provisions of the federal Uniform pime Act of 1966 (DST) was killed
by a 56.90 vote in the House of Representatives.
House members debated the bill
by Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont by Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont
for more than an hour before re-
jecting it Federal law now requires DST
from the last Sunday in April to
the last Sunday in October except he last Sunday in October except
in those states which pass specific
legislative exemptions. So far, only Michigan has voted exemption.

lines opposed the bill. They empha-
sized the need for uniformity of shedules among states.

run", and for a statewide referendum on the issue were resoudingly efeated.
Long Terms, Annual Sessions
House has approved and sent the Senate two proposed constitutional amendments. First calls for
4-yaar terms for all statewide offi-
ials; second for annual cials; second for annual sessio
of the Legislature. An earlier long-term amendment
was defeated by Texas voters in
1965. Issue will be re-summitted in

Get your cotton off to a good
start this year by taking measures o prevent cotton seedling disease. Several years of research at Tex-
a A\&M University have shown reducing seedling diseases: First, bury surface trash below
the planting level and plant bed to help proper drainage. Many
tests show planting on a bed superior to planting in the water fur-
row.
Plant seed which have been treated with a chemical fungicide
to control seed surface born organ-
isms
Use hish quality seed. High qua-

quar temperatures. Plant high
quility sed when morning soil
temperatures at planting depth are
above 60 degrees F . for three days,
When lower quality sed are used,
wait for higher temperatures. If seedling disease has been a
problem in the past, an in-covering soil fungicide should be used.
Sprays, dusts or granules may be
used but care should be taken to see that they are mixed well in
the soil used to cover seed in the the soil used to cover seed in the
furrow. Hopper box application is
not suggested for use in Schleicher
county.
Available in my office is a list of seed treatment and in-covering
fungicides that are recommended.
