## Hilary Doran Provides Legal Help to Hospital Committee

Del Rio, won the nomination in the Democratic primary as State Representative from the 65th Legislative district which now includes Schleicher county. Although the nomination is equivalent to election, Mr. Doran will not be officially elected until returns are in from the general election Tuesday, Nov. 8, and he won't take office until Jan. 1st.

This, however, is not preventing Mr. Doarn from already being of assistance to his future constituents, and this week Eldorado's Hospital Executive Committee acknowledges the first of such assistance.

The committee had turned to Doran for information on legal steps necessary in the formation of a Hospital District and on Monday received from him a sheaf of mat erial dealing with the problem.

In his letter he specified that the creation of a Hospital District is governed by Section 9, Article 9, of the Constitution. It specifies the requirements that must be met in the creation of such Districts and their powers and responsibilities. There are two main conditions that PRECEDE the establishment of a District.

(1) An act passed by the Legislature, specifying the territory to be included. (In our case it would be the boundaries of the county.)

(2) Following that, it takes approval by a majority vote of the "qualified property tax paying electors" of the county, at a special election.

Our readers should notice the sequence of these two steps-FIRST the Legislature passes a bill creating the district.

AFTER that has been done, voters of the county can confirm or reject the proposition. Passage of the bill in the Legislature does not put the District in business until voters of the county confirm it.





The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National date line. Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test February 25, 1967.

Participating students pay a \$1 school to Science Research Associates (SRA), the testing lagency. When the test is given on a Saturday, the school may charge an additional fee up to \$1 for special administrative costs of testing on a nonschool day. If a student is unbe paid by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) at Pfc. Larry E. Donaldson Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) at

the request of his school. In addition to competing for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1968, students can take the test to obtain information useful in planning their future education and careers. With his NMSQT scores, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him evaluate his scores, compare his performance with that of other high school students across the country, and give him information on choosing a college and financing his education. The handbook and other interpretive materials are furnished as a part of reporting the test results.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Semifinalists and will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In addition to the National Merit Scholarships financed by NMSC, more than 350 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, other organizations. and individuals offer scholarships thru the Merit Program.

About 13,440 students have won Merit Scholarships in the 11 Merit Programs to date. Some 2330 Merit Scholarships were awarded in 1966 with stipends ranging from \$100 to \$1,500 per year for four college years. The amount of a winner's award is determined by assessing the financial assistance he will need to attend the college of his

#### The Absentee Vote

In close elections, the absentee vote often decides the issue. In the 1960 presidential election, Richard M. Nixon carried the state of California by the absentee vote. There are countless examples of absentee votes making "the" difference between defeat and victory in close elections.

It has been estimated that there are nearly a million Americans presently outside the continental limits of the United States. In addition to this, there are always countless thousands of potential voters away from their home precincts on Election Day but still within the borders of the United States. 

ada's International Exhibition opening April 28th—will be a permanent housing complex to remain in Harbor City, Montreal, after the fair's six-month run comes to an end.

Designed by 28-year-old architect Moshe Safdie, "Habitat 67" appears to be a modern adaptation of the Hanging Gardens of Babylon. The apartments, ranging from one to four bedrooms, will be arranged in a "free floating" form, allowing each living unit complete separation from all others.

The purpose of Habitat 67 is to solve the problem of overurbanization and resulting lack of family identity. Every home in the complex will have its own automatically watered and fer-tilized garden, formed by the roof of the unit beneath. Units will be connected by vertical roads and pedestrian walks. 

All producers should be inter ested in automatic re-certification three years hence. To be eligible for automatic re-certification the county as a whole must have 15% of all female stock going to slaughter inspected at the packing house.

Here are the facts:

If cattle are going directly to slaughter from the ranch, back tags are obtainable at the County Agent's office.

If your cattle go through an auction ring, the auction barn is responsible for tagging your cattle if bought by a packer buyer. The federal government pays .10 cents for this service. Barns can do it themselves or contract the tagging EL DORADO HARDWARE CO. to other individuals.

Producers should take the time to know who does the tagging. So Thurman, Carolyn O'Harrow, and the countc will receive credit.

Here are tips on starting cattle on feed, based on Texas A&M University research.

Cattle which have been creep fed or have had grain on grass can be started in drylot on a mixture of 80% concentrates and 20% roughage. Decrease the roughage by 10% and increase the concentrate by 10% at the end of one week. Then, feed a mixture of 90% concentrate and 10% roughgo for the rest of the finishing

Cattle that are not accustomed to concentrate feeds can be started on feed by either of two methods

Begin with a mixture of 60% concentrates and 40% roughage. Gradually, during a 2-week period, increase the concentrates and decrease the roughage until they are getting 90% concentrates and 10%

roughage. Another method is to begin with the 90% concentrate and 10% roughage mixture and limit the aily feed per head to no more than 1% of the body weight. Increase the amount of feed daily until the cattle are getting all they will eat at the end of 2 weeks. Continue feeding this mixture un-

till cattle are finished. Daily feed requirements for all weights of cattle vary from 2 to 4% of body weight, depending on percent concentrate in the mix-

Researchers at Texas A&M are studying feeding cattle on all-grain and protein supplement and on all concentrate rations. They are find ing that cattle gain more efficiently but there is a good deal of risk of founder, liver abscesses and high death losses.

No definite recommendations on all-concentrate or all-grain feeding can be made until more research is done.

While it is convenient to have a can of gasoline for lawn mowers and other small engines around the home and farm, the fuel should not be stored more than 2 months. Gasoline is made of a blend of several parts. The parts that provide engines with easy starting is

volatile and evaporates rapidly Most of this can be lost in about "Soon after the volatile part evaporates, the heavier parts of the gasoline begin to settle and

create "gasoline gum." This gum can foul up an engine, even when used in small amounts of fresh gasoline. Plan gasoline storage so that it

will be used in about 3 weeks. Another consideration is the kind of storage and the place where tanks are kept.

A dark-colored storage tank in bright sunlight can lose 10% of its capacity in 3 months. By painting the tank white or aluminum paint the loss can be reduced by one-third.

Large tanks kept under shade and equipped with pressure vents will reduce losses, to about 1% in the summertime.
