

City landfill gets clean bill of health

Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) inspector Adam Hernandez completed an inspection at the City of Eldorado's landfill, one year after the city's new facility opened to the public. A survey of landfill record keeping as well as an onsite inspection of the facility revealed no violations and found that the site was operating in compliance with TNRCC guidelines.

The city's new landfill opened for business on April 17, 2000. Since that time, the city has generated more than \$150,000.00 in revenue at the site through a contract with Duncan Disposal



reason to fear claims made by some local phone companies that local rate hikes will occur as a result of shifting the \$278 million out of long distance access charges and into the TIF. This is because the Universal Service Fund collects over \$500 million annually to keep the cost of phone service affordable in high cost, rural areas of the state. The fund has grown and on January 1, 2001, the Texas PUC reduced the assessment on Texans' phone bills by 10 percent.

"This \$278 million subsidy was instituted years ago to ensure that all Texans had affordable access to 20th century phone technology. Commissioner Williams and I are simply proposing that it be applied for the same purpose, but to the 21st century's equivalent technology. Anyone who does not have such access today truly risks being left behind," Combs concluded.


