When customers sampled it, they said "It's the real McCoy." Anahuac says he hopes to restore it someday.
He lives in a modest cabin on a strip of land adjacent to the Trinity river, one of the main entrances to Texas years ago. He has been on the coast since coming down 30 years ago from his home in Oklahoma. He worked as a ferry operto oil rigs out in the Gulf.
"I take people out in canoes and show them the river and the wildlife around here. It's kind of a sedate, quiet getaway for them, especially if they come during the week. Weekends sometimes get
crowded." crowded.
One of the favorite birds peo ple come down to see is the Roseate Spoonbill. It's the color of a flamingo, but has iridescent plumage and a bill shaped like a spoon. "I can take people to a place where they nest. In the mornings you can see a whole tree full of them."

Mostly, people go to Anahuac to see alligators. The city has gatorfest in the fall that attracts people from all over Texas and Louisiana. People bring in alligators to be measured and sold. The longest ones are around seventeen

feet. We've got roughly 75,000 aligators in this county. That's about three times the number of people who live here."
A large bull alligator lives in he water right in front of his cabn. "During the mating season in late April and May, that alligator bellows real loud. His whole body ter. He makes all the water and everything around him within several yards just vibrate. It's pretty interesting. It'll make the hair stand straight out on the back of your neck. It's just part of their mating system. I've been around alligators for a long time and when I hear a big one like mat I wet just hear a big one like That, I get just a little bit of a chill. These creatures go back thousands of years. If there's anything prehistoric that's still
He says alligators are smart, urious and react to all kinds of stimuli. He takes people on alligator hunts during the September hunting season. They are after the big bulls, which are not much good as far as breeding goes because they kill females and eat their young.
An alligator will eat just about anything alive that's smaller than he is. An alligator judges its prey according to size. If you ever get in a situation where you have an alligator charge, you want to stand up and stick your hands in the air as high as you can, because the is to eat you."

Criminals will no longer mak "killing" on memorabilia Convicts are no longer going to ing crime memorabilia.
Gov. Perry has signed Senate Bill 795, a law that prohibits crim nals or their agents from profit g from the sale of "tangible propty the value of which is by the notoriety gained from the onviction of an offense
Under the new law, which goes into effect Sept. 1, any money made by criminals trading on their notoriety will be forfeited to a special fund. Victims' families will have five years to collect from that fund any damages they might have been awarded.
Any money left over in the fund after that time would go into the Texas Victim Compensation Fund. Similar legislation, spurred by the sale of crime memorabilia on Internet auction websites, has been

## SCHLEICHER COUNTY APPRAISAL DISTRICT Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about
-the value placed on your property;
-exemptions that may apply to you;
-whether your property is taxable;
-which local governments should be taxing your property; or
-you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.
Informal Review: For an informal review of your property value, contact Ray L Ballew, Chief Appraiser, at the appraisal district office located at 1 W Warner Avenue

## Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your ase heard by the appraisal review board.
The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 1 W Warner Ave, Box 936, Eldorado, TX 76936.
Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.
Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.
If the appraisal district has appraised your property at $\$ 1,000,000$ or more, you must file a notice f appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).
Late Protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some ause
Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines
For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you
If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decid

WASHINGTON - The Army must correct its ammunition shortage before it can purchase or issue new black berets, if a measure tlett becomes law. The 28 -milli member American 2.8 -million ports the Marylander's bill sup1770, which was introduced with 15 original co-sponsors, including three of Bartlett's colleagues on the House Armed Services Com mittee: Reps. Duncan Hunter of California, Walter Jones of North Carolina, John Hostettler of Indiana. The bill already has 29 co-
sponsors, including Rep. John Dingell of Michigan.
The bill would prohibit the Ar my's "purchasing, issuing, or
wearing of berets as standard Army tain specialized units) until the Secretary of the Army certifies to Congress that the Army ammunition shortfall has been eliminated." "The Army spent $\$ 30$ million to issue the Rangers' historic black beret to soldiers who currently do not wear a beret, needlessly tram pling upon Ranger tradition," mander Ray G. Smith said. "The Army made a bad investment worse made in China, the country that stole U.S. nuclear secrets, downed a U.S. reconnaissance plane and detained 24 American service
members. Congress is right to shif the well-being of the military family and the readiness of the soldie to the top of the Army's priority list.
"This bill would require the Army to solve only the ammunibillion. Our troops don't have enough 9 -mm ammunition to conduct realistic training. Meanwhile hat $\$ 30$ million could have been spent to address ongoing problems: Too many vehicles and aircraft are poorly maintained due to instance, 60 percent of National Guard helicopters are grounded parts. ## QUESTION: You once "I want to ask those of you respected child in her class

