Further information on swimming lessons, season ticket prices, and other details will be available at the pool.

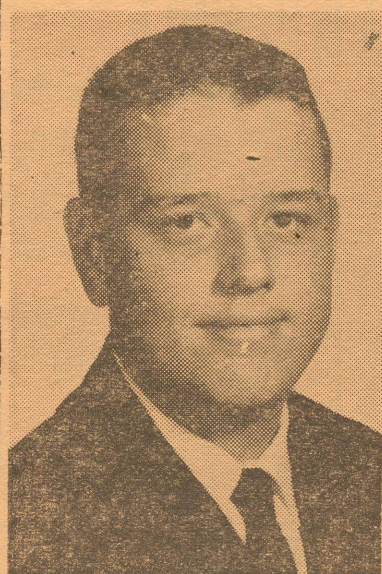

### Is A \$450,000 Bond Too Big?

Some of our good people express themselves this way—

"Sure, Eldorado should have medical facilities, but 450,000 dollars! Good heavens; can we afford that much?"

Before you become overwhelmed by that large figure, let's go back over the past 22 years and see how much money this county has borrowed and paid back. According to figures provided by the county treasurer's office the total amount is \$448,000!

The following table shows that the first bond issue in '45 was for \$50,000 for the Menard Highway, and is followed by bond issues and warrants down to 1962.

It should be noted, too, that the county's taxable valuation in 1945 was 4 1/4 million dollars. Not until 1952 did it finally pass 10 million following the Huldale oil discovery. Since then it has been increasing and now is hovering around 17 million.

If our county was able to borrow and pay back—with interest—\$448,000 in the past 22 years, we should have no difficulty in handling \$450,000 in the next 20.

#### Went Up—Not Down!

In 1945 county tax valuations totaled \$4,225,545.

By 1960, due to oil development, the total had gone beyond 16 million and stood at \$16,102,173.

By that time county officials began to be concerned about the future. Would this happy situation continue, or was the oil business in for a gradual decline as fields become depleted?

They asked their valuation engineers, Pritchard & Abbott, to make an estimate of the valuation picture in regard to the future for Schleicher county. The engineers came up with their answer in a letter dated Sept. 19, 1960, in which they estimated there would be a gradual decline, and that by 1967 the total valuation would be down to about \$12 million!

What happened?

Some wells were depleted; others were discovered along with considerable gas development, and today instead of an estimated 12 million valuation, the county finds itself with 17 million, plus—

#### West Highway Open Again To Traffic

Barricades were removed recently from the 12-mile stretch of the Big Lake highway between Eldorado and the Reynolds intersection.

The road is once again open to traffic after undergoing a rebuilding and widening project in recent months.

It is expected that the road will be rebuilt farther west, but it is indefinite how soon.

With 147 absentee ballots cast in County Clerk's office by 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, indications are that a record turn-out of qualified voters will cast ballots Saturday in the \$450,000 hospital bond election—a proposition that has been widely publicized and discussed for the past eight months.

At 2:00 p.m., Monday, the absentee total stood at 112 which was one-third of all ballots cast in January 1966 in a school bond. Total number of ballots cast in that election was 332, and estimates now are that three times that number may vote Saturday. The school bonds carried 264 to 68—a ratio of four to one.

Some of the hospital supporters are optimistically predicting that the hospital deal will also carry by that same ratio. Others are of the opinion that it will be close.

One hour after the polls close at 7:00 p.m., Saturday, we should know the answer. Results will be posted in the window of the Success office.



