End Of Ginning Season Is Now Close, Weather Permitting

With all cotton ginned out that was on the yard, Monday morning saw a total of 1,122 bales ginned up to that time, according to Wayne Mikeska. He said he could see 200 more bales to come and they could possibly wind up the season this year—but only if favorable weather would prevail.

Damp weather with clouds, fog

and cold wind has been the pattern for several weeks, and Sunday morning saw the entire county covered with several inches of snow. Although it all melted the same day it left the ground wet and again delayed field operations.

As usual, lack of rainfall during the growing season is blanted for the short crop. Generous rains covered the entire county in mid-September which was a boon to ranchers and small gain, but it was too late to be of benefit to cotton.

San Angelo Youth Electrocuted On Grandfather's Farm

Steve Wayne Daniels, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Daniels of San Angelo, was electrocuted about 9:00 a.m., Saturday while rabbit hunting on his grandfather's ranch 12 miles south of Eldorado.

The youth was hunting with a brother Kenneth Daniels, 13, and a cousin, James Daniels, when the accident occurred.

The boys had chased a rabbit into an aluminum irrigation pipe about 100 yards from the W. O. Faull home. The boys lifted the pipe and wind caught it blowing it into a high voltage highline.

Steve Daniels was pronounced dead on arrival at Sonora hospital. His brother was burned on his hands and legs in the accident, but was released from the hospital later in the day.

Funeral services for Steve were held in the West Side Baptist Church, San Angelo, at 2:00 p.m. Monday, and interment was made in Eldorado cemetery under direction of Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral
