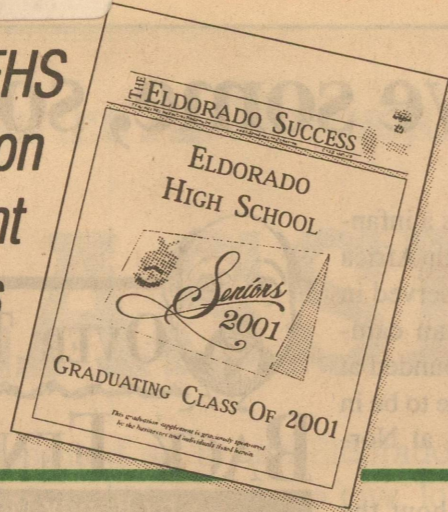

Fire guts North Street apartment building

3 neighboring apartments suffer heavy smoke damage

A fire gutted an apartment on North Street and resulted in heavy smoke and water damage in three others Friday, leaving the residents of all four apartments without a place to live. No one was seriously injured in the blaze, but firefighters struggled with a combination of heat and dense black smoke as they attacked the inferno.

The fire was reported to the Schleicher County Sheriff's Department at 7:13 p.m. on May 18th. According to investigators at the scene, the blaze began when youths playing with candles on the apartment's porch accidentally set fire to a can of gasoline. In an at-

tempt to kick the burning can away from the apartment's open door, the flaming gas reportedly splashed inside the dwelling.

That reportedly left one youth trapped in the burning building. However, by the time emergency personnel arrived, the youth had managed to exit the apartment through a window.

When the first fire trucks arrived on the scene, smoke was pouring from vents on both ends of the apartment building's attic. Firefighters quickly contained the flames inside the first apartment, preventing the fire from spreading. Minutes later the fire was com-

pletely extinguished.

Dawn Chavez and her four children lost almost all of their possessions in the blaze. Her neighbors were luckier in that almost all of their belongings were saved despite smoke and water damage.

As soon as the fire was out, neighbors, families and friends came to the aid of those who once lived in the building, all of whom will be looking for a new place to live.

The metal frame apartment building is owned by Isabella McCutcheon. Work to clean up after the fire is already underway. Ms. McCutcheon reportedly intends to repair the structure.

Mayor uses meeting as forum to scold school board over tractor repair issue

"I always thought when you borrowed something, you were responsible for returning it in the same condition it was in when you borrowed it," Mayor John Nikolauk said at Monday evening's meeting of the Eldorado City Council. Nikolauk was reacting to a decision by Schleicher County ISD trustees to pay about a quarter of the estimated cost to repair a city tractor.

The tractor had been borrowed by school district personnel for use at the school's ag building. When it was returned to the city yard the tractor was found to have a hole in the engine block.

"Despite the fact that the tractor was damaged while in use by

school personnel, the city offered to pay fifty percent of the repair cost," Nikolauk continued. "The school opted to pay only \$2,000.00 which is disappointing."

Nikolauk then took issue with a comment by school trustee Berta Nicholson at last week's meeting of the Schleicher County ISD board of trustees when she opposed paying \$2,000.00 toward the repair and told fellow trustees, "Let them sue us."

"Is this the example a school board member wants to set for our children?" Nikolauk asked. "Unfortunately this is the attitude that is prevalent in this litigious society."

The mayor said that the city has always cooperated with other tax-

ing entities and only asked that the same courtesy be returned. As for the thought of suing the school district Nikolauk concluded, "The city has never engaged, nor does it intend to engage, in such idiocy!"

City Administrator Randy Mankin was then directed by the council not to deposit a \$2,000.00 check the school had issued for the tractor repair. Instead, the council told him to hold the check until the final bill for the tractor repair is received. At that time, Mankin is to return to the council for further instruction in the matter.

When asked how he intended to handle requests for assistance from the school in the future, Mankin noted that he had directed city workers not to allow school personnel to borrow equipment until the issue is resolved. The council agreed with that approach and told Mankin to keep the policy in place until further notice.

The session was a specially called meeting of the council, primarily for the discussion of redistricting issues. However, a redistricting plan proposed by the city's attorney, David Mendez of Austin, quickly met with council's approval. The group voted unanimously to schedule a hearing for June 11, 2001 for the purpose of seeking public input on the plan.

The proposed plan changes the boundaries of the city's three voting wards, straightening out some of the jagged edges. Under the proposed plan, Ward #1 would encompass the southwestern portion of the city. Ward #2 would take in most of the northern part of town and Ward #3 would take in primarily the eastern portion of the city. A map of the proposed boundary changes is available for public viewing at City Hall.

