This is strictly a fact finding survey, with the results being used in an effort to attract industry to the area, and is not for a particular company.

The survey will be in the form of stories in local publications. It is pointed out that the sponsoring organizations are interested in receiving replies from people who might presently be employed, but looking for other opportunities as well as those unemployed. Names of persons desiring employment are also solicited.

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Late-Starting Littlefield Rams Mules 21-3 in Hometown Opener

For one glorious frame (plus a minute into the second stand) it looked good for the Muleshoe Mules. They ran, they tackled and they kicked a field goal. And then the fuse burned out. After that it was Littlefield all the way, despite some rather clumsy plays on the part of the invading Wildcats. The final score was 21-3. And that just about tells the story.

It was early in the second quarter that Muleshoe's Andy Stovall, the boy with the educated toe, sent the oval spinning through the uprights for a field goal -- Muleshoe's one and only score for the evening.

That had come about as a result of a series of plays in the late seconds of the first quarter. Littlefield had taken the ball to the Muleshoe 4-yard

line, making a strong bid for a TD. Big Danny Lambeth, Wildcat fullback, had done a lot of the ball carrying in that short march that ended in a fumble and Muleshoe recovered.

Then came Muleshoe's chance, and Stovall went into action with his toe routine from the Littlefield 20. The kick was good.

But right after that, things began to change.

Littlefield, apparently irked by that 3-0 set-up, went into action in a big way.

Receiving the Mule KO after the field goal, Littlefield returned the oval to their own 37 after a nice pushback by Billy Henderson.

Littlefield started goalward with the big fullback, Wilmer

Williams and Henderson doing most of the ball-lugging.

In a series of straight lines backs and end sweeps, Littlefield advanced to the 9 then Manning pushed the ball down to the 4. And then butterfingers got the Wildcats, they fumbled and Bruce Purdy recovered for the Mules.

Muleshoe was held for downs, but Embry got off a good punt on fourth to place the ball on the LFL 40.

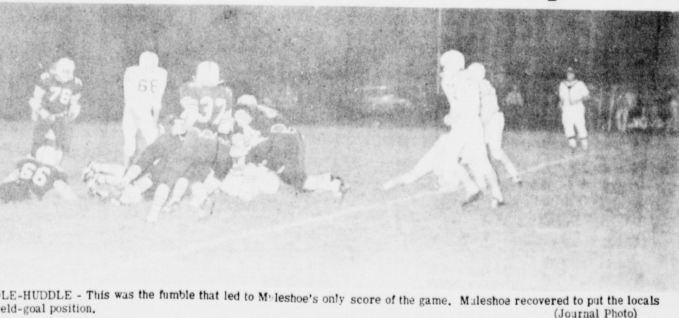
And that's when the Littlefield outfield started another march. Straight football with lots of power where needed, accounted for the Wildcats' first (of three for the evening) touchdown. Lambeth pushed his big frame across the goal line for the TD, and Kuntz kicked the extra point to give the

Wildcats a 7-3 edge in the second quarter.

Littlefield scored again near the middle of third quarter. An intercepted Mule pass resulted in a 52-yard return by Mike Grissom which started things going again for the Wildcats.

Quarterback Mike Grissom hit paydirt from two yards out about midway in the third stanza, and Kevin Hutson a junior defensive cornerback picked off a Mule pass with only two minutes left on the clock and sprinted 75 yards for the Wildcats' final score.

Littlefield dominated the statistics, piling up 203 yards on offense to 100 for the Mules. Defensively, guards Wilmer Williams and Danny Lambeth led the Wildcat defense.

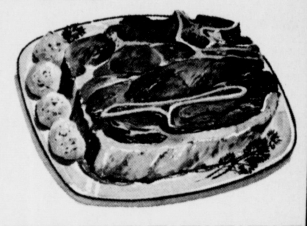

Mrs. Tower said "Mr. Tower and I are both teachers and we are not only interested in education but in reading. So, naturally books and libraries are of special interest to us."

Muleshoe Floral, Decorator 216 and Beavers Flowerland placed floral arrangements at the library for the occasion. She also visited the site of the Mule Memorial Statue and was given an honorary membership in the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Tower commented, "I feel quite honored by being a recipient of this membership. I have come from northern Texas to the tip of Texas and this is my first time to be a Chamber of Commerce member."

Mrs. John Tower, the wife of U. S. Senator John Tower, is the former Lou Bullington of Wichita Falls, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grover Bullington.

Lou attended Wichita Falls public schools and received a bachelor of arts degree from Texas Woman's University in Denton and a bachelor of music degree from Midwestern University in Wichita Falls.

Senator and Mrs. Tower met after World War II when the Senator's father was pastor of the Wichita Falls First Methodist Church where she was organist.

