# Co-Op Qualifies

The Eldorado Success Tuesday received a telegram from U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough confirming that the local Co-Op had qualified for a new loan from the Rural Electrification Administration. The telegram, which is selfexplanatory, is as follows:

"Senator Ralph Yarborough announced today that the Rural Electrification Administration has approved a loan for the Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative in the amount of \$549,000, including \$42,100 of previous REA loan. Funds will be used to finance 70 miles of distribution lines to serve 400 new customers and to finance extensive system improvements including 4 miles of new tie lines and conversion of 40 miles of existing lines and related facilities."