On hand were council members Tommy Minor, Richard Mendez, Toni Sudduth, Robert Bybee and Dora Bosmans. Council member Sherry Lux was absent. The meeting began with three newly elected council members taking the oath of office. Bybee, Mendez and

Bustos arrested for theft

Civic Center...to be, or not to be

Should Schleicher County build a new Civic Center, or should it make a trade for the school district's new Ag Barn? That is the question that was on everyone's mind during Monday morning's meeting of the Schleicher County Commissioners Court.

For several months now, the commissioners have looked to a group of local citizens for the answer. The group, also known as the Civic Center Research Committee, has spent much time compiling information on the need for a Civic Center and taking the pulse of the community. Two members of that committee, Brian Edmiston and Nancy Lester, met with the commissioners Monday to discuss the project. However, much of the time was spent discussing the school's Ag Building and an offer by school trustees to trade the new facility to the county in return for the county's baseball field.

Edmiston expressed his concern that the county's focus seemed to be shifting away from building a Civic Center and toward trading for the Ag Building. He was joined by Commissioner Ross Whitten who stated his objection to making a deal for the Ag Building before Edmiston's committee had a chance to present their pro-

posal for a new Civic Center to the public.

It was explained that during the a meeting of the Commissioners Court in April, the men had asked Nancy Lester to speak with SCISD board president Phil McCormick. She was to determine if the school would be willing to consider giving the Ag Building to the county for use as a civic center. Once that contact had been made, Lester and County Judge Johnny Griffin met with the SCISD board of trustees on May 14 and learned that the trustees present at that time were

not opposed to idea, provided the county would trade the baseball field, currently used by the high school baseball team, for the Ag Building property.

The commissioners then discussed at length the possibility of trading the two properties. Ross Whitten said he wanted to know more about the status of sewer problems at the Ag Building and questioned if new bathrooms would be installed by the school with insurance money it received when the structure was damaged

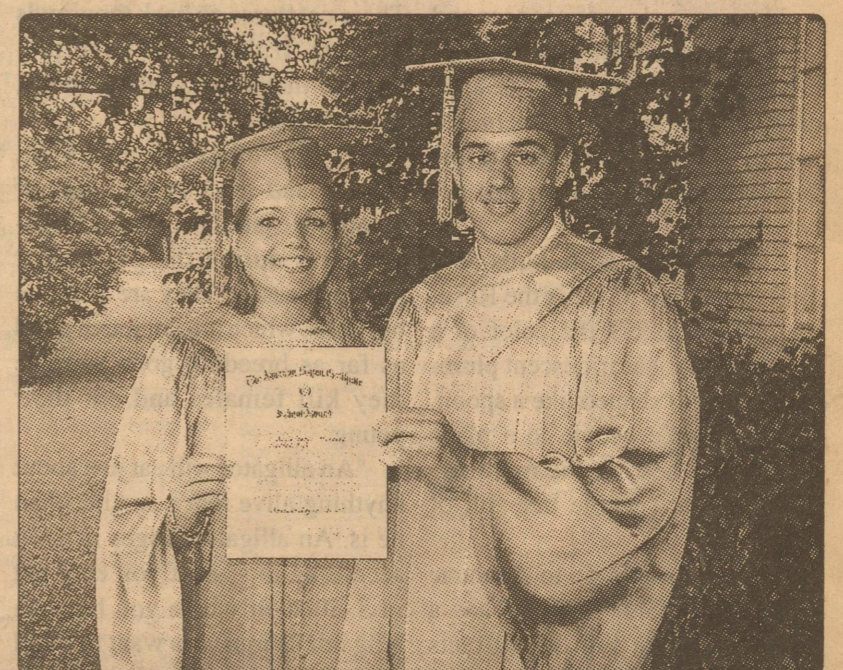

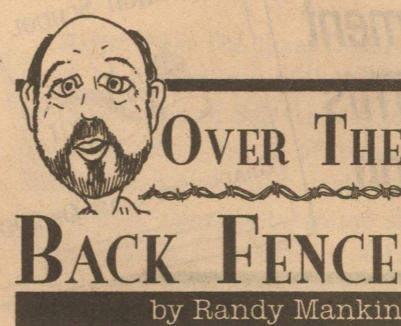
All gave some, some gave all

Carl Williamson was an infantryman during the North Africa campaign in 1942. He served in Sicily and in the Italian campaign, too. Carl was wounded at Anzio but healed in time to be in on the D-Day landing at Normandy.

Carl served throughout the war in Europe and, despite being wounded two more times, he lived to tell the tale. Many of his comrades did not.

I read an essay Carl wrote some years after World War II. In it, he was almost apologetic for having survived. He reckoned that on several occasions other soldiers had taken bullets that were meant for him.

