ball in the season's finale last Friday night; they earned touchdowns while Ozona honestly earned one and scored their second and winning margin on a one-in-500-chance "live fumble" suffered by the Eagles on/about their own 30-vard line.

The Eagles got only one break in the night's activities; but they suffered not only the "live fumble" misfortune, but two failures to kick extra points after touchdowns, a blocked try for a field goal, and an Eagle receiver who dropped a pass in the Lion end zone which would have given the Eagles the win.

The Eagle break came after the 'Thin Green Line" had stepped out front 6-0 in the first quarter. Ozona was forced into a punting situation on Eldorado's 48-yard line. The Lions faked the punt and ran instead to the Eagle 15-yard line; but a field judge ruled a Lion backfield man in motion and the ball was brought back and five yards assessed the Lions; so they did punt this time and the Eagles got the ball safely.

Then the Lions were grinding away at the "Thin Green Line" and tried a long pass which R. Davidson as Eagle safety snatched out of the Lion receiver's hands and ran to the Lion 12-yard line. Granted, this is an elegant kind of coffee cake, I'm suggesting, but just 6 ingredients plus topping. And the beverage? Eggnog. Cooling, calming, delicious as you tally the returns.

FRUIT FESTIVAL CAKE

- 2 cups Bisquick 1 cup plus 2 tablespoons
- 1/4 cup shortening (part butter)
- 1 egg
- 11/4 cups milk 11/2 teaspoons vanilla
- Fruit Topping (below) Whipped cream

Heat oven to 350°. Grease and flour a square pan, 9x9x2". Mix Bisquick and sugar; add shortening, egg and ½ cup of the milk. Beat vigorously 1½ minutes. Gradually add the remaining milk and the vanilla. Beat 30 seconds. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 40 to 45 minutes. Cut into squares. Top with Fruit Topping; garnish with whipped cream. 9

Fruit Topping: Mix 1 can (83/4 ounces) crushed pineapple, 1 cup cranberry sauce and 1 cup finely chopped unpared red apple. Let stand at room temperature.

Home Demonstration Agent's Column By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

Check the calendar. Only a few days are left until Thanksgiving. It's time to place your order for the traditional turkey, if you have not already done so. Shopping a little early assures you of getting just the size bird you want.

To be sure of quality, you'll probably want to buy a turkey that has been graded by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service. Birds somme, water or milk have to be inspected before they can be graded, so you're automatirally assured of wholesomeness.

To rate U.S. Grade A, the turkey must have a well-fleshed, long and broad breast. The entire carcass must be well-covered with fat. It has an overall pleasing appearance—no pinfeathers and only a few cuts, tears and bruises. It has lightly. Add more salt and seasonno broken bones, and the breast and back may be slightly curved.

After the inside of the turkey has been washed, and cavity should be salted and stuffed, if desired. (Stuffing recipe follows.) To hold the wings in place during cooking, bring wing tips onto the back of the bird and place over the flap of neck skin. Wrap string around the ends of the legs and tail, then tie. Or if there is a band of skin above the tail, tuck the legs into

Brush the skin with soft butter, margarine or other shortening. If you use a meat thermometer, place it in a thick, meaty part like the thigh, so it does not touch bone and can easily be read.

Place the turkey on a rack in the roasting pan to keep it out of the juice. A good way to insure even browning of large turkeys is to start roasting the turkey breast side down, then turn the bird breast side up for the last hour of cooking.

Sometimes turning the turkey is just too difficult. You also can get good results by roasting the turkey breast side up for the entire cooking period. To prevent exces sive browning and drying out, cover the bird with a piece of cheesecloth dipped in melted fat or a tent of aluminum foil.

Baste the turkey several times during roasting. When it is half or two thirds done, cut the string or skin to release the legs.

Roasting time is affected by the size of the turkey, and whether or not it is stuffed. There are several quick ways to tell if the turkey is done to tender perfection. The drumsticks should twist freely and the joint break easily. The meat in the fleshy areas like thighs and breast should feel soft when pres sed with the fingers. If a meat thermometer is used, the internal temperatures should register at the poultry mark-around 190 to 200 degrees F.



- 3/4 cup shortening
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon cloves

1 cup raisins.