Later, John Tower completed schooling at Southwestern University, a master in government at Southern Methodist University, and graduate work at the University of London. He joined the faculty of Midwestern University in Wichita Falls where Lou was teaching music, and they were later married. In addition to an active and interesting life as a homemaker and senator's wife, she has taken time to complete a course in Spanish.

To keep informed about the work in the Nation's Capitol, she is a member of the Capitol Hill Club, hearing news-worthy speakers on current events. To help maintain old and new friendships among Texans in the area, Lou is a member of the Texas Delegation Wives Club and the Texas State Society.

Because their daughters, Penny, Marian and Jeanne were hardly more than babies at the time (they are now 12, 11 and 10 respectively) and Mrs. Tower was needed at home, she had done little or no active politicking.

After Mr. Tower won the election and the family settled down in Bethesda, Maryland, for the six years he would spend in office as the first Republican senator from Texas since 1870, her interest in politics naturally heightened. A deep and very real wish to help him and the people he represents in government, coupled with the fact the children are older and this semester are settled in comfortably with her parents at Wichita Falls, leads Mrs. Tower on this tour of smaller towns in Texas.

Mrs. Tower has no dread of "what to say" to interviewers or to crowds. In her soft but Texas twang, she said, "Oh I just say something. I like to talk to anybody, and after all, I'm not the candidate - I'm just the candidate's wife, I don't have to talk politics."

Her husband's record, she believes, stands. It does not need her explanation or discussion, and this isn't her job. "I'm just meeting the people, and hoping I can help John's campaign by doing so."

While meeting the people is no problem, tearing herself away from them is something else. "I like to visit," she explains easily. "She has a penchant for finding mutual acquaintances with everyone she meets. You simply have to grab her away."

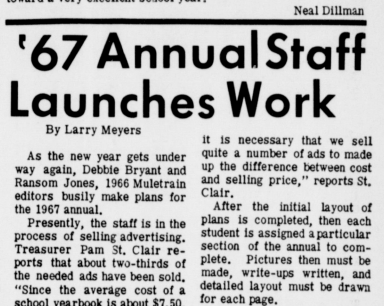
Presently, the staff is in the process of selling advertising. Treasurer Pam St. Clair reports that about two-thirds of the needed ads have been sold.

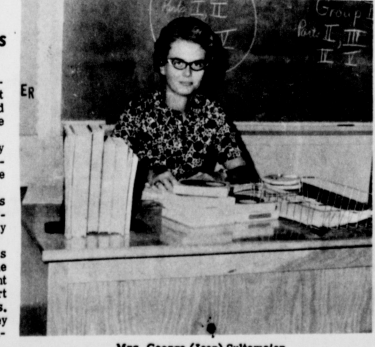

Social Security Q's and A's

Q. I was recently discharged from a hospital after seven days confinement, and am receiving Home Health Services under a plan my doctor agagand. Under basic hospital benefits plan I am eligible for 100 home visits. Is there a time limit on them.

A. Under the hospital plan, up to 100 visits may be paid for if made (a) within one year after the person's most recent discharge from the hospital or extended care facility, and (b) after the beginning of one spell of illness and before the beginning of the next spell of illness. Thus, if you were discharged from the hospital on July 25, 1966, 100 visits could be paid for between July 25, 1966 and July 24, 1967, providing a new spell of illness did not begin.

WHO REALLY MAKES AUTO
INSURANCE RATES?
 Texas is divided into twenty
 six different rating territories
 and data gathered from these
 territories determines the rate
 of auto insurance as determined
 by the Texas Legislature. If a
 new law is required, and if no
 new law is required then the
 STATE BOARD OF INSURANCE
 determines the rate of insur-
 ance for a given territory based
 on the overall number of
 violations in that area.

To update and add to the
 present rating system the Board
 of Insurance has promulgated
 and ordered, effective Aug. 1,
 1966 the Texas Driving Insur-
 ance plan. This plans regards
 the careful driver by holding
 his rates at the lower rate,
 however, there will be in-
 creased premiums for those
 involved in certain accidents
 or convicted of speeding or
 certain other major traffic vio-
 lations, these increased rates
 will be assessed by the point
 system, one point increased
 the rate by 15%, two points
 35%, three points 60%, and
 four points 90%.

In a given territory determines
 the rate of auto insurance it
 is felt we should insist on
 strict and uniform enforcement
 of our traffic officers and
 courts as well as individuals,
 but most important is not the
 higher or lower insurance rates
 which we may through our own
 actions determine as a
 community or as an individual
 community or the lives and limbs of our
 own loved ones as well as our
 neighbors.

From the above facts it should
 be very easy for us to answer
 the question as to who really
 makes our auto insurance rates.