One instance came during the landing on Omaha Beach, when a G.I. directly in front of Carl was shot and killed. Another time was near Bastogne when a mortar



round fell a few feet from his fox hole. Two of Carl's buddies had been in the hole with him. They were both killed by shrapnel.

Carl lied about his age and joined the Army just a week after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. He had tried to enlist in the Navy but was devastated to learn that the Navy didn't want him. Carl had good reason for wanting to fight...his brother Dean was killed aboard the U.S.S. Arizona during the Pearl Harbor attack.

Carl said he always believed that he had been allowed to survive the war in Europe so that he could transfer to the Pacific and fight the Japanese. His hope was to find the pilot who dropped the bomb that touched off the Arizona's ammunition magazine, killing his brother and hundreds of others.

Carl did manage to get himself transferred to the Pacific, and would almost certainly have been in the invasion of Japan had the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki not brought about the Japanese surrender. Instead, he was assigned to the occupation force that moved onto the island after

the war. For a few months following the war Carl was a military policeman in Japan.

Carl said that he was still having nightmares about the war, years after it was over. He said the faces of those who died around him kept coming to him in his sleep. The ones who he said had taken bullets for him.

Carl Williamson's essay was written in observance of Memorial Day. It ends with him imploring his readers not to forget the soldiers and sailors who didn't make it back.

Carl concluded by saying, "The dead cry out to us from their resting places, whether on battlefields or at the ocean's great depth. They desire that we not forget their sacrifice. While others may forget in time, I never shall. I have tried and find that I cannot."

On Monday, May 28th, Americans will celebrate Memorial Day. Unfortunately, for most people it will be little more than a day off from work. You see, they have managed to do what Carl Williamson could never do...they have forgotten.

Locally, there is a group of men who have not forgotten. They are the veterans of American Legion Post 257 and they will conduct the annual Memorial Day Service at the Eldorado Cemetery. They invite you to participate. The service begins at 9:00 a.m. on Monday morning. Please attend if you can.

Granny tax bill killed in house committee

AUSTIN—Like many other issues being considered in the Legislature this session, the matter of elder care is complicated and controversial.

The controversy has centered on Senate Bill 1839, which would have instituted a \$5.25 per bed daily fee for nursing home patients. The money raised by what some started calling a "granny tax" would have been used to leverage needed federal money for nursing homes.

The fee portion of the bill died

in the House Human Services committee on May 16, but it was replaced by the earmarking of \$175 million from the appropriations bill.

Gov. Rick Perry had said he would veto the bill if it made it through with the "granny tax."

Though funding would come

from general revenue and not a bed fee, if signed into law, the measure will enable nursing homes in Texas to pay their staffs more and buy needed new equipment.

Those lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer...

Aging Baby Boomers may have their share of aches and pains these days, but there are happy memories.

One of those memories is of the time when summer vacation amounted to a full three months of no school.

In the good old days, at least from the perspective of those born between 1946 and 1964, school ended in late May and did not start again until after Labor Day.

These days, while school ends a bit earlier than it used to, it resumes in early to mid-August. Some districts start classes during the first week of that month.

But it looks like school children will be picking up a little extra summer time starting with the 2002 school year.

The House has passed Senate Bill 108, a measure that will mandate that schools not begin prior to Aug. 21. But the version was weakened somewhat, at least in the eyes of its advocates, by addition of a provision that would allow school districts to get a three-year waiver of the rule from the state education commissioner.

Even with the change, schools

still must provide 180 days of instruction.

Criminals will no longer make a "killing" on memorabilia

Convicts are no longer going to be able to make a "killing" by selling crime memorabilia.

Gov. Perry has signed Senate Bill 795, a law that prohibits criminals or their agents from profiting from the sale of "tangible property the value of which is increased by the notoriety gained from the conviction of an offense..."

Under the new law, which goes into effect Sept. 1, any money made by criminals trading on their notoriety will be forfeited to a special fund. Victims' families will have five years to collect from that fund any damages they might have been awarded.

Any money left over in the fund after that time would go into the Texas Victim Compensation Fund.

Similar legislation, spurred by the sale of crime memorabilia on Internet auction websites, has been passed in other states.

Convicted killer Henry Lee Lucas, who died in prison earlier this year, was one inmate who sold his artwork over the Internet.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice spokesman Larry Todd said the new law would give the prison system better control over the money-making schemes some inmates try to run.

Cruising with Anahuac Jack

I was in the city hall at Anahuac the other day and saw a guy wearing camouflage clothing and wading boots. He looked like an interesting character, so I struck up a conversation with him. He calls himself Anahuac Jack. He is a historian, guide, naturalist, alligator hunter and owner of a schooner that once belonged to Bill McCoy, whose illegal hooch had a special taste. When customers sampled it, they said "It's the real McCoy." Anahuac says he hopes to restore it someday.

