In a regular meeting Monday night directors of the Schleicher County Hospital District set a 35-cent hospital tax rate which will be collected by the County tax collector during the regular collecting period beginning October 1st.

Setting of this tax rate at this time was done in order to co-operate with Orval Edmiston's tax office which had requested this be done before July 1st in order to facilitate book work in his

County Commissioners last week set the county tax rate at \$1.25. In addition the office also collects the State advalorem tax, and in certain areas in the north part of the county they will also collect a "water district" tax.

The 35-cent hospital tax is less than half of the 75c maximum rate set up in the bill passed by the Texas Legislature in authorizing establishment of the hospital district here. Setting of the tax rate took up only about ten minutes of the board's time.

All seven board members were present when Mr. Ratliff called the meeting to order at 8:00 p. m. Present were Gordon Charlton of Columbian Securities and Jack Brown from Dunbar. The principal purpose was to discuss the issuance of \$450,000 in bonds at the best rate of interest over a period of some 20 years. After hearing their offer the directors asked a 48-hr. period to study the matter and agreed to another meeting on Wednesday night. They did sign an agreement with Charlton and Brown as their "fiscal agents" regardless of who bought the bonds.

After the agents left the meeting continued for another hour while all phases of the job ahead were discussed. Meeting was called to order at 8:00 p. m., and adjourned at 11:00. A meeting with the architect is scheduled in the near future.

The bride wore a street length dress of white boucle with white lace trim. She carried a bridal bouquet of pink roses.





Don't rely on your memory when you buy or use pesticides. strengths are constantly coming on the market

The correct disposal of the leftover chemical, or empty container, is not always covered in the label information. Different types of containers also call for different kinds of disposal.

Here are tips to remember when to provide all producers with up the time comes to safely and effectively dispose of unwanted pesticide containers.

These guidelines include the latroll them first in old newspapers, then break them. Metal and plastic containers should be punched pull of holes to make them unusable. Crush all containers, for this same reason, and bury the remains. The best practice to follow in the disposal of paper containers is to bury them. Paper containers can be burned, but do so only on a windless day and stay out of the smoke. Some of the pesticide residue in the "empty bags" will remain in the ashes after burning; so, it is always a good idea to bury the ashes.

Do not punch or burn aerosol (pressurized) bug bombs. When dealing with bug-bombs, take them to a sanitary land fill dump or bury them yourself. For further information on pesticides and their safe use, contact the county agent's office.


