Soil structure usually is defined the arrangement of the soil particles. Organic matter and humus tend to cause soil particles to clump together in aggregates or

A granular or crumb structure is a most desirable soil condition. Excessive tillage or cultivation destroys the aggregates, and poor soil condition results.

Allowing organic materials to decompose in the soil tends to stimulate the formation of aggre gates and stable granules, thus naking the granular or crumb tructure conducive to good aeraion and water infiltration.

Constitutional Revision

A "compromise" plan for revising the state constitution has received clearance from the House State Affairs Committee.

A concurrent resolution by Reps. R. H. Cory of Victoria and Randy Pendleton of Andrews would establish a constitutional revision study commission with a 20-man citizens advisory commission.

Governor, lieutenant governor speaker of the House and Supreme Court chief justice would share in appointments of commissions. Study commission's recommendations will be turned to the 1969 Legislature for its approval. Final approval will be up to the voters.






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
