Changing Spelling Of Eldorado Comes Up At City Council

A resolution having to do with the spelling of Eldorado, was adopted by the City Council in a recent meeting, and a copy is due to be mailed to the Postmaster General in Washington, D. C.

The resolution, as it appears on the minutes is as follows: "A Resolution amending the City

Charter, and authorizing the change of the spelling of Eldorado, Texas to read El Dorado, Texas.

Adopting of this resolution is but another step in a movement started last year to adopt the Spanish spelling, and it comes after the city investigated the various legal ways in which it might be done.

Eldorado is a member of the Texas League of Municipalities, an organization that provides legal advice to its member cities. When Eldorado City Secretary inquired about the problem of changing the spelling, he was advised by the there were three ways to go about

(1) Call a special election and put the question to a vote of the qualified voteds.

(2) Have a special bill introduced in the State Legislature.

(3) Change the spelling by adopting a resolution. (This would be legal providing there was no formal objection from citizens.)

The city governing body has now taken this third step.




Travelers Increase 17% In Texas In '65 Over '64



I was deeply disappointed that one of those amendments-providing an income-tax credit for college expenses, was narrowly defeated. I have, for some years now, been seeking to achieve such an education tax credit. And, although the attempt was unsuccessful this time, I am confident the idea eventually will be adopted. I plan to continue my campaign to achieve that goal.

An education tax credit would provide taxpayers up to \$325 in savings on their necessary expenses for college tuition, fees, books and supplies. Such a credit is not the same as a tax deduction. The credit means a subtraction from the amount of taxes an individual otherwise would pay. It is subtracted at the end of the incometax form, after the tax due has