He lives in a modest cabin on a strip of land adjacent to the Trinity river, one of the main entrances to Texas years ago. He has been on the coast since coming down 30 years ago from his home in Oklahoma. He worked as a ferry operator, hauling people back and forth to oil rigs out in the Gulf.

"I take people out in canoes and show them the river and the wildlife around here. It's kind of a sedate, quiet getaway for them, especially if they come during the week. Weekends sometimes get crowded."

One of the favorite birds people come down to see is the Roseate Spoonbill. It's the color of a flamingo, but has iridescent plumage and a bill shaped like a spoon.

"I can take people to a place where they nest. In the mornings you can see a whole tree full of them."

Mostly, people go to Anahuac to see alligators. The city has a gatorfest in the fall that attracts people from all over Texas and Louisiana. People bring in alligators to be measured and sold. The longest ones are around seventeen

feet. "We've got roughly 75,000 alligators in this county. That's about three times the number of people who live here."

A large bull alligator lives in the water right in front of his cabin. "During the mating season in late April and May, that alligator bellows real loud. His whole body comes completely out of the water. He lifts both his tail and his mouth and makes a sound so loud tree leaves shake. It's a pretty awesome thing to hear and see. He makes all the water and everything around him within several yards just vibrate. It's pretty interesting. It'll make the hair stand straight out on the back of your neck. It's just part of their mating system. I've been around alligators for a long time and when I hear a big one like that, I get just a little bit of a chill. These creatures go back thousands of years. If there's anything prehistoric that's still with us today, it's the alligator."

He says alligators are smart, curious and react to all kinds of stimuli. He takes people on alligator hunts during the September hunting season. They are after the big bulls, which are not much good as far as breeding goes because they kill females and eat their young.

"An alligator will eat just about anything alive that's smaller than he is. An alligator judges its prey according to size. If you ever get in a situation where you have an alligator charge, you want to stand up and stick your hands in the air as high as you can, because the bigger you look, the less likely he is to eat you."

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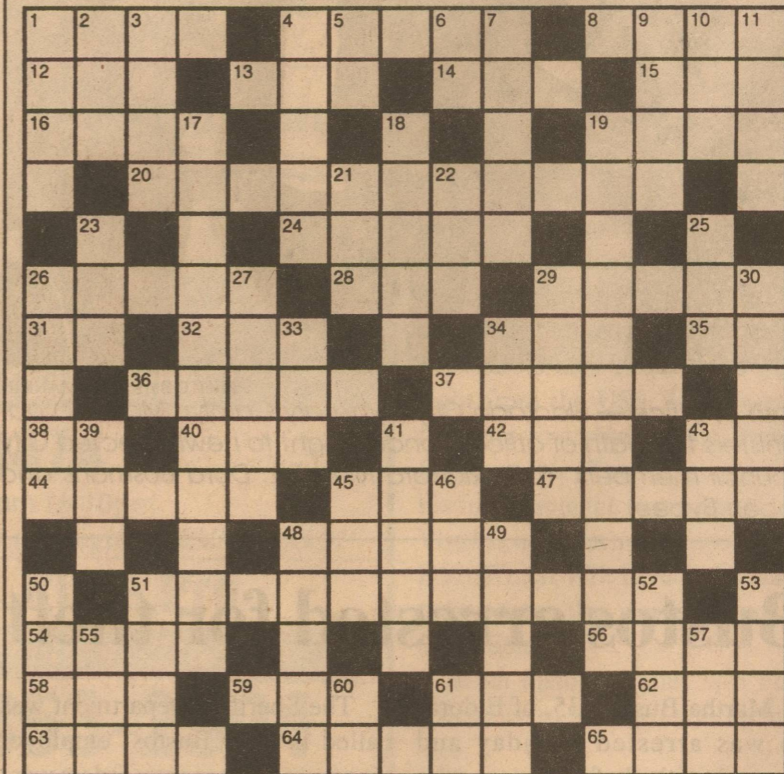

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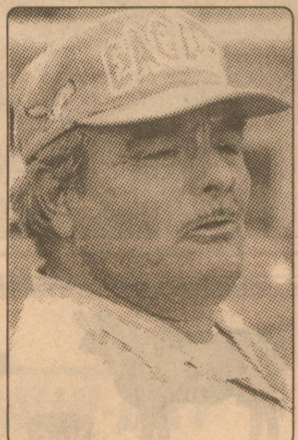

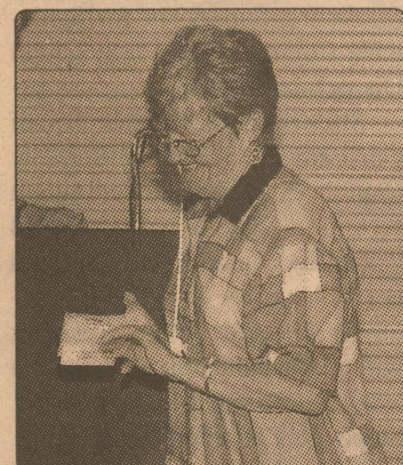

Dear Editor:

Most people know that when emergency medical help is needed, dialing 9-1-1 on the nearest telephone brings a quick response. But some people may not think about exactly who is answering that call for help.

