lay) Thursday morning. Committee spent the rest of the meeting discussing how soon a petition can be prepared asking the county commissioners to call an election to formally approve the district. The legal services of a bonding attorney is being sought this week and it is possible that a petition will be ready to circu-

late this coming week. This petition must be signed by at least 100 qualified county tax-

paying voters, which means-(1) You must have property rendered on the county's tax roll.

(2) You must have been registered as a voter on or before January 31st, except those over 61 years of age, who don't have to register.

According to late word from Austin, Gov. John Connally will sign the Schleicher County Hospital District bill at 9.30 a.m. Thursday (today). A local delegation headed by Don McCormick is expected to be present for the signing. Anyone interested is invited.

The Schleicher County Hospital District bill has now passed both the State House and Senate and now awaits only the formality of the Governor's signature.

Rep. Hilary Doran phoned this information to the Success at 2:00 p.m., last Wednesday-about 45 minutes after our paper had gone to press.

Doran said the bill had passed the Senate late Tuesday night. He gave Senator Dorsey Hardeman credit for getting such prompt action in the Senate on the Schleicher county bill.

According to Doran the bill should be signed by Gov. Connally the following (this) week. It may have already been accomplished by the time our readers have this paper

The project now comes back to the local level where Mr. McCormick is still waiting on plans by Architect Don Goss and a firm estimate of the eventual cost of hospital and nursing home combination, in order that the entire project may be presented to voters of the county for their approval as soon as possible.


While the citizenship here is interested in these various steps, the two doctors in Pasadena are also following the development, as shown by the following letter received by Mr. McCormick early this week:





Home Landscaping Hints Are Presented

College Station, Tex.-A usable, functional and pleasing to look at home landscaping is within the reach of most home owners. Too. A&M University, a properly planned landscape need not require a great deal of time and labor for maintenance


Janne outlines several ways to reduce maintenance and at the same time improve the usability and attractiveness of yards. He suggests dividing the yard space into use areas. Most yards include the public area, commonly the front yard, the family area and usually parts of the backyard.

Use areas should be separated and uncluttered with plantings. Open, organized space within each area results in a more usable and easier to care for yard, he says.

Flower beds, shrub borders and tree masses can be separated from the grassed areas. For this purpose some type of edging material can be used. It may be made from redwood or bricks or metal.

Careful selection of turfgrass varieties, tree and shrub species backs both bills. can also reduce maintenance requirements, Janne says. Some spe- Budget Vote Nears drouth resistance.

Austin, Texas.—Prepare to move the hands of your timepieces forward one hour on April 30. Otherwise you'll not be in tune with the "times."

Texas, along with virtually all other states, is going on Daylight Saving Time for the summer months and until October 29.

A bill to exempt the state from provisions of the federal Uniform Time Act of 1966 (DST) was killed by a 56-90 vote in the House of Representatives.

House members debated the bill by Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont for more than an hour before reecting it.

Federal law now requires DST rom the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October except in those states which pass specific legislative exemptions. So far, only Michigan has voted exemption. Broadcasters, railroads and airlines opposed the bill. They empha-

sized the need for uniformity of schedules among states. Smith argued eloquently- but





WW1 Was Launched **50 Years Ago Today**

It was 50 years ago on Thursday April 6th, that the United States entered the war "to make the world safe for democracy.'

It had been coming for a long time.

"The war stirred American feeling tremendously," says Wor'd Book Encyclopedia. "Strong ties bound the nation to Great Britain, France, and Belgium, although some Americans sympathized with Germany and Austria-Hungary.

'.Economic factors soon strengthened the country's sympathy for the Allies. The United States had developed a profitable trade with the British and French," the Encyclopedia continues.

Stories of German atrocities in Belgium inflamed the Americans. The sinking of the Lusitania in 1915---when 128 Americans were among the nearly 1,200 killedhelped move the U.S. toward war. German saboteurs were active. On January 31, 1917, Germany proclaimed unlimited submarine warfare, and the United States broke off diplomatic relations.

In March, the State Department released the infamous Zimmerman Telegram-an intercepted message in which Germany proposed that Mexico attack the United States.

On April 2, 1917, the 65th Congress met for the first time. President Wilson went before a Joint session at 8:30 that evening.

He said the Imperial German government, like all autocracies, was a natural foe of liberty. Therefore, "The world must be made safe for democracy.

He asked Congress to declare war. "The day has come when America is privileged to spend her blood and her might for the principles that gave her birth and happiness and the peace which she has treasured. God helping her, she can do no other.

The chamber broke into cheers and applause. Later, at the White House, Wilson said, "Think of what it was they were applauding. My message of today was a message of death for our young men. How strange it seems to applaud that.'

Several members of Congress had withheld their applause. Sen. James K. Vardaman of Mississippi and Sen. Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin argued long against the war, and were among the six senators who voted "nay" on the roll call.

In the House of Representatives, the first woman ever elected to Congress, Jeanette Rankin of Montana, said, "I want to stand by my country, but I cannot vote for war. I vote 'no'.

Miss Rankin, a pacifist, served only two terms in Congress. It was during her second term, on Dec. 8, 1941, that she became the only member of Congress to vote against war with Japan.

Voting in the House concluded at 3:12 a.m., April 6, Good Friday. The vote was 373 to 50, and the the United States had entered Great War. The country was almost totally unprepared. It would be October before American troops could fire a ceremonial "first shot" at the Germans; Novembler before the first Americans would die in battle. And the Yanks would use British- and French-built airplanes, trucks, tanks, cannon, machine guns, automatic rifles. Before the end, there would be more than 2 million Americans overseas. There would be more than 325 thousand casualties, including 116,516 dead-blown to bloody fragments in a trench, machine gunned in the barbed wire, choked by poison gas.

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





Home Demonstration Agent's Column By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

All kinds of changes are taking place in the fabric world today and the durable press garment is getting its share of the spotlight.

- These questions and answers may be some which you have asked and need answering.
- Q. What is "frosting"?

A. Creases in durable press garments are so sharp that there is little "give" during wear and laundering. For this reason, the dye at crease areas and seams may start to lighten or fade during wear. This so-called "frosting" is especially noticeable with darker colors. Some durable press garments may also develop a streaked or mottled appearance due to dye instability. It is advisable to turn such durable press trousers and dark garments wrong side out to prevent such frosting.

Q. Can grease stains be remov?

A. Some grease stains are difficult if not almost impossible to remove from durable press fabrics. For best results, apply a concen- 8th, trated solution of detergent directly to the grease stain. Allow this to "work" for several hours before laundering the entire garment in clean suds. Persistent grease stains may require a pretreating with a solvent or a commercial spot remover.

Q. Can fabric softeners be used? A. Acorcding to textile chemists, fabric softeners serve to reduce abrasion on durable press fabrics by lubricating the fibers. has the effect of adding durability along crease lines which sometimes tend to "crack" with use. Fabric softeners, which also help to reduce static electricity, should always be used according to container directions.

Q. Is it necessary to sort for washing?

A. Sorting is important when washing durable press garments and, in general, whites should be washed separately. This is because dyes used on some colored permanent press fabrics may have a tendency to bleed in the wash water, the "E" Club award in football although they are reasonably fast to laundering.

Bring all ingredients to a boil Pour immediately over cabbage mixture while hot. Let cool and refrigerate until used. Makes about two quarts.