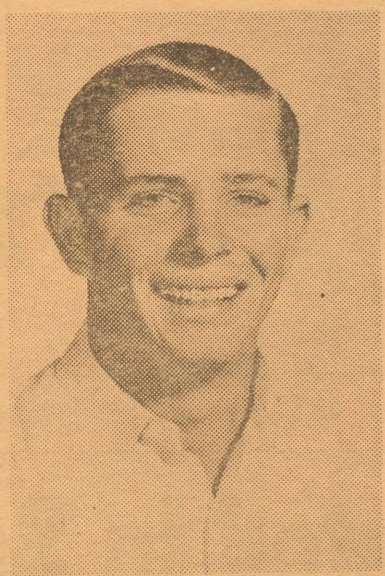

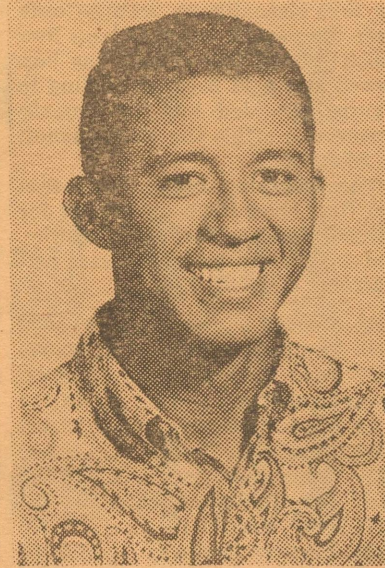
JAY HALBERT

This fall, Ricky will enroll in Angelo State College.



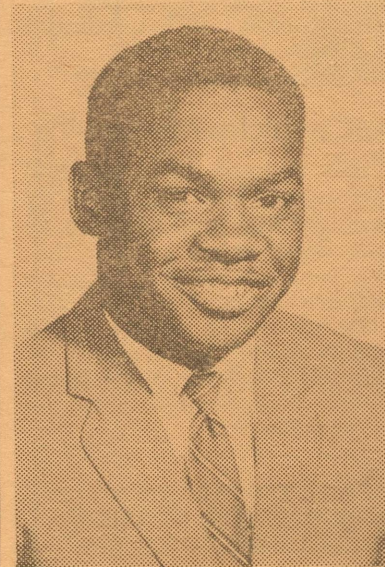



### Schleicher County Tax Situation as it will be affected by Proposed Hospital District Bond Issue

Although the ballot to be used in the election of May 20th will provide that the District may levy a tax rate of not more than 75c on the \$100 valuation, that the interest rate on the bonds shall not exceed 6% and that the maturity date on the bonds shall not be more than 40 years, these are statutory limitations and it should not be supposed that a Board of Directors of seven Schleicher County residents will ever approach these limits. The annual bond debt service requirements for the proposed \$450,000 bond issue will run from \$30,000 to \$34,000 annually, depending on whether the Directors issue 25 year or 20 year bonds, requiring a tax rate of from \$0.19 to \$0.21 on the total County Valuations of roughly \$17,000,000. The District valuations are to be the same as the County valuations, a fortunate requirement since the School District valuations on ranch lands are one-third higher than the County's.

Although no one can speak for the District Board of Directors until after they are appointed following the election if it carries, it is to be expected that they will set a tax rate for the first year of about \$0.30 on the \$100 valuation. On this assumption, the Hospital District Tax will compare with the 1966 County and State Tax as follows:

From the above it is seen that the proposed Hospital District Tax may be about one-sixth of the 1966 County & State Tax. Since the School District Tax amounted to \$330,000 in 1966, the taxpayers of Schleicher County can expect that if the bond issue is voted, the Hospital District Tax will amount to about 8% of their total County, State and School District taxes for 1966. Surely this is not too high a price to pay to obtain a doctor and medical facilities for this community.

The valuation on fully stocked ranch land in Schleicher County is about \$3400 per section for the land and livestock. Thus the rancher's probable Hospital District Tax will be only about \$10.20 per section. Surely not an overwhelming burden. The resident taxpayers of this County have the unusual opportunity of obtaining a \$450,000 medical facility for a cost to them of about one-sixth of the total cost.

The tax information shown above has been compiled from the 1966 Schleicher County tax records. This statement is presented in this newspaper for the consideration of the resident taxpayers who will vote in the special election on May 20th. The views expressed are those of T. R. ### South and Kelly Win Over Yankees

The Eagle Drive-In Theater is re-opening Friday and Saturday for their coming summer season with a Civil War movie in color, which stars William Holden. There will be just one showing of each movie, beginning at dark.

"Alvarez Kelly," whose time is the Civil War of 1864, takes no sides in the conflict between the states, but Southerners, born and bred or adopted, will take comfort from the fact that for once film-dom lets the Confederates triumph over the Yankees.

The story is based on a true incident of the Civil War when Southern cavalry executed a successful raid under the noses of the Union forces.

The film marks the return of Sol C. Siegel to the ranks of independent film producers.

Siegel has good name quantity for his leading performers—William Holden as the Mexican-Irish rancher who delivers 2,500 head of cattle to the Federal forces in Virginia and Richard Widmark as the leader of a Confederate cavalry who eyes the cattle as food for a starving South.