Schleicher County Medical Center and the Texas Department of Health (TDH) remind you and your family that emergency response teams provide a lifesaving link between ill or injured individuals and medical care in Eldorado, Texas.

"Emergency medical response across Texas is provided every day by dedicated, trained professionals, working in ambulances and trauma centers stocked with life-saving equipment," said Kathy Perkins, Chief of TDH's Bureau

of Emergency Management.

Ambulances staffed with at least two trained medics respond to calls for ill or injured people. The Texas Trauma System, made up of 185 trauma centers across Texas, coordinates in-hospital care so that patients receive the type of care they need as quickly as possible. This system is on alert, ready as soon as someone calls 9-1-1.

"Nearly 45,000 trained, certified emergency personnel are part of Texas EMS," Perkins said. "They respond to people in need and give the best emergency medical care possible. These highly trained medics treat patients from the emergency scene to the hospital and are an integral part of our emergency care system for victims of sudden serious illness or injury."

In Texas, this system begins with an informed public able to recognize a medical emergency and make the call for help, then moves through a network of care to trauma centers such as Schleicher County Medical Center that provide highly specialized treatment for the most seriously ill or injured.

To learn what you can do in a medical emergency before EMS arrives, order a copy of "When Minutes Count: A Citizen's Guide to Emergencies" by calling 512-834-6700, writing to the TDH Bureau of Emergency Management, 1100 West 49th At., Austin, Texas 78756.

Texas EMS Week is May 20-26, and May is Texas Trauma Awareness Month.

County takes another look at need for Civic Center

in a severe storm last year. Also, Whitten asked if the building's exhibition hall is air-conditioned.

Commissioner Bill Clark noted that he personally preferred acquiring the Ag Building and spending \$100,000.00 in order to make it usable as a community building, as opposed to spending \$1 million to construct a new Civic Center. But, Clark agreed that the Civic Center Research Committee should be given a chance to make their case to the community.

The men then agreed in principle that they would consider trading for the Ag Barn, even if it isn't used as a Civic Center. It was noted that the property would enhance the annual Eldorado Open Rodeo and would relieve the overused

Memorial Building.

Commissioner Clark cautioned the men, however, that if the public's sentiment is against spending money on a new Civic Center, it might also be opposed to spending any more money on the Ag Barn.

The men took no formal action on the matter. They did, however, ask the committee to continue meeting with members of the public to and to assess the willingness of the citizens to support a bond election to pay for a new Civic Center.

Although he wasn't on the agenda, insurance agent Bobby Zesch met with the commissioners concerning the county's employee health insurance plan. Zesch noted that the Texas Association of Counties (TAC), currently contracts to provide insurance for several of the state's 254 counties, including Schleicher County, through Blue Cross - Blue Shield. He said that TAC had become aware that Schleicher County is shopping for less expensive insurance and that a TAC representative had informed him that the group is currently in the process of re-bidding the insurance. It was noted that the association is considering changing its rules to prevent county's from leaving the insurance pool and then rejoining at a later date. The commissioners took the subject under advisement but took no formal action on the matter.

In other business, County Clerk Peggy Williams read the minutes from the previous meeting and the county's bills were approved and ordered paid.

Concerning a question about what to do with used lumber from the Rodeo Arena grandstands, it was noted that the best of the lumber would be used to repair the are-

na chutes. The remaining lumber would be taken to the city landfill. The grandstands are currently being repaired in advance of the Eldorado Open Rodeo slated next month.

The commissioners then decided not to take bids for the sale of 95 13-foot long guard rails. The men opted to keep the rails for later use.

The possibility of using the concrete slab at the Golf Course for dances was then discussed. It was noted that the county had recently received a request for a dance, however, the Memorial Building, the Rodeo Arena slab and the Ag Building had all been booked for use that same day. It was decided that the Golf Club will be contacted about the question and, if the dance is approved by

the club, the county would apply the same rules as currently in place at the Rodeo Arena slab and the Memorial Building.

