Proposition Under Way For . . .

City Lots to Be Included In Gas Well Drilling Block

Robert Page this week is working on a project to form a 320-acre drilling block which will include about a quarter section of city lots in the northwest part of Eldorado.

In the event the block is completed as planned a well will be drilled on a location outside the city limits in which all the lot owners will participate.

Page said Tuesday that he had already signed leases on over 80 lots and would be contacting other owners as quickly as possible.

"We are paying," explained Page, "\$25 per lot for a 3-year paid-up oil and gas lease regardless of size of the lot, as shown by present city map in the county clerk's office."

Since oil leases are a legal transaction, Page said, "We will probably have to borrow your ab-

tract of title." In the event the abstract has to be brought up to date, it would be done by his office without expense to the owner.

Page said he did not know how long it would take to work up this block. "It may be just a couple of months; and it may take me a year." But he assured this writer that he had a firm commitment for drilling the well as soon as the block is completed.

The block as now tentatively laid out is as follows:

Along Nicks avenue to Carlisle St., then northeast along Oak street to Warner avenue, then in northwesterly direction to West street; then along West street to North street.

Residents may consult a city map to see if they are within this area. If you are, you will be called on, or if you wish you are invited to call at Page's office.

A lot of people here are coming around to the opinion that it is about time for Schleicher county to use some of its excellent credit toward building a hospital.



SEVERAL WEEKS YET TO GO ON NEW CITY WATER WELL



Leonard Wilson was drilling at 250 feet on the city's third water well Monday. The hole had been reamed out to 225 feet and he had resumed drilling with the smaller bit. Total depth is expected to be around 400 to 425 feet and about two weeks will be required to

reach that depth. If the well develops into a prolific producer, it will be completed with 12¼-inch casing.

Drilled with Wilson's Bucyrus cable tool rig, location of the well is just inside the front gate

to the airport. When the city was threatened with a water shortage at the height of the hot season last summer, it was decided that a third well was necessary and location was made on the west side of town in the hope of finding a strong well.

Water Commission Sets Up Office Here

A team from the Texas Water Commission arrived in Eldorado yesterday and is setting up an office in old Wiedenmann building for the purpose of making a ground water survey in Schleicher county. The project will require several months and is being a service to, and in co-operation with the county.

Two men—Daniel A. Muller and Gene Couch—will constitute the team here, operating a Water Commission station wagon and a pickup.

They will be asking the co-operation of land owners throughout the county as they seek information on each well—such as depth, water level volume, etc. Samples will be taken in each well. The survey is being made at no cost to the county or the landowners, but will be of great benefit to both, the men declared.

More Investigation Is On For Nursing Home

The chairman of Home Funds, Inc., failed again to make it to Eldorado Monday night for the second meeting of interested citizens who are looking into the matter of a nursing home for the town.

Jack Hext, president of the Schleicher County Chamber of Commerce, reported that he had had a phone call stating that Home Funds had tentatively decided to put a nursing home in Sonora instead of here or Junction.

Further discussion took place on the feasibility of local people promoting such a home, and Mrs. Sybil Kinser, Mrs. Jo Woodward, Mrs. Winnie Jackson, and Judge W. R. Bearce were appointed to a committee to investigate the matter further. They met Tuesday morning with Patrick Sullivan of the Farmers Home Administration but no action was taken there, either.

A committee spokesman pointed out that the project being promoted here is for the nursing home to be established and operated on a private basis, and thus will not raise county taxes.

MIKE SUDDUTH



ENEDINA GARZA



This Is Your Life -- Class of 1965

When this year's grads were coming into the world back in late 1946 and 1947, Schleicher county along with the rest of the country was in the process of turning from a wartime economy to peacetime. Just the year before, World War II had ended and the fathers of many of this year's grads served in it.

Rationing of things like gasoline, sugar, and tires, had ended, but the public was eagerly buying the first new cars which were just beginning to be manufactured again; also, new homes were scarce as the war veterans were coming back from service.

