Tucker Drilling Co., Inc.,- and Clyde M. Rascoe, San Angelo, will drill the No. 1-A P. K. McIntosh, a 6,000-foot Strawn wildcat, in southeast Schleicher county, 11 miles southeast of Eldorado, two miles southwest of the depleted one-well Page, South (Strawn oil) field and 1 5/8 miles north-northwest of the depleted one-well Mc-Intosh gas field.

The project, being drilled with Tucker rig, was drilling below 1,535 feet in shale, lime and sand after setting 8 5/8-inch casing at 533.75 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of 86-K-GH& SA. Ground elevation is 2,373 ft. It is also 5/8 mile southwest of

746 Poll Taxes Paid In Schleicher County

Sheriff Orval Edmiston and his deputies were kept busy Saturday morning and all day Monday receiving Poll Tax payments. The sheriff reported making some appointments for the hours between 5:00 p.m. Monday and the midnight deadline.

A total of 746 poll tax payments were made, which compares well with the 790 paid in 1964, a Presidential election year.

Also, 19 exemptions were issued to voters becoming 21 this year, and who vote free their first year.

The county's voting strength also includes the 300 or so voters over 61 years of age, who are exempt from the poll tax. So it's somewhere between 1,000 and 1100 Schleicherites who are fully qualified to vote this year in all elections.

Tuesday was the first of February and that was the day that sale of 1966 license tags for vehicles was started. The tags are on sale during the months of February and March and must be on all vehicles no later than the first of April.

Sheriff Edmiston reminded local residents that when the new license tags are sold, he or his deputy is required by law to examine the title and license receipt, and that it will facilitate sale of the new tags if you will have these documents with you when you go to purchase your new tags.

These exemptions apply to food, drugs, farm machinery, alcoholic beverages, industrial and agricultural fuel and power. Atwell doubts that the legislature will tamper with the food, medicine and farm implements. He expressed a personal preference for a rate hike if new money is manda-

Committee also is going to study the likely effect of income taxation and corporation tax formula adjustments.

As a possible method of equalizing the property tax, the committee will evaluate results of assigning each county its equitable share of the ad valorem loan on the basis of estimated fair market values. Voters would have to approve such a procedure by Constitutional amendment.

Citizens of some counties now are paving seven times as much tax on proyerty with the same value as do citizens of other counties.