County Road Superintendent Clay Bursleson then sought pay raises for two employees who are being promoted to new jobs. \$75 raises were okayed for Mark Graves and Oscar Sanchez, effective June 1.

Before adjourning the commissioners reviewed proposed changes in precinct lines as part of the county's redistricting process. It was noted that attorney David Mendez has recommended slight changes to the four precinct boundaries within the Eldorado city limits. After studying the issue, the men voted to present the proposed changes to the public at a hearing on June 11, 2001.

Comptroller delivers sales tax rebates to City, County

The State Comptroller's office has sent \$297 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,106 Texas cities and 119 counties, a 7.1 percent increase over the \$277.2 million allocated to cities and counties in May 2000. Year-to-date sales tax rebates are up 5.2 percent, compared to 2000.

In the allocation, the City of Eldorado received \$9,456.68, up 21.21 percent from the May payment last year of \$7,801.81. The city's year to date total is \$39,000.71, up 5.05 percent from the same period one year ago when the year-to-date total was \$37,125.30.

Schleicher County's sales tax rebate this month totalled \$9,409.04, up 17.09 percent from May, 2000's total of \$8,035.49. The

year-to-date total for Schleicher County is \$41,508.91. That is up 37.66 percent from the \$30,151.20 received in 2000.

The Schleicher County Health Service tax rebate for May was \$7,410.11, down 4.78 percent from May, 2000's total of \$7,782.86. The year-to-date figure for the Health Service Tax totalled \$38,158.27, up 28.51 percent from the \$29,691.59 delivered in 2000.

This month's sales tax allocations represent sales taxes collected in March and reported to the Comptroller in April.

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation is scheduled to be delivered on Friday, June 8, 2001 and will be reported the following week in the Eldorado Success.

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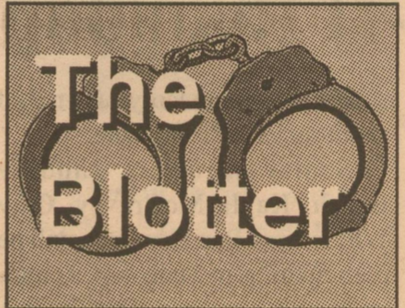

SCHLEICHER COUNTY APPRAISAL DISTRICT Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property;
- exemptions that may apply to you;
- cancellation of agricultural appraisal;
- whether your property is taxable;
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: For an informal review of your property value, contact Ray L Ballew, Chief Appraiser, at the appraisal district office located at 1 W Warner Avenue.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board:

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 1 W Warner Ave, Box 936, Eldorado, TX 76936.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

More information: You can get more information by contacting the Schleicher Co Appraisal District, Box 936, Eldorado, TX 76936, 915-853-2617. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Property Tax Board 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, TX 78746-6565.

Deadline for filing protests with the ARB

(The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late Protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

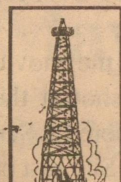

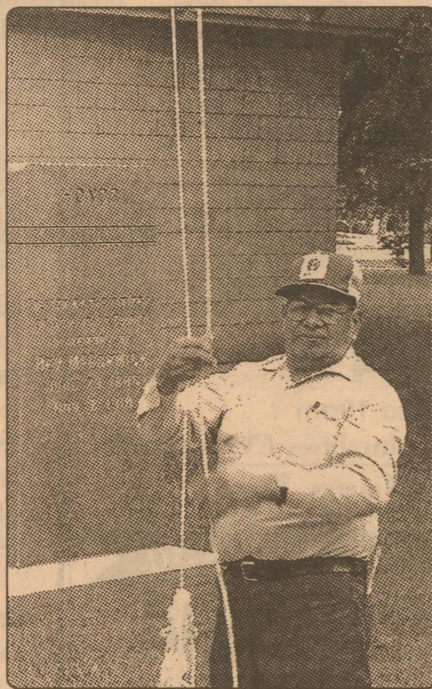

American Legion, Congress scrutinize Army priorities

WASHINGTON — The Army must correct its ammunition shortage before it can purchase or issue new black berets, if a measure introduced by Rep. Roscoe Bartlett becomes law. The 2.8-million member American Legion supports the Marylander's bill, H.R. 1770, which was introduced with 15 original co-sponsors, including three of Bartlett's colleagues on the House Armed Services Committee: Reps. Duncan Hunter of California, Walter Jones of North Carolina, John Hostettler of Indiana. The bill already has 29 co-sponsors, including Rep. John Dingell of Michigan.

The bill would prohibit the Army's "purchasing, issuing, or wearing of berets as standard Army headgear (other than for certain specialized units) until the Secretary of the Army certifies to Congress that the Army ammunition shortfall has been eliminated."

