Jimmy Doyle, who brought this announcement to the Success, stated that there will be no admission charge, but arrangements will be made for free-will contributions.





Players will be placed in flights according to qualifying scores. There will be at least two flights in each division, one more flight if there are enough entries.



## New Laws Relate **To Motor Vehicle Inspection Aug. 28**

Until this year, only the brakes, lighting equipment, horn and warning devices, mirrors and windshield wipers were to have been inspected. The new law adds several items that must be inspected now, in addition to the above Front seat belts have been added as an item that must be inspected and is therefore required equipment

Front seat belts are required on every motor vehicle in which belt anchorages were a part of the manufacturer's original equipment. On American made passenger cars, all models beginning with 1962 models were part of the original equip ment and must be inspected.

Steering has also been added to the required items. Steering will be inspected fo rlash, to see that it does not jam on full turns and fluid in power steering meets the recommended level. Wheels and rims will be inspected for bent Han bolts or nuts or cracks or other defects that might impair proper inflation or operation. Another change in this law raises the fee for inspection from \$1.00 to \$1.75. If the vehicle passes or is rejected, \$1.75 is the fee. If a person must have some repairs, parts or adjustments they may take their vehicle to the place of their choice and have the item corrected. If the owner then returns to the inspection station with the rejection slip within one week the mechanic need only inspect one item and the inspection sticker will be placed on his windshield at no addi tional cost. People think that the fee is for the inspection sticker but this is misinformation. The fee of \$1.75 is for the inspection and not for the sticker. Every motor vehicle that is involved in an accident where there was at least \$25.00 damage done to their vehicle, the law requires that this vehicle be inspected again after repairs have been made, before it is operated on the streets and highways of this state. The deadline when all vehicles must be inspected is April 15, 1968. This means that every owner has 7<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> months in which to have his vehicle inspected. The purpose of the motor vehicle inspection law is to discover any defect in any vehicle that might become a link in the chain of events leading up to an accident, and to remove that link and thus prevent a probable accident.

For the occasion, use your fanciest cups — maybe lined with spoonfuls of creamy, sweetened meringue. That's Belgian Coffee, remember? And for the "scrumptious" department, go ahead, be gay - try French Quarter Beignets. Mine are tiny square-shaped donuts, a simplified version of the New Orleans original. Don't let the length of the recipe scare you. It's not all that hard. Besides, you do want to impress your new friend

FRENCH QUARTER BEIGNETS 2/3 cup mashed Potato Buds 2/3 cup boiling water 3 eggs 1/2 cup sugar 2 tablespoons shortening 3 cups Bisquick 1 teaspoon nutmeg Salad oil Orange Glaze (below)

Stir Potato Buds into water with fork until moistened; whip until fluffy. Set aside to cool completely. In large mixer bowl, beat eggs until fluffy. Beat in sugar and shortening at medium speed. Add mashed potatoes; beat on low speed until smooth. Add Bisquick and nutmeg and beat until mixture is smooth. Cover and refrigerate 2 to 3 hours. Heat salad oil (3 to 4 inches deep) in heavy saucepan or deep fat fryer to 375°. Divide dough in half. Roll one half at a time to  $\frac{1}{4}$ " thick on floured surface. ### STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the opera-tion, maintenance, and im-provement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dol-lars (\$75,000,000). 

#### County Extension News W. G. Godwin, Co. Agent

Weather conditions in many parts of Texas during recent weeks have been favorable for the increase in the number of screwworm cases, reports the officials of the Mission Laboratory where the sterile flies are produced.

The County Agent's office has received a request from the Lab to caution livestock producers to be on the alert for screwworms in the critical weeks ahead.

While cases during July have been concentrated mainly in the Big Bend sector of far West Texas, there is always the possibility that cases may show up in other sections

The program officials also point-ed out that fall shearing will soon be a major activity in many areas of the state and advised the treating of all wounds, man-made or otherwise, that might invite possible screwworm infestations.

When worms are found in animal wounds, I strongly advise stockmen in Schleicher county to collect a sample and send it to the Mission Lab for positive identification. Should the sample be posi-tive, immediate treatment measures can be taken to curb the outbreaks.

During July, the Lab reported that almost 600 million sterile flies were released in the southwestern United States and Mexico.

It is true that to date we have not experienced any screwworm cases, but it is still important that worms in wounds be identified. because there seems to be more movement of cattle this time of cers, due to the current grazing in one section and bonemeal in On The Screen . . . the year.



## Season To Close With 'Naked Prey'





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

#### Apple Dumplings Herald Autumn

Glazed Apple Dumplings are baked in a rich brown sugar sauce that also serves as the glaze. Serve the warra dumplings with a bit of the sauce and cream, if desired.

You'll surely be asked what's different about the pastry. The secret is that corn meal is combined with the flour to produce delightful texture. Guests will agree that the mild corn flavor perfectly complements the tart 'n spicy apples.

#### **GLAZED APPLE DUMPLINGS**

#### **Makes 6 servings**

Pastry:	Spicy Apples:
1-1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour	6 cooking apples, peeled an cored
1/2 cup enriched corn meal	1/3 cup sugar
, 1 teaspoon salt	1 teaspoon cinnamon
$\frac{2}{3}$ cup shortening	1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/3 cup Cold water	

Heat oven to hot (400°F.). Sift together flour, corn meal and salt into bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle water by tablespoonfuls over mixture; stir lightly with fork until just dampened. (If necessary, add another tablespoon cold water to make dough hold together.) Form into ball.

Turn out on lightly floured board or canvas. Roll to form a 21x14-inch rectangle. Cut in 6 squares. Place apple in center of square. Combine sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg in bowl. Spoon about 1 tablespoon of sugar mixture into center of apple. Dot

with butter. Bring corners of pastry to top of apple; seal edges. Repeat for remaining apples. Place dumplings in 13x9-incla baking pan. Pour Brown Sugar Glaze (see below) into pan around base of dumplings. Bake in preheated oven (400°F.) 25 to 30 minutes, basting dumplings with glaze during last 5 minutes of baking. Serve warm with cream, if desired

For glaze, combine 2 cups firmly-packed brown sugar and 1 cup water in saucepan. Bring to a boil: simmer 3 minutes.



The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment allowing nonelective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until Septem-ber 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of inter-est with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other of-fice or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and re-tired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing nonelective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of inter-est with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other of-fice or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard Air National Guard Reserve. Air Force Reserve, and re-tired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."
