





Railroad Crossings

A measure acceptable to both the Texas Motor Transportation Association and the Texas Joint Railway Labor Board now is awaitting action before the House.

Bill provides that trucks carrying explosives or inflammables stop when crossing railroad tracks within city limits but only slow down to 20 miles per hour or less when crossing tracks outside of cities.

Safety Bill

An occupational safety bill, subject of bitter controversy and deadlocks in past legislative sessions, was passed by the House 143-0. A compromise version was hammered out after usual friction over terms developed. Senate passage is likely.



Cleaning Minimized In 1967 Ranges

College Station, Texas.—Ranges with self-cleaning or easy-cleaning features are coming into the 1967 market with prices low enough for many consumers. Miss Joy Arrington, Extension home management specialist at Texas A&M University, also noted that removable non-stick coated panels for easy oven cleaning are being offered by gas range manufacturers and are found on some electric ranges.

One manufacturer has introduced a "counter that cooks"—a range with an epaque glass ceramic top. The surface, which is smooth and even, reduces the chore of cleaning to a minimum. Heating areas are outlined with design markings and heat does not radiate beyond the design. This way the perimeter of the range stays cool. Special pots and pans have been developed for use with the range. Regular utensils may be used, but they don't heat as efficiently as the special ones.

While much has been done in the area of electronic cooking, many problems still exist such as servicing, use education, and price. Manufacturers predict that consumer prices for electronic ranges will be in the \$500 to \$600 range. Present prices average about \$800 but are expected to fall as production increases.

Common features to be seen on many lower-priced models of 1967 ranges include lift-off oven doors, hinged and lift-off rangs tops, oven and surface indicator lights, disposable oven liners, and plugin surface units. Some higher-priced range models will have surface units with automatic "stirrers" and temperature controls. These maintain pre-set temperatures which don't allow food to burn.



Before you buy or build, make a list of your family's needs and check them off one by one. This can reduce the probability of your making a mistake.

Here are a few points to consi-

weighed ALL family living costs? Have you left leeway for possible ncreases in living costs? Taxes? If you have small children, have you included in your calculations the rising costs of their needs as they grow older?

(2) Do you suffer from allergies? If so, was this taken into consideration in heating and cooling the

(3) Is there an easy escape out of each room in the event of fire? (4- Are there anti-slip surfaces on stairs, baths, showers, etc.?

(5) Are there hand railings on stairways and protection against doors opening directly onto stairs?
(6) Does the house have fire walls and doors in such hazard

areas as the central heating unit? (7) Have you selected the best financial plan for your situation? What about the water supply and sewage disposal facilities? Is the floor plan designed to fit the way you live? This varies greatly from family to family. Does the house

have adequate storage? Mrs. Berry emphasized that these are only a few factors you should watch in building or buying a house. No house is right for everybody, and the wrong one can be an expensive-and long-lived mistake.