C. A. Reynolds was superintendent of schools as the 1946-47 term got under way. County voters approved consolidating the outlying rural schools; beginning teachers with a degree and no experience were being paid \$1,450 a year, with \$45 added for six years' experience and \$200 for a master's degree.

Peyton Cain was high school principal and Wyndall Hall was elementary principal.

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





Home Demonstration Agent's Column

By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

Some of my little friends begin each conversation with this query, "Say, do you know what?" And I always answer with, "No—what?" And we are off.

So—I ask you the same thing—"Say—do you know something which is good to eat, not too expensive, not too difficult to prepare and which you will be glad to have ready to serve all summer? You don't?" Well then, I'll tell you. It's

- Turkey-Macaroni Casserole**
- 1 1/4 quarts shell or other macaroni
- 2 quarts boiling salted water
- 2/3 cup melted butter or margarine
- 1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 quarts milk
- 1 1/2 tablespoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon marjoram (may be left out)
- 2 1/2 cups grated cheese
- 3/4 cup chopped pimiento
- 1 1/4 cups diced chopped turkey.

Cook the macaroni in boiling salted water 15 minutes or until almost tender; drain and rinse with water. Combine the melted butter or margarine with the flour, stir in the milk, and cook until thick. Add seasonings, cheese, pimiento, macaroni and turkey.

To serve immediately. Place enough for one meal in a greased casserole and top with grated cheese if desired. Bake uncovered at 350 F. (moderate oven) for 30 to 40 minutes.

To freeze. Cool the food quickly. Pack in freezer containers, leaving head space. Seal and freeze immediately.

To prepare for serving. Bake uncovered at 400 F. (hot oven) until food is heated through, about 45 minutes for pints, 1 hour quarts.

A topping of grated cheese may be added to this dish the last 5 minutes of heating.

Menu suggestion. Serve with broiled tomato halves and julienne snap beans. A fruit pudding would make a good dessert with this meal.

Turkey is a good meat to serve. Right now it is not too expensive, and it is far more nutritious than most people think. Turkey and chicken are not as high in calories per serving as pork and beef because of the absence of fat. The vitamin content of poultry is good—so avail yourself of this wonderfully convenient food right today.



Austin.—Tabulation of the activities of the Texas Legislature reveals that the current body has produced more new laws than any of its predecessors.

This is a remarkable achievement in view of the pressing time-taking demands of redistricting and increased spending, as well as the controversy on raising the pay of teachers and increasing taxes.

State lawmakers have faced up to their most painful job of the session—legislative redistricting.

In a tension-charged atmosphere, senators performed self-surgery (under federal court order) which in effect will cut off seven rural incumbents and transfer their places to major population centers.

Somewhat more peacefully, the House placed the heads of 16 of its members on the chopping block.

Under the Senate plan, 13 incumbents will be jammed into six districts. They are:

- Sens. Dorsey Hardeman, San Angelo, and Pete Snelson, Midland (Dist. 25); Walter Richter, Gonzales, Culp Krueger, El Campo, and Bill Patman, Ganado (Dist. 18); Louis Crump, San Saba, and J. P. Word, Meridian (Dist. 12); Jack Strong, Longview, and Galloway Calhoun, Tyler (Dist. 2); Jack Hightower, Vernon, and Andy Rogers, Childress (Dist. 23); and Bill Moore of Bryan and Mrs. Neveille H. Colson, Navasota (Dist. 5).

Senate reapportionment measure would assign Harris county four senators, plus a share in two more. Dallas gets three, plus a share in one. Bexar gets two, plus a share in one.

Tarrant county retains a single Senate place and shares in another district. El Paso area will have its own senator.

House races where incumbents are combined with one to be eliminated, if all see re-election, shape up like this:

"Challenge of Growth" is the theme for Soil Stewardship Week being observed in Texas and throughout the nation May 23-30.

"The primary purpose of Soil Stewardship Week," says M. G. Shurley, chairman of the S.C.D. board, "is to remind everyone—urban and rural resident alike—of his obligation unto God as a steward of the soil."

"Everyone depends on the soil for most of his food and clothing, and much of the material used to build his home," Shurley continued.