There is action a-plenty, with most of it being filmed in an area near Baton Rouge, La., which has a similarity to Virginia southwest of Richmond a hundred years ago.

The exciting action sequences, including a massive stampede which seems to include many thousands of cattle rather than 2,500 which Holden brought from Mexico, do much to enliven the script.

There is a lot of double-crossing in the film with Victoria Shaw, mistress of a captured mansion, causing Holden's capture by Widmark, a favor Holden returns by helping Widmark's lady love, Janice Rule, to escape to New York. Both are more than adequate in their roles, with Miss Shaw coming through stronger as she maintains the soft talk of the southern belle throughout.

The camerawork by Joseph MacDonald is especially good, particularly in the Louisiana swamp sequences. The color is bright and the sound recording is tops considering how much of the footage was shot outdoors.

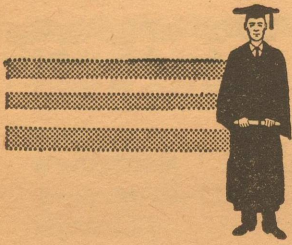

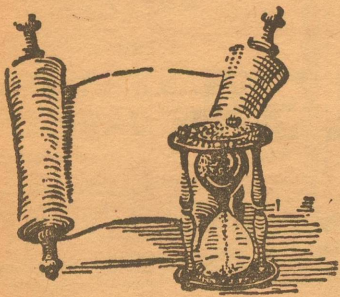

# To the People of Schleicher County

First, the steering committee has throughout this project tended to present misleading information to the public and has ignored facts. The people should have been presented all the true facts, letting the voters have this benefit in making a decision. A committee should have been formed to survey a number of similar hospitals and report to the people its findings concerning costs, cost of operation, required and available personnel, tax structure, and, in general, their success. This vital information would have been unfavorable. Just a few years ago the Commissioners Court contacted approximately 16 similar hospitals and learned that almost without exception all operated at a large financial loss. This information is at the court house, but no mention has ever been made of it.

Second, the steering committee has constantly played up the small tax cost of this hospital as if it were the only taxes that Schleicher County will have. Quite the contrary. Taxes are already high in Schleicher County. By contrast, Crockett County is 8c per acre, Sutton County is 16½c per acre and Schleicher County is 18c per acre. These figures are for grazing land and include State, County and School taxes. Cultivated land in Schleicher County is 32½c per acre. The hospital bill calls for 75c per \$100.00 valuation, not 25c or 35c as some would lead you to believe. According to the valuation of property on the tax rolls at the present time the oil companies are paying more than their pro rata share of taxes in comparison to other property owners in Schleicher County. When taxes are continuously voted on oil properties at little cost to other property owners there could be forced on Schleicher County tax payers an increase in their own valuation.

Third, it has been publicized that two young doctors have agreed to move to Eldorado and operate this hospital. Do we have firm commitments on this fact? Do we have commitments that they will stay in Schleicher County? It has been said that these two doctors will operate the hospital and therefore it shouldn't be any worry to the tax payer should it operate at a financial loss. Does anyone believe that these doctors, or any others, will operate at a loss? They will either leave, or the district will have to subsidize its operations. Within a few years, the tax structure could well have to be doubled. We do need medical facilities and we do need a doctor in our County, but a \$450,000.00 hospital does not guarantee medical facilities and does not guarantee the services of a doctor. Ask some of our neighboring communities.

Fourth, this is not time to embark upon such a costly enterprise without much serious consideration. It will be a debt we, as taxpayers of Schleicher County, will all have to pay beginning this year, regardless of whether the hospital continues to operate or whether we have a doctor or not.

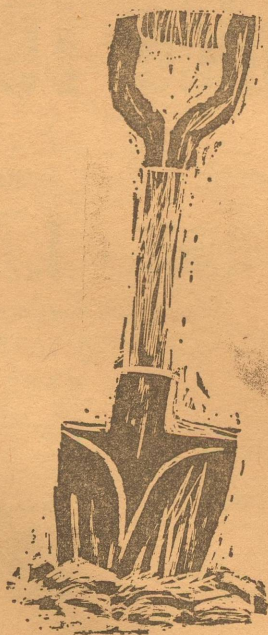

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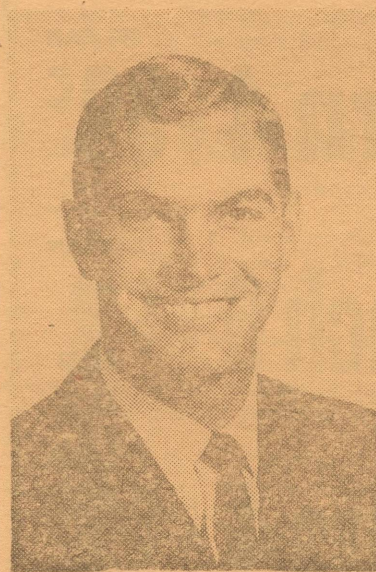
**Luedecke To Receive

