"Each month 120,000 Americans reach age 65." according to Ted F. Moellering, district manager. "If these people wish to have medical insurance starting with the month they reach age 65, they must apply for it during the three - month period before the month in which they become 65.'

A person who will be 65 in January, 1967, should apply during October, November or December. If he waits until January, the medical insurance will be effective in

During dry years when forage becomes short, livestock should be culled and sold. When deer are grazing the area, the livestock stocking rate must be adjusted to maintain forage for the number of wildlife that is estimated on the range. Livestock and wildlife should not be competition for available for-

Advantage should be taken of hunting leases to increase total ranch income.

Stocking rates should be based on the amount of forage available and not on the amount of rainfall that is expected to grow the grass crop. A range inventory to determine stocking rates should be made during August or September and again at the beginning of the growing season. Livestock numbers should be adjusted at the time of the survey to maintain forage production. The main thing is to adjust the livestock numbers before the grass supply is used.