"The Army spent \$30 million to issue the Rangers' historic black beret to soldiers who currently do not wear a beret, needlessly trampling upon Ranger tradition," American Legion National Commander Ray G. Smith said. "The Army made a bad investment worse by having some of those berets made in China, the country that stole U.S. nuclear secrets, downed a U.S. reconnaissance plane and detained 24 American service members. Congress is right to shift the well-being of the military family and the readiness of the soldier to the top of the Army's priority list."

"This bill would require the Army to solve only the ammunition shortfall, estimated to be \$3 billion. Our troops don't have enough 9-mm ammunition to conduct realistic training. Meanwhile, that \$30 million could have been spent to address ongoing problems: Too many vehicles and aircraft are poorly maintained due to a shortage of parts and tires. For instance, 60 percent of National Guard helicopters are grounded because of a lack of replacement parts. Even if all the aircraft and tanks could be fixed tomorrow, there's not enough fuel. Soldiers don't get enough training because the deployment rate has risen 300 percent since 1987, while the size of the force has been cut by a third, including eight divisions, since then. Many Guard and Reserve units are undermanned today because over-deployed troops, forced to choose between serving their country and keeping their civilian jobs, come home and get out. A recent study documented a shortage of junior officers, many of whom leave the Army in frustration due to 'poor comminution' with senior officers. On top of all this, there is a lack of adequate housing. Bottom line: We have the world's best troops. Congress is addressing their needs."

The American Legion, the nation's largest veterans organization, is an advocate for a strong national defense as well as troop readiness and quality-of-life improvements.

TDA to hold public hearing on Boll Weevil quarantine

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Agriculture will hold a public hearing in San Angelo on Tuesday, May 29 on proposed changes and new rules establishing a boll weevil quarantine in Texas. The hearing will be at 11 a.m. at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center - San Angelo, 7887 U.S. Highway 87 North in San Angelo.

The proposed quarantine regulations restrict movement of regulated items, such as cotton harvesting and hauling equipment, vehicles and raw cotton, from areas of Texas that still have boll weevils into boll weevil eradication zones that have been declared suppressed, functionally eradicated or eradicated.

"Texas cotton farmers are beginning to win the war against boll weevils - one of the most devastating pests in American agriculture," Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs said. "The quarantine helps reduce the risk of reinvestigation in zones where cotton farmers have devoted their time and effort over the past six to seven years to eradicate the boll weevil."

There are currently 11 active

boll weevil eradication zones in Texas covering 6 million acres. The Southern Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone was declared functionally eradicated in September 2000.

Under the proposed changes, functionally eradicated means inspectors have found no evidence of reproducing boll weevils in cotton fields in the zone. A suppressed zone can have some reproducing boll weevils in the zone. A suppressed one can have some reproducing boll weevils present in quantities of .025 weevils or less per reapi week during the growing season. An eradicated area means inspectors have not found any boll weevils for at least one growing season.

The proposed rule changes were published in the Texas Register on May 4, 2001. TDA will take public comment through June 4, 2001. Pearl Harbor moviegoers get 2-for-1 admission at two TPW sites

AUSTIN, Texas — Two Texas historical attractions that interpret the nation's World War II experience will offer moviegoers captivated by the film "Pearl Harbor" an opportunity to encounter pieces of that history at special reduced prices.

The National Museum of the Pacific in Fredericksburg and Battleship Texas anchored at the San Jacinto Battlegrounds in La Porte will offer two-for-one admission for a limited time to persons who bring

in ticket stubs from the Touchstone Pictures film, which opens May 25. The reduced admission to the historical sites is not part of the film's publicity campaign.

Officials at the National Museum of the Pacific War predict "Pearl Harbor" not only will renew interest among grandchildren of World War II veterans in the attack that brought the United States into the war. President Franklin D. Roosevelt called Dec. 7, 1941, "a date which will live in infamy."

The National Museum of the Pacific War is a state historical site managed by Texas Parks and Wildlife and supported in part by the Admiral Nimitz Foundation. Hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily except Christmas Day. Admission is \$5 for adults, \$3 for students with current identification, and free for children ages 5 and younger. Special rates are available for schools and tour groups of 20 or more. For more information, phone (830) 997-4379.

The Battleship Texas will offer two-for-one admissions to "Pearl Harbor" ticket stub holders, as well, but only through July 4. Regular admission is \$5 for adults, \$3 for ages 6 to 18, and free for children younger than 6. The Battleship Texas is

open daily 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. except Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. Call the park at (281) 479-2431 for more information.

Several scenes for the movie "Pearl Harbor" were shot at the USS Texas, which is moored at San Jacinto State Historical Site east of Houston. TPW received \$56,093 from Big Ship Productions Inc. for allowing the company to film aboard the USS Texas for three days last July and to restore the ship to its original condition after the filming.