A special day in his honor was held here on July 4, 1957.



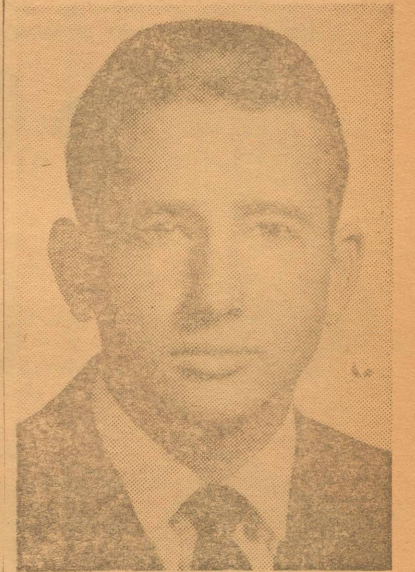
TONY CLARK

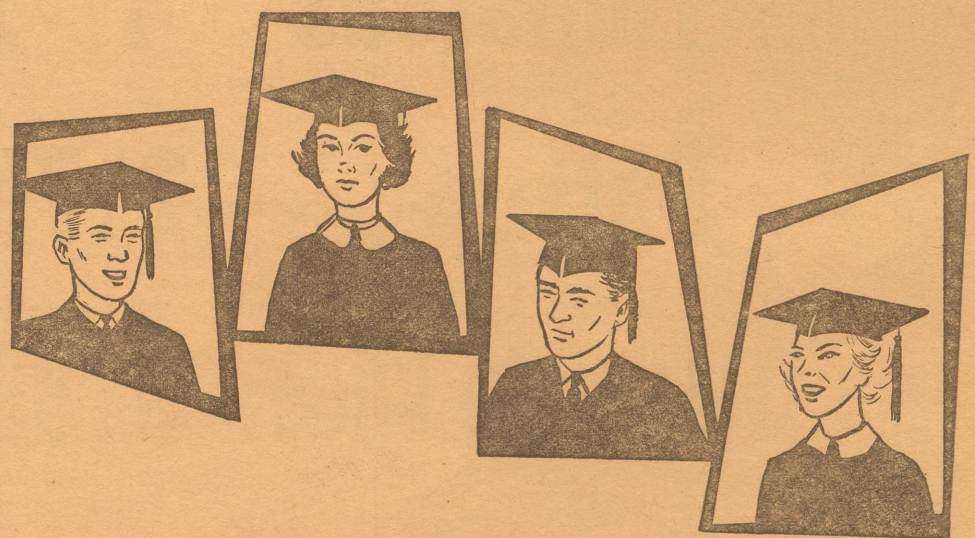
Her Freshman year she was active in the Speech Club, and on the "B" team in basketball.

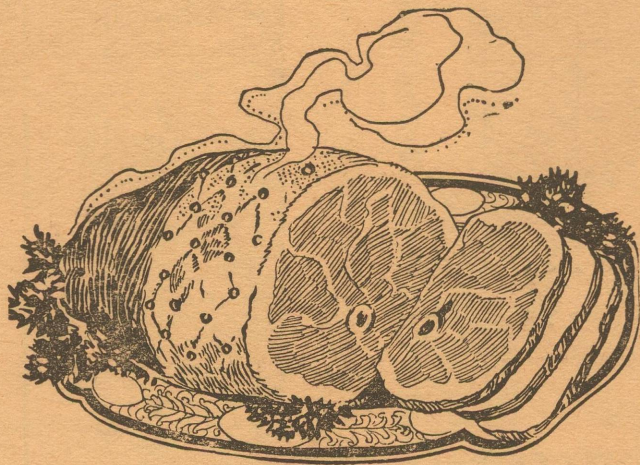