- 1 cup brown sugar, packed
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup grated raw carrot
- 1/4 cup milk

Sift together flour, instant potato, baking soda and salt. Combine nuts and fruit with flour mixture. Cream shortening, spices and sugar. Beat in eggs, blend in carrots and milk. Add floured fruits and nuts; mix well. Pour into well greased 1-1/2 quart mold; cover tightly. Place on rack in steamer or deep kettle. Add enough boiling water to reach about 1/3 of the depth of the mold. Steam 2 hours. Serve with rum flavored hard sauce. Portions for twelve.



- 1/4 cup water

- 1/2 cup red cinnamon candy 1 bunch watercress
- 1 jar spiced peaches

Score ham with diamond pattern, place on heavy duty foil in baking pan. Mix honey, water, A.1., lemon juice, candy in separate pan. Bring to boil, simmer until candy dissolves. Pour half of mixture over ham, form foil loosely around ham so juices are retained. Bake at

350°, 10-15 min. per lb. A half-hour before serving, remove from oven. Spread liberally with remaining mixture. Increase heat to 400°, leave foil open. Baste often for good red glaze. Serve on bed of watercress, surrounded by spiced peaches, for festive look.

Halfback Thomas D. Hoyas captured the fall in the air and taking advantage of the sudden shift in offensive and defensive roles ran the 35 yards back across the Eagle goal line. The try for extra point was good and the third quarter score stood Eldorado, 12; Ozona, 7

The fourth quarter saw the Lions clearly earn their touchdown. Eldorado's "Thin Green Line" stood up manfully all night except on the following two occasions: Eldorado's P. Childers punted to the Ozona 20 where the ball was put in play. The Lion's Ramos successfully turned the corner around Eldorado's left end and ran for 70 yards before he was hauled down near the 10-yard line. On the second play following, the Lions breached the "Thin Green Line" and Ramos drove across to put Ozona ahead 13-12. Ozona's attempt at a two-point conversion failed.

That was the ball game except the Eagles nearly scored again on a pass which landed in an Eagle receiver's hands behind the Lion goal line only to trickle through and when J. Mayo attempted a field goal from some 15 yards out, this attempt being blocked.

Two Eagles distinguished themselves in the fourth quarter to set up these Eagle threats. They were P. Dempsey and J. Halbert who blocked an Ozona punt on/about Ozona's 30-yard line, Halbert doing the actual block and covering the ball. It was a clean skillful block and drew no "roughing the kicker" penalty.

The Eagles suffered from the "Three-Monkey-like" behavior of the headlineman whose myopic vision missed an Ozona man's offensive holding and probable misbehavior against B. DeLong, completely out in the clear and within 10 feet of this official. There was a flagrant example of piling on when D. Rogers completed a pass, stumbled, and fell. While he was lying prostrate, a Lion defender leaped on Rogers and dug his helmet in Roger's back. Incidentally the penalty here would have placed the ball within Ozona's 10-yard line. Again, a Lion defender flagrantly tackled an Eagle out of bounds in what was certainly sticky territory as far as rules go.

This does not imply criticism of Ozona for the officials' actions since a commissioner of referees for District 8A assigns officials for each game and school officials are not to blame for such apparent incompetence. Consideration is also given to the fact that as many as 500 pairs of highly partisan eyes may be so biased that anything is wrong; but then again, 500 pairs obtained from any of the cast or of eyes are not necessarily always at the door the night of the perwrong. This official invited criti- formance. cism by neither seeing, hearing, or doing anything in at least one or two of these instances.

The Eldorado Eagles deserve commendation for their efforts in this last game. They staged what was nearly a David versus Goliath performance, only their rock did not quite hit a vital place.



Air Standards Hearing Set

Air Control Board set January 5 for public hearing on proposed regulations to control pollution from smoke and particulate mat-

Federal Lands

Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has gone on record as favoring a plan to give to the individual states control of the revenue from federally owned lands within the states.

Sadler said he will make that recommendation to the federal Land Law Review Commission, of which he is a member.

His plan would give to the state in which the land is located 40% of the revenue from that land. Other 60% would be divided among the other 49 states. Texas has no federal lands.

Proposal would exclude national parks and military reservations, but Sadler feels that all the other federally owned land could be put to better use, since state agencies and state officials could do a better job of supervising the use of the land.
