> **About Defoliating Of The Cotton Crop**

Desiccation (usually called Defoliation), is it good or bad? "Either can be true," says B.

B. Manly, Jr., In-Charge of the USDA, Cotton Classing Office in Abilene, Texas.

Defoliation before cotton is ma ture can be disastrous. It can cause low mike readings, lower grades poor turnouts at the gin, and low yields. If the crop is mature, proper defoliation can not damage it Some advantages of proper defoli ation are: The crop is harvested early with less chance of damage or loss from bad weather. It kills harmful insects and it gives an opportunity to rotate cropland.

Applied properly, defoliants can be economical, but improper use can be costly and dangerous. An arsenic solution can kill people, cattle, pets, insects, or about any thing that comes in contact with it. Care should be exercised to not allow wind to carry it into pastures or feed crops. Arsenic acid will not evaporate or just go away. It is absorbed by the plant. It can be dangerous.
