Renticare got a big boost last week when the House, by an 8vote margin, yielded to heavy White House leadership pressures, and approved funds to initiate the program. Observers insist it was the heaviest lobbying they have seen applied for a long time.

Ten Texas members voted for this subsidy plan, while nine of us voted against it.

Renticare was copied from the British welfare state, where it has been used for a number of years. authorization for it was rammed through Congress last year—by a 6-vote margin. But after authorizing the project last year the House, by a vote of 185-to-162, refused to provide the money to start it. This and the vote last week saw a reversal of the prior action, after the big lobby guns-headed by Postmaster General Larry O'Brien and Housing Secretary Robert Weaver were rushed to Capitol Hill with their staffs of experts in the art






