## SUICIDE

Frailan R. Hernandez, 46-year-old Eldorado Latin, placed the barrel of a .22 caliber rifle in his mouth at his home and pulled the trigger about 6:45 a.m., Tuesday.

Sheriff Edmiston being notified, arrived at the scene in a few minutes followed by Dr. E. F. Vernezobre. The victim was still alive when they arrived, but died shortly afterward and before the arrival of an ambulance.

Mr. Hernandez leaves a wife and a number of children. According to Sheriff Edmiston, he also has a brother living in Coahoma and his father at Idalou.

Residents here report that Hernandez family moved here from Sonora about 8 years ago and that he worked for a time for Jess Koy and J. T. Jackson. Lately he had worked part time for Gibson's fence company.

Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home reported Wednesday that funeral services were pending. They would not be held earlier than Thursday, and possibly later.

## County Enjoys Series Of Rains

Starting about the middle of April and continuing through Sunday, May 1st, Schleicher county has experienced a spell of cloudy weather that brought fog, sprinkles and sometimes hard showers.

According to Lloyd Johnson of the Soil Conservation office, Eldorado was credited with 2.04 inches for the whole period, while the average of his three county gauges was 2.04. Since the S.C.S. office has figures from only two gauges outside the city, the above figures are not an accurate average for the county as a whole.

Dick Preston reports 4.90 up to 5½ inches on his ranch in west part of the county, and Howard Derrick came up with 3½ inches on his ranch in east Schleicher.

Claude Doyle reports only 1.90 for the period which is nearly the same as the city.

All parts of the county apparently benefitted and the country is rapidly greening up.

### Interest High

There is much interest in some local races as well as higher ones, a speculation has been rife for some time on "who will make the run-off." The Second Democratic Primary, or run-off, comes in June. The run-off primary is held to decide races in which no candidate

got a clear majority of votes in the first primary.

### Local Races

Interest has run high for the past several weeks in the local races for County Judge, and Commissioners, J. P. Enoch, County Clerk, and A. G. McCormack, County Treasurer, were unopposed as they announced for re-election.

Five candidates came out for Judge, after the incumbent, W. R. Bearce, announced this year that he would not seek re-election after being in office about 12 years.

The five hopefuls out for Judge are: Tom Ratliff, Thomas W. Baker, Tom M. Dempsey, Joe A. Wagley, and Robert L. McWhorter.

In Precinct 1, the incumbent Justice of the Peace, B. L. Blake-way, is opposed by Jack Halbert Jr.

Out in the county, interest is centered in races for Commissioner.

Gene McCalla, completing his first term as Commissioner of Precinct 2, is opposed by George Humphrey.

In the Attorney General's race, Crawford Martin, Galloway Calhoun and Franklin Spears are the candidates.

Hilary B. Doran Jr. of Val Verde county and Albert R. Smith of Maverick county are the candidates for our newly-created 65th Representative District.

P. S. Ervin and Paul B. Haring are trying to unseat Byron Tunnel as Railroad Commissioner. Fred Williams of Val Verde county is running against Jerry Sadler for Commissioner of General Land Office.

## Expansion Program On At El Dorado Woolens

There's a new look at El Dorado Woolens, and things are beginning to hum.

Activity has been at a slow pace for the community's number one industry for the past few weeks brought on by the necessity of replacement of a large part of the mill's antiquated machinery. But with the receipt and installation of modern new equipment by the mill's production manager, Jack Hannes, prospects are extremely bright for full production in the near future.

Through new technology and research, advances have been made in the quality of items produced by the local mill. For the first time, blankets are now being produced from wool and mohair that are acceptable to the general retail trade. New items in drapery fabrics, garments styled by Mrs. Lana de Risi, and her daughter, Marisa Jenkins, and brightly colored plaid robes in various patterns, are rapidly finding public acceptance throughout the Southwest.

