Texas Christian University and The University of Texas hold the record for largest crowd at a regular season game. In 1996 the two teams played at the Ballpark in Arlington in front of a crowd of 21,043.

Meanwhile, three of the top four teams in the nation in home game average attendance were from Texas. The University of Texas placed second with 4,847, Texas A&M was third with 4,727, while Texas Tech was fourth with 4,341.





State reduces homeowners insurance benchmark rates

AUSTIN — Insurance Commissioner Jose Montemayor on April 10 reduced homeowners insurance benchmark rates by a statewide average of 6.6 percent.

Montemayor also ordered a 3.4 percent reduction in renters insurance statewide. The insurance industry had requested a 6.6 percent increase, but the Texas Departof Public Insurance Counsel, a state agency representing consumers, recommended rate reductions.

New benchmark rates will take effect June 15, but policy premiums may not change for every policy holder, because rate-regulated companies set their own rates within a 30 percent range above or below benchmark in each of the 23 rating territories in the state.



Plan Cuts Health Care Costs

Needy families will pay no more ment of Insurance and the Office than \$18 a month or \$10 for office visits under the state's new Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). Prescriptions would cost \$1 to \$10.

Applications are available now through the Texas Health and Human Services Commission.

The program is open to children under 19 whose families have an annual income of no more than twice the poverty level, or \$34,100 for a family of four.

Nearly one-fourth of Texas' 5.8 million children do not have health

insurance, and Texas ranks 49th in Other Highlights the percentage of children with health insurance, ahead of only Arizona. As many as 471,000 of Texas' uninsured children are expected to be eligible for the program.

'Texas Exile' Team Named

Texas Attorney General John Cornyn last week appointed a team of special prosecutors to handle illegal gun cases in state and federal courts with the goal of obtaining the maximum penalty in each case.

The appointments are part of 'Texas Exile' a program that has resulted in 197 arrests, 115 indictments, 10 convictions and 632 guns confiscated statewide since De-

The pageant annually attracts a large crowd of spectators from throughout the United States. Most watch from cars parked under the direction of Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts, who also distribute free programs. Local Scouts have been providing this service since the pageant began.

There are no reserve parking areas, but spectators are welcome to park their cars early, beginning at 3 p.m. on Saturday.

Free coffee will be served by the Junction Volunteer Fire Department. The local EMS will operate a concession stand with food and soft drinks. Proceeds will go toward a scholarship fund in memory of Dr. Joe Wolpmann. Some spectators come early and picnic on the grounds.

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1 (and used it as a primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1999, you won't need to reapply for 2000 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 2000. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled during 1999, you need to file for the disabled person's

The Schleicher County Hospi- abatement project, which is in its Medicare. tal District Board of Directors met Monday evening, April 17th and gave final approval of a contract with Preferred Management, a Shawnee, Oklahoma company, which will be overseeing day-today operations in the district's hospital and nursing home. Before approving the pact, the board met with their attorney, James Kosub, behind closed doors. 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

Enochs and Edmiston were leaving the board and the three were presented with tabletop clocks, as a token of the district's appreciation for their service as board members.

In other business, the board reviewed the district's financial reports. Andy Freeman told the board that he is in the process of switching the district's accounting from cost-based to accrual. He explained that once the change was complete, the board would be able to more closely track revenues and expenditures. He also explained that the hospital's designation as a Critical Access facility had already resulted in an increase in revenue to the district. However, the funds could take another sixty days to arrive from Medicare.

The board then heard from administrator Ann Fagan-Cook who explained that social workers in San Angelo were referring patients to the local hospital's Swing Bed Program for therapy. She also noted that the district's CT-scanner is being utilized and that business continues to improve.

Trustees then reviewed and approved four policy and procedure manuals and ordered the cancellation of the May 6th election since there are no contested races. They declared Delia Pina, Jim Martin, Shirley Joiner and John Callison to be elected to the positions. The board also approved the appointment of Nicholas Jackson, M.D. to consultant medical staff.

After hearing from Fagan-Cook of a need to install privacy glass at the reception counter in the clinic and the hospital's business office. The board discussed the matter but voted not to make the purchase. They did, however, vote to purchase a new dictaphone, with trustee Brian Edmiston casting the only dissenting vote.

Before adjourning, the board approved the payment of bills and ordered others relating to the asbestos abatement project held until architect Paul Rheinlander could review and approve them. The also approved repairs to the hospital's ultrasound equipment.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.





The heroes of this decisive battle ored in ceremonies beginning at 10:30 a.m. Friday, April 21, at San Jacinto Battleground and State Park, 22 miles east of downtown Houston.

Inspired by the dramatic losses at the Alamo and Goliad a month earlier, the Texians surprised the slumbering Mexican forces with their attack. Houston's victory proved the turning point in the Texas Revolution and led to creation of the Republic of Texas. It charted a course toward the United States' acquisition of almost one million square miles of territory, including Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, California and Utah, as well as parts of Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas and Oklahoma.


The public is invited to attend this year's admission-free ceremony to honor those who fought for Texas independence. Houston journalist, radio and television personality, and author Ray Miller will be the keynote speaker.

The Fort Worth native attended Baylor University and the University of Houston before he began reading news on the radio in 1938. A television news director for 20 years, Miller originated the "Eyes of Texas" television program in 1969. He wrote his first book in 1977 and has published nine books subsequently, including six regional Eyes of Texas travel guides. In 1998, the Texas Association of Broadcasters named him Texas Pioneer Broadcaster of the Year.

Band will signal the start of the event and play patriotic music at various points in the program. Following the wreath-laying near the end of the ceremonies, the periodcostumed Texas Army Fife and Drum Corps will play "Will You Come to the Bower," the song Texians played during the 1836 battle. The Rolling Thunder Cannonade and Texian Army re-enactors will wind up the ceremonies with a series of booming salutes.

The San Jacinto Day celebration is sponsored by the San Jacinto Historical Advisory Board and co-sponsored by Texas Parks and Wildlife, the San Jacinto Descendants, the San Jacinto Chapters of the Sons and Daughters of the Republic of Texas and the San Ja-

Park visitors can explore a treasure-trove of artifacts of early Texas history in the museum located at the base of the 1939 San Jacinto Monument.
