition status of peoples in less fortunate countries. Consumer is a word that includes all of us. With the Public Health Service on the job and the Extension Service enlarging the staffs on pesticide education to the public, don't worry about raw and processed foods.