The battleship is the only surviving U.S. Navy warship that served in both world wars. The Texas saw World War II action in the invasions of Morocco, Normandy and Southern France. Extensive restoration begun in 1988 returned the Texas to its original outward appearance. More renovations are scheduled.

On Dec. 7, 1941, Pearl Harbor, the U.S. Pacific Fleet was severely crippled by Japan. Of some 100 U.S. Navy ships in the harbor that day, eight battleships were damaged and five sunk. The attack killed 2,335 military personnel and 68 civilians. Another 1,178 people were wounded. News of the attack was a shock to the entire nation. The bombing rallied the United States behind Roosevelt, leading to the nation's entrance into World War II. Exhibits in the George Bush Gallery of the National Museum of the Pacific War, done in a timeline, depict aspects of the conflict through sight, sounds and words. A Japanese two-man midget submarine, HA-19, mounted on its mother sub, I-24, is the focal point of an exhibit depicting Pearl Harbor immediately before the attack.

Visitors also can see the gun-sight from the USS Ward, which fired the first shot for the United States on Dec. 7 and was responsible for sinking the first midget sub. Visitors can listen to Roosevelt's "A Date Which Will Live in Infamy" radio speech that was broadcast to the nation.

Both historical sites will host special Pearl Harbor Day ceremonies.

On Dec. 7, 2001, the National Museum of the Pacific War is joining the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association in hosting "Remember Pearl Harbor 2001," the official mainland commemoration of the 60th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Teacher must make every child safe from classmates' ridicule

QUESTION: You once wrote about an overweight fourth-grade girl who was teased by nine aggressive boys as she entered the classroom — all while the teacher looked on in silence. What would you have done if you had been the teacher on that day?

DR. DOBSON: Those mocking, joking boys would have had a fight on their hands, I promise you that. Of course, it would have been better if the embarrassment could have been prevented by discussing the feelings of others from the first day of school. But if the conflict occurred as described, with the girl, "Nancy," suddenly being humiliated for everyone to see, I would have thrown the full weight of my authority and respect on her side of the battle.

My spontaneous response would have carried this general theme: "Wait just a minute! By what right do any of you boys say such mean, unkind things to Nancy? I want to know which of you is so perfect that the rest of us couldn't make fun of you in some way? I know you all very well. I know about your homes and your school records and some of your personal secrets. Would you like me to share them with the class, so we can all laugh at you the way you just did at Nancy? I could do it! I could make you want to crawl into a hole and disappear."

"But listen to me! You need not fear. I will never embarrass you in that way. Why not? Because it hurts to be laughed at by your friends. It hurts even more than a stubbed toe or a cut finger or a bee sting.

"I want to ask those of you who were having such a good time a few minutes ago: Have you ever had a group of students make fun of you in the same way? If you haven't, then brace yourself. Someday it will happen to you, too. Eventually you will say or do something foolish — something that will cause everyone to point at you and laugh in your face. And when it happens, I want you to remember what happened today."

Then I'd address the entire class: "Let's make sure that we learn something important from what took place here this afternoon. First, we will not be mean to each other in this class. We will laugh together when things are funny, but we will not do it by making one person feel bad. "Second, I will never intentionally embarrass anyone in this class. You can count on that. Each of you is a child of God. You were made with His loving hands, and He has said that we all have equal worth as human beings. This means that Susie is neither better nor worse than Wade or Mary or Brent."

"Sometimes I think maybe you believe a few of you are more important than others. It isn't true. Every one of you is priceless to God, and each of you will live forever in eternity. That's how valuable you are. God loves every boy and girl in this room, and because of that, I love every one of you. He wants us to be kind to other people, and we're going to be practicing that kindness through the rest of this year."

When a strong, loving teacher comes to the aid of the least

respected child in her class, something dramatic occurs in the emotional climate of the room. Every child seems to utter an audible sigh of relief. The same thought is bouncing around in many little heads: "If Nancy is safe from ridicule — even Nancy — then I must be safe too." You see, by defending the least popular child in the room, a teacher is demonstrating (1) that she has no "pets"; (2) that she respects everyone; (3) that she will fight for anyone who is being treated unjustly. Those are three virtues that children value highly and that contribute to mental health.

And may I suggest to parents: Defend the underdog in your neighborhood. Let it be known that you have the confidence to speak for the outcast. Explain this philosophy to your neighbors, and try to create an emotional harbor for the little children whose ship has been threatened by a storm of rejection. Don't be afraid to exercise leadership on behalf of a youngster who is being verbally mauled. There is no more worthy investment of your time and energy.
