Army bytes...digital dog tags The Pentagon will provide ev-

ery G.I. with a wearable data storage device. Soldiers will wear their Personal information carriers (PICs) around their necks with their regular dog tags.

The matchbook-size device. dubbed a digital dog tag, weighs only two grams, and contains a soldier's complete medical history. Doctors in the field can easily insert the PIC into a laptop computer at a Battalion Aid Station to obtain and then update a soldier's medical records.

Calling Mr. Sandman

Two out of three Americans don't get the recommended eight hours of sleep, according to the National Sleep Foundation. That's a problem, because sleepy students are hard to teach, drowsy drivers cause auto accidents and worn-out employees make mistakes that cost the U.S. economy \$150 billion in lost productivity each year.

A Congressional study reported that lack of sleep led to errors in critical thinking in three major disasters: the Challenger Space Shuttle explosion, the Exxon Valdez oil spill and the rear-meltdown at Three Mile Isand. A Brown University study also confirmed what may seem obvious to parents - teens go to bed and wake up later than other age groups. Some school districts have pushed start times to a more teen-friendly 9 a.m., and student performance has improved.



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
