#### Parker Gasser Rated At 19 Million **Cubic Feet**

on the potential production of two Delta-Pauley wells located three and four miles northwest of town.

The largest producer is the No. 1 Parker estate, three miles north-west of Eldorado. It was finaled for a calculated, absolute open flow of 19 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 41,200-1. Gravity of the liquid was 65.4 degrees.

This well was completed by Delta-Pauley about the middle of August and the rig was moved north to a T. K. Jones section where they drilled their No. 1-B Jones. It was completed several weeks later and was potentialed this week for a calculated, absolute open flow of 8 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gasliquid ratio of 46,400-1. Gravity of the liquid was 63.1 degrees.

This makes six wells for Delta-Pauley in this field—one on Whitten, one on Parker and four on T. K. Jones.

All of these wells will remain shut in until such time as a pipe line and gathering system is built where they can be put on production. It is understood that negotiations are now under way for such an outlet and that one may be completed by the end of the year.

Wash the furniture? That's what they say. Never heard of it? I haven't either, but just listen to

"Too much wax, oil and polish can actually dim the beauty of wood finishes, says Mrs. Wanda Meyer, Extension Service home management specialist at Texas A&M University.

Furniture manufacturers themselves point this out. The best cleaning care, according to the American Walnut Manufacturers Association, is to wash furniture with suds and water.

Wash it once or twice with a cloth wrung out of warm soap or detergent suds, then wipe all surfaces with a clean damp cloth and rub dry. All wood pieces-modern or antique—thrive on this basic cleaning, as the suds remove various types of soil which are not affected by simply applying another coat of oil, polish or wax.

When all surfaces are thoroughly clean, use any preferred type of finishing touch.

Polish or waxes applied too often tend to build up a film which reduces the beauty of the original finish. Authorities recommend that most furniture be waxed only once or twice a year.

Did you read the last sentence carefully? They said, "Wax furniture once or twice a year."

This trick will make that discolored aluminum pot shine like they do in the TV ads. Boil some water and cream of tartar in it. Use 1 teaspoon to 2 tablespoons cream of tartar per quart of water, depending on how dark the pot is.



#### CoOp Sponsors Irrigation Survey

Some 20 irrigation farmers were present for a meeting at the local CoOp building here Monday night to hear agriculture engineers discuss the cost of pumping irrigation water and to make plans for a 3-year cost survey.

The proposed cost survey was on the high plains of West Texas and is being paid for by Texas Electric CoOperatives. Directors of the S.W. Texas Electric CoOp, here have also endorsed the plan subject to the approval of local irrigators.

Present to discuss the project was John Shanklin of Albuquerque, an agricultural engineer, and Albert Sechrist of Texas Tech, Brownies Met Tuesday also an ag-engineer.

Working with CoOp Manager Don McCormick and Asst. Manager Elton McGinnes, the pair had visited several Eldorado irrigation projects, and at the meeting explained that after further surveys they would select several irrigation wells here where the owners would volunteer to keep accurate records of pumping costs and production for a period of three years
