Amendment Voting Set For Saturday

Schleicher county voters will join others over the state in going to the polls Saturday to vote on six proposed amendments to the State Constitution.

A light voter turnout is predicted, both locally and statewide. Some places, voters will elect new members of the Legislature, but here in Schleicher county we will have just the amendments to vote

Saturday is opening day of hunting season and it's also Veterans Day (formerly Armistice Day).

Hunters are being urged to take time to vote on the parks amendment and veterans are urged to vote to reinstate the veterans land program here in Texas.

Paper ballots also will look different to most Texans. This is the first general election for the "x system of voting. If a person wants to vote for a constitutional amendment he will place an "x" beside the "For" or "Against" proposition. Formerly a voter scratched out the issue or name he wanted to vote against.

All Schleicher county voters will go to the Memorial Building to

cast their ballots. The six proposed amendments on

the ballot, as listed, include: 1. Authorize counties to put all their revenues into a single big general fund. Presently there are several funds with limitations on the spending from each. Opponents say the single big fund would be too tempting to county commissioners. Supporters say that it would streamline county government and make spending more flexible.

2. Let cities, counties and other political subdivisions spend tax money for mental health and mental retardation work when there is a hospital district in operation. Opponents say mental health programs should be financed through present hospital districts to pre-

vent taxing duplication. 3. Set up a \$200 million bond issue fund to revive the veterans land program of letting veterans buy farm and ranch land from the state on low interest 40-year payment plans. It also would extend the privilege to veterans of the Vietnam and cold war activity. The proposal has been defeated twice previously. Opponents say the state should stay out of the little-bitdown little-bit-a-month business.





Rice is one of my food favorites. And so it has been for other peoole for literally thousands of years. It is about the easiest food on the shelf to prepare. There is nothing to peel, pare, trim or scrape -these days it is not even necessary to wash or rinse rice. It comes to us machine milled and already

Simple cooking directions for regular milled white rice is often called the "1-2-1" fluff method. Use one cup rice, 2 cups water and one teaspoon salt. Place in a threequart sauce pan with a tight fitting lid. (I use a skillet instead of a sauce pan.) Bring to a boil, stirring once or twice. When liquid is boiling, cover the pan, lower heat to "simmer" and cook about 14 minutes without removing the lid or stirring. Serve in your fav-

One of my favorite ways to use already cooked rice is in making fried rice. In fact, I like to keep some cooked rice in the freezer to use for fried rice and if a bit of butter is stirred into hot cooked rice before it is frozen the grains do not stick to form a hard block.

This happens to be a very good Chinese Fried Rice

3 tablespoons bacon drippings or butter; ½ cup chopped green onions

½ cup mushrooms, pieces and 21/2 cups cooked rice;

2 tablespoons soy sauce; 1 egg. slightly beaten;

Heat fat in large skillet. green onions and celery. Cook until celery is almost tender. Add mushrooms, rice and soy sauce Cook 8-10 minutes on low heat, stirring occasionally. Stir in beaten egg and cook until egg is done. Sprinkle with crumbled bacon and serve. Extra soy sauce may be served. Makes 8 servings.

Menu suggestions: Frozen green peas, green beans or broccoli make good companions in the vegetable line; a combined fruit salad, hot tea and cookies would finish the meal in grand style.

When you begin to cast about for something different to serve as these evenings grow a bit cooler, don't overlook rice. It's a most versatile food.

Chicken is one of the best meat buys at the market today. Andbelieve it or not fryer breasts are the best buys of all the various ways chicken may be bought.

Proof needed? Look at this: one pound of fryer breasts will serve 4 people and costs 60 cents per pound. That's 15 cents per serving.

per pound and only one and onethird servings can be expected from a pound which throws the cost per serving to over 24 cents. So, we might as well have white meat and enjoy it; in the long run it costs less after all.

The following recipe is a very good combination of chicken and rice, both of which have been under discussion.

This is good enough for a party dish or a company meal.

Chicken Country Captin: 3 pound broiler, cut in serving

6 whole chicken breasts; 1/3 cup flour;

2 teaspoons salt;

¼ teaspoon pepper; 1/2 cup shortening;

cup chopped onions; cup chopped green pepper;

½ teaspoon salt; Dash pepper;

2 teaspoons curry powder; ½ teaspoon thyme;

11/2 teaspoons garlic salt:

1 teaspoon chopped parsley;

4 cups tomatoes; 3 cups cooked rice; 4 cup curants;

½ cup slivered almonds.

Remove skin from chicken. Roll in flour combined with the 2 teaspoons salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper, Brown in hot fat, remove and keep warm. Add onions and green pepper to fat and cook until tender. Add remaining salt and pepper, curry, thyme, garlic salt, parsley and tomatoes, and mix thoroughly. Replace chicken in sauce. Add water if liquid does not cover chicken. Cover and simmer 45 minutes. Serve in rice ring; add currants to sauce and pour over rice. Sprinkle almonds over chicken.





Voters in 254 counties will decide Saturday (Nov. 11) whether they want six more amendments to the State's Constitution. According to Secretary of State John Hill, voters in five areas of Texas will choose legislators to fill vacancies created by death or resignation. There are six vacant seats in the House of Representatives and one in the Senate.

A light-to-moderate vote is predicted. November 11 is opening day of the deer and turkey hunting season in most counties. means a lot of hunters will be in he field instead of the voting

However, election day also is Veterans Day, and backers of the proposed amendment to revive the veterans land program are staging n active get-out-the-vote campaign. So are supporters of two other amendments—the one authorizing the state to issue bonds to finance expansion of the Texas parks system and that permitting state officials and employees to hold more than one office.

Seventy candidates, including 14 Republicans, are running for legto improve their position. Presently they have only three representatives in the 150-member House and one senator in the 31-member

There are two representatives races in Harris county; another in Cameron county; one in Matagorda and Wharton counties; one in Travis county; and another in Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum counties. Twenty Dallas candidates are running for the Senate seat of the late George Park-

Six constitutional amendments ere on the ballot in the following

No. 1. To authorize counties to place all their tax revenues in a single general fund, rather than separate, special-purpose funds.

No. 2. To let local political subdivisions which have hospital districts spend tax money for mental health and mental retardation ser-

No. 3. To revive the veterans land program through an additioned \$200 million bond issue, permitting war veterans, including those of the Vietnam conflict, to ourchase land on low-interest, 40year-payback loans.

No. 4. To permit counties to pay medical benefits for their law enforcement officers injured in

No. 5. To authorize a \$75 million state hond issue (supported by an admission fee at selected parks) for part land buying and development.

No. 6. To permit non-elective state officials and employees to serve on state and federal boards and commissions if there is no conflict of duties.




