Harold says all the Jewish store keepers were hard working, energetic and shrewd businessmen. They were all dedicated to their families and never hesitated to sacrifice for them. They were civic minded and served on school boards, city commissions and the hamber of commerce.
"I've often been asked, what was it like growing up Jewish in a mall west Texas city? Well, it was wonderful. I played Joseph in the town's nativity scene every year. I played saxophone in the high school band. We had teachers who cared being Jewish. We practiced our religion to the extent we could without a synagogue available to us. On the high holy days the Jews in Snyder, Sweetwater, Roscoe, Lorraine and Colorado City met at the Bluebonnet Hotel in Sweetwater for services. They were conducted by a member of our community who was learned in our religion or by a Rabbi or military chaplain who may
have been available at the time."
All stores owned by Jews closed for both Jewish and Christian holidays. My father would eave his number with the operator on Christmas Day so if anyone got the wrong size, or broke a toy, or forgot to buy butter, they could call and he would go to the store.. He made numerous trips to the store every Christmas day. I have no recollection of ever experiencing any anti-Semitism while I lived here. The respect we all I lived here. The respect we all had for

## A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at
$\$ 50,000$
and you receive a $\$ 15,000$ homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth $\$ 35,000$.

Who qualifies for an exemption? Anyone who owned a home on January 1 (and used it as a primary residence on that date) is entitled to a $\$ 15,000$ home-
stead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't stead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't
matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available? If you're disabled-or if you're 65 years old or older-you are
entitled to an additional $\$ 10,000$ school tax exemption on your entitled to an additional $\$ 10,000$ school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're
also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year? No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1999, you won't need to reapply for 2000 unless your chief apemption on your present home-or if you've moved to a new home-you'll need to file for an exemption for 2000. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled during 1999, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

## "Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber-not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline? If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by May 1 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2000 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by May 1. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.
Do you need to reapply annually? If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.