The Soil Stewardship Week observance will include special sermons in the churches, programs at

civic clubs and other gatherings, and tours to see soil conservation on the land.

Mr. Shurley explained that local soil and water conservation districts sponsor the observance of Soil Stewardship week in coordination with the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

The National Association has sponsored this observance since 1954. The idea was started 19 years ago when the publisher of Farm and Ranch Magazine inspired religious leaders in several southern states to set aside one Sunday each year to remind their congregations of their responsibility as stewards

of the soil. The observance was later expanded to one week each year.

"Booklets and other materials for use by the clergymen of all faiths during the week's observance are provided by the National Association of Soil and Water Districts. In plans for the observance and in developing the material, the association has the help of a Soil Stewardship Advisory committee composed of representatives of the Southern Baptist Convention; the National Lutheran Council; the National Catholic Rural Life Conference; and the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.," Shurley said.



COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

Schleicher County Agricultural Agent

Four cotton insect survey teams will begin work June 1 in the Rolling Plains Cotton Association, Inc., district. The team working in Schleicher county are: P. J. Hamman, head entomologist, Wilbur Frey and Charles Fleming.

The first visit will be Thursday, June 3 to become familiar with the county. This team will visit the county weekly throughout the cotton insect season. Producers will be notified weekly of the insect situation in the county. However, it will be impossible to visit every cotton producer weekly, enough fields will be checked to know the situation from week to week.

George Mikeska, county committeeman with the Rolling Plains Cotton Association, Inc., will be in Lubbock on Friday, May 28, to attend the American Cotton Congress meeting.

Research, textile mill directors and Extension specialists will discuss the production of cotton cheaper, to meet every growing competition from producer to finished product.

One of the things that worries businessmen is the number of unemployed on the payroll.

What is the loss in production in a wool blind ewe per year? Ewes with closed faces wean 11% less lambs and 9-11 less lbs. of lamb per ewe bred than those with open faces.

In a selection program if selection is made to increase wool weight what other valuable characteristics will be influenced?

Selection sheep for wool weight will increase body surface, body size, density of fibers, and adaptability of the environment. All these characteristics tend to make a more and quicker growth lamb with more open face, at the same time increasing lamb percentage.

The control of insects attack-

ing vegetables is often made more difficult because of improper identification of the pest. Their control is very important since even minor damage may lower the crop's value or render it unfit for sale.

In order that gardeners may have a ready reference for identifying the more common insects attacking vegetables, research and extension entomologists of Texas A&M University have prepared a handbook on the subject. The publication, B-1019, "Insects Attacking Vegetable Crops," is available without cost from the agent's office.

Specific control measures for the different insects are not included in the publication, the county agent said. But, he added, MP-875, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Commercial Vegetable Crops" which does list the recommended control measures is available from his office.

Persons interested in these and other publications on many agricultural subjects are invited by the county agent to contact his office for copies. They are free.

The time to spray crops for insect and weed control is near.

Inspect your entire sprayer before using it. You may find nozzle screens clogged because you didn't clean the sprayer before storing last fall or perhaps rollers need replacing in the pump.

A sprayer should be calibrated to determine how much liquid is being applied per acre. This insures proper rates of pesticide and herbicide applications. This calibration may reveal that the nozzle tips are worn to the extent that they must be replaced. Wettable powders are very abrasive and commonly used brass nozzle tips can be quickly worn so that discharge is increased and the appli-

cation pattern changed. If wettable powders are to be used, it is suggested that stainless steel nozzle tips be used. Also, check the inside of the tank. Stainless steel and fiberglass do not deteriorate rapidly. The commonly used 55-gallon drum corrodes easily and the inside may become flaked. These rust flakes are ideal for clogging screens and deteriorating a pump.

When spraying susceptible crops, do not use spray equipment that has been used for 2, 4D. An example of this is spraying cotton with a sprayer that has been used to apply 2, 4D. Much information on the safe use of chemicals in agriculture is available from the offices of county agents. Come by the office for copies of the available bulletins and leaflets.