 wrote about an overweight fourth-grade girl who was teased by nine aggressive boys as she entered the classroom all while the teacher looked on in silence. What would you have done if you had been the teach$r$ on that dayDR. DOBSON: Those mocking, joking boys would have had a fight on their hands, I promise you that. Of course, it would have
been better if the embarrassment could have been prevented by discussing the feelings of others
from the first day of school. But if the conflict occurred as described, with the girl, "Nancy," suddenly being humiliated for thrown the full weight of my authority and respect on her side of the battle.
My spontaneous response would have carried this general theme: "What right do any of you boys say
whater such mean, unkind things to Nancy? I want to know which of you is so perfect that the rest of us couldn't make fun of you in some way? I know you all very well. I
know about your homes and your school records and some of your personal secrets. Would you like me to share them with the class, so we can all laugh at you the way t! I could make you want to crawl into a hole and disappear. "But listen to me! You need you in that way. Why not? Because it hurts to be laughed at by your friends. It huts eved more than a stubbed
or a bee sting.

I want to ask those of you respected child in her class time a few minutes ago: Have you the emotional climate of the ever had a group of students make fun of you in the same way? If you haven't, then brace yourself. Someday it will happen to you, omething foolish say or do something foolish - something at you and laugh in your face. And when it happens, I want you to remember what happened today."
Then I'd address the entire class: "Let's make sure that we learn something important from what took place here this afternoon. First, we will not be mean laugh toger in this class. We will funny, but we will not do it by making one person feel bad. "Second, I will never intenclass. You can count on that. Each of you is a child of God. You were made with His loving hands, and He has said that we all have equal worth as human beings. This means that Susie is neither better Brent.
"Sometimes I

Several scenes for the movie Pearl Harbor" were shot at the USS Texas, which is moored at San Jacinto State Historical Site east of Houston. TPW received $\$ 56,093$ from Big Ship Productions Inc. for allowing the company to film aboard the USS Texas for three days last July and to restore the ship to its original condition after the film ing.

The battleship is the only sur iving U.S. Navy warship that served in both world wars. The Texas saw World War II action in the invasions of Morocco, Normandy

On Dec. 7, 1941, Pearl Harbo the U.S: Pacific Fleet was severely crippled by Japan. Of some 100 day, eight battleships were damaged and five sunk. The attack killed 2,335 military personnel and 68 ci vilians. Another 1,178 people were wounded. News of the attack was shock to the entire nation. The bombing rallied the United State behind Roosevelt, leading to the nation's entrance into World War II Exhibits in the George Bush Gallery of the National Museum of the Pacific War, done in a timeline depict aspects of the conflict through sight, sounds and words. A Japanese two-man midget submarine, HA-19, mounted on its moth er sub, I-24, is the focal point of an exhibit depicting Pearl Harbor im mediately before the attack.

Visitors also can see the gun sight from the USS Ward, which fired the first shot for the United States on Dec. 7 and was responsi ble for sinking the first midget sub. Vistors can listen to Roosevelt's " Date Which Will Live in Infamy" radio speech that was broadcast to the nation.
Both historical sites will hos special Pearl Harbor Day ceremonies.
On Dec. 7, 2001, the National Museum of the Pacific War is joining the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association in hosting "Remember Pearl Harbor 2001," the official mainland commemoration of the Pearl Harbor.