Products from the local industry are now being marketed in seven states. Texas has been the prime market, but Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Utah and Nevada are now being introduced to El Dorado Woolens. Plans for the future include the establishment of wholesale and retail outlets on the West Coast, with the Los Angeles and San Francisco areas being primary sales areas.

Attracting the most attention from the buying public in addition to the new blanket lines designed for use in temperature controlled homes, is the new drapery fashioned exclusively from wool and mohair blended yarn. Two large jobbers, Reese B. Davis Company of Ft. Worth, and W. B. Payne and Company of Dallas, are handling the sale of all drapery fabric lines at the present. West Texans will be able to see these attractive fabrics in such places as the new San Angelo National and Central

National banks in San Angelo, and the exclusive Inn of the Hills in Kerrville.

Garment sales of the de Risi fashions have become widely accepted. Improved fabric in ladies slacks, scialles, and dress materials have been attention-getters. As a result of these sales, several local seamstresses have been added to the mill's production line.

**COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN**

Safety on the highway is everyone's business but especially that of the driver of the family automobile.

Attention is called to statistics recently released by a major insurance company dealing with deaths and injuries from automobile accidents during 1965. The report shows that more than 50% of the highway deaths last year occurred during the week end from Friday through Sunday. The most dangerous day is Saturday. Week-ends usually find the family together for the trip to the country or a recreation area. It should be the kind of trip that is made at a leisurely speed and as safe as the family driver can make it. But instead, the statistics tell the story.

Out of the 48,500 killed and the more than 4,000,000 injured in automobile accidents in 1965, over 28,000 died during the weekend period and almost 2,000,000 were injured. The most dangerous hours on the highway are those between 5 and 8 p.m.

Defensive driving is suggested as one means of cutting down the ever-increasing toll in death and destruction from highway accidents. The defensive driver concentrates on two things: maintaining his own driving at a perfectly safe level while he performs cer-

tain basic actions which might prevent accidents if other drivers or pedestrians are less than careful.

The defensive driver takes no chances at intersections, being on the alert for those less careful and always driving so a sudden stop can be made if necessary. He drives at a safe distance from the vehicle ahead and governs his speed when passing parked cars by the twin hazards of cars leaving the curb without warning and youngsters darting from between the cars. He practices driving habits which he wishes others would employ.

People call it "take-home" pay because there is no other place you can afford to go with it.

Deferred grazing is one of the best practices available for improving the condition of ranges. It is nothing more than the removal of livestock from a pasture for a part of or preferably the entire growing season to allow the forage plants to resupply food reserves in the root system, make top growth to produce food, and produce seed for natural revegetation.

Deferment of rangeland is recommended not only after a drought but should also follow brush and weed control programs, seeding and fire.

Coupled with deferment, attention should be given to the balancing of livestock numbers with the forage being produced in order to get the best use from the forage. When the forage is properly used, litter accumulates on the soil surface. This litter is not wasted but serves as an aid to more efficient water use, soil stabilization and improved soil fertility.

### Death Rate Low From Snake Bite

Austin.—The snake member of the balance-of-nature brigade may be badly libeled, judging by casualty statistics reported to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The Department learned from the State Department of Health that wasps are more deadly than snakes, so far as human beings are concerned.

The health agency's bureau of vital statistics advised that only five persons are known to have died from snake bites in Texas in the last three years, and that only ten persons succumbed from that cause in the last ten years.

The statisticians informed the Department that four of the ten fatalities occurred in 1965. But in the preceding two years there was only one death from snake bites, one in 1964 and none in 1963.

A Department spokesman pointed out that many persons are bitten, but that improved modern treatment techniques and faster transportation means taking the victim to professional care reduces the death rate.

It also was suggested that a better informed public concerning simple outdoor hazards contributes to the improved safeguards. The Department said all advices pinpoint the fact that anyone bitten by a poisonous snake should avoid exertion and try not to panic, with the realization that chances of survival will be increased immeasurably with the best possible composure.
