BY 8-VOTE MARGIN

After being a "dry" county for approximately 65 years, Schleicher County voters Saturday went to the polls and voted to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages by a narrow margin of 358 to 350.

Quiet but intensive work by both advocates and opponents of legal sale brought out the respectable total of 708 votes, but this was about 75 votes less than were cast in the hospital election in May. The following tabulation shows that only three boxes carried for legal sales, but they were enough to offset the narrow losses in the others.

October 1948 was the last time a "wet" election was held in this county; Success files show that only 662 votes were cast in that election, resulting in the drys winning by 517 to 145—better than $3\frac{1}{2}$ to one. Prior to that time there may have been other "wet" elections, but apparently all of them failed to come up with a majority. One of our older residents said the last saloon in Eldorado was voted out at least 65 years ago. He said it was shortly after the county was organized, and it could have been in 1902.



Wrap in plastic food wrap, waxed paper, or foil. Chill well in refrigerator.

This is how it works. The street collection box has been restricted. to OUT OF TOWN mail only. On Saturday ONLY, any out of town mail you have to deposit and you will be depositing it between the hours of 12 Noon and 4:15 p.m., you must deposit it in the street collection box, in order that it

will leave here that day. On Sundays and holidays ONLY, when mailing out of town mail between the hours of 10:15 a.m. and 1:15 p.m., you must deposit it in the street collection box, in order that it will leave that day.

The reason for the necessity of using the street collection box is, there will not be any one on duty during those hours on those specified days and hours. The Star Route Carrier will collect the mail from the street collection box and carry the mail into San Angelo for postmarking. Therefore, do not deposit local mail in the street collection box, and please do not drop coins in this box for your unstamped letters, for the work room in the San Angelo office does not have facilities to accommodate you for this service. The only time that this change will be effective is Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays during the specified hours mentioned above.





Everyone enjoys a good fire and a full stomach on days when the wind is brisk and ponds sport icy coats. And insects are no excep- piness.

Many insects are common indoors in the winter months simply because they're looking for warmth and food, and this causes problems for the homeowner.

In this winter parade, owners can expect to see cockoaches, silverfish, crickets, boxelder bugs, elm leaf beetles, spiders, wasps, moths and many other shelter seekers. As the nights become cooler, homeowners can expeut the parade to begin.

An insecticide "barrier" around the foundation is an excellent means of keeping these invaders out. Dieldrin or chlordane applied to the outside foundation, around porches, steps and patios effective results.

Spraying is the best method of applying the barrier around the house. Treat the outside walls and soil suface next to the foundation. Give particular attention to cracks, crevices and entry ways into the

How well are you prepared to fight fire or hold it in check until the firemen can give you help? Are you familiar with availability of the fire department? Valuable time can be lost in getting in touch with the fire department and such loss could mean the difference in saving property or its complete

It's a good idea to have equipment available, including tools, for fighting rural fires but those who might be expected to use it must know how to use it.

About this time every year, leaves become a real problem around a lot of homes within the county. Of course, most of us prefer our leaves on the tree but it just doesn't work that way with a lot of trees for it's part of their makeup to do some leaf shedding every fall.

Now these leaves can serve a very useful purpose if they are collected and made into compost. As material becomes available, including leaves, place it in layers in an out-of-the-way place and add a layer as more material becomes available. A mesh wire or board pen makes a good container for keeping the material from scattering. The pile should be kept moist as an aid to the decomposition pro-

Layers of manure or commercial fertilizer, placed alternately with the leaves, will make the resulting compost even more valuable. The resulting compost from such will not only supply organic matter but will also have value as plant food.

Compost can be made anytime during the year, but the decaying process is slower during the colder months. Now is a good time to start a compost pile because of the generous supply of composting materials that are available during the fall season.

Your flower and vegetable garden next year can become more beautiful and productive as a result of compost you can have ready for next spring.
