





A wet blotter or untreated filter paper is a good way to hold the lap, aluminum foil or newspaper moisture inside the container.

Be sure you interpret the results carefully. After seven days on young trees to avoid injury to at 65 degrees, high quality seed will germinate and have a straight root about 11/2 inches long. If onethird or more of the seed tested when it becomes torn. fails to meet this standard, the seed should be considered low quality and planted only if absolutely in the trees.

There is no magic formula which can be applied to the soil or trunk of the tree which kill wood borers in the trees.

In the test, low quality seed will have poor germination, with roots that are coiled or nubbed. Mold and a dead telephone. growth on seed indicates deterior-



Egg Traditions Antedate Easter

Better watch those eggshells. Early Germans were extra careful with theirs. They believed that witches, who ordinarily could not cross water, managed to do so in eggshell boats. The Dalmatians threw eggshells as far from the house as possible to create a boundary line which snakes could not

Obviously, these superstitions are seldom, if ever, recognized today. But we have continued one tradition dating back to pagan rites that indicate that eggs, the symbol of renewed life, were used to celebrate the return of spring.

This coincides with our use of eggs on Easter. Supposedly the original purpose in coloring eggs that came with the first flush of Spring was to imitate the brilliant hues of the season. In northern Europe the eggs were dyed red for Thor; yellow for Eostre, the goddess who lent her name to Easter. In the early days of the Christian Church, eggs were colored red denoting the blood of

Medieval English folk dyed eggs red, blue and violet. The Persians like the Russians, created elaborate works of art upon the egg

The legend of the Easter bunny is believed to have originated in the story that, through some supernatural power, a rabbit could lay eggs on the night before the Spring Festival, and at sunrise leave the collection of eggs at the feet of a joyous child.

At any rate, you'll find plenty of eggs of dyeing this Easter, For they're plentiful this month.

Home Demonstration Agent's Column By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

Looking for tricks of magic to perform at the next birthday party for one of the children? Or, in reality, it doesn't have to be a party; you can display your "flowre" on any occasion.

Children like mysteries and this activity will demonstrate to them that burned matches can actually 'taste'' soap and sugar!

Fill a pie pan with water and place 8 or 10 burnt matches on the surface in a spoke like arrangement—with the unburnt ends together as a center hub. Next hold a piece of soap in the water at this hub, (use a small bar or piece of soap). Soon the matches will float away from the soap toward the edges of the pan. Then, hold a sugar cube in the water at the same place you held the bar of soap. The matches will float back their original position!

Ham is a traditional Easter meat in much the same way that turkey considered the Thanksgiving

The old saying which may be pplied to many situations applies to the buying of a ham—"If you don't know your hams, know your grocer." Hams are cooked, uncooked, canned, cured and fresh and every class of ham calls for a dif-

ferent method of cooking. No meat beats ham for serving crowd and no meat is more adaptable in the many ways it can be served. Hot or cold (never chil-

led) and ham tastes good. Fresh hams have not been cured or cooked. The rule for all porkhams included—cook until well done. For a ham weighing from well. 5 to 10 pounds cook at 325 F. from 4 to 5 hours. Roast is an open shallow pan.

Cooked or ready to eat hams have been fully cooked and are sold with the bone in or boneless. The cover is planly marked "cooked" but these hams taste best when reheated in a 325 F. oven for 20 minutes per pound. A five-pound cut of ham should be reheated for an hour and 40 minutes; it never hurts at this low temperature to let it stay in the oven for at least in the kitchen, that's a count of

a couple of hours. How much do you need per person, It all depends on what you buy; a guarter of a pound per person is adequate for a boned ham, 1/2 or 3/4 of a pound per person if the bone has been left in.



17th Annual Pageant Set At Junction

Junction's 17th annual Easter Pageant will be presented next Saturday, March 25, 1967, at 10:00 p.m. on the eve before Easter Sunday, in a natural amphi-theatre on the hillside below the Everburning Cross, one mile south-east of Junc-

Presentation is by five-score Kimble County people, all laymen, women and children in colorful costumes, typical of the dress of Biblical times. Here they will reenact Jesus Christ's last Days on Earth, so timed that the Scene of the final Ascension will take place shortly after midnight on Easter

This Holy Spectacle will be presented in pantomime, supported from a broadcasting booth by readers and background music. A dozen stages have been arranged among the rugged rocks of the hill-side, and changes of scenes are effected by the shifting of spot and flood lights.

The production is entirely amateur and non-commercial. Members of the cast are all local people, with no professional or paid actors. The cast contains men and women from many walks of life: clerks, lawyers, barbers, ranch men, bank ers, teachers, mail men, housewiyes, mechanics—who take time from their business for several weeks to participate in this consecrated service.

Mrs. Jack Reeves, accomplished ranch woman, directs the Pageant for the 16th consecutive year. In 1951, a group of about 20 inspired people enacted the first Pageant from a single stage. The Pageant is sponsored by Junction Men's Bible Class, a nonsectarian organization, who erected the Everburning Cross. The Cross sits high on Lovers Leap Mountain, and its lights are seen all year long by travellers who pass thru Junction on U.S. Highway 290. During Holy Week from Palm Sunday until Easter, the lights in the Cross burn red. At other times, the lights are white.

Parking areas are provided from which the spectators may view the spectacle from the convenience of their cars. Musical program will be broadcast after 8 p.m. There is no charge for admission, for parking, nor for programs. Free coffee will be served after 4:00 p.m. throughout the evening from an oldfashioned chuck wagon, which was furnished by the late Capt. Gully Cowsert, of the Texas Rangers. Sandwiches and soft drinks will be dispensed on the grounds by local civic organizations

This year a stand-by power unit will be there for use in case of electrical failure, so the program will not be interrupted.

The production of the Easter Pageant is a tremendous undertaking for this small community. Costs of staging are entirely furnished by contributions. Those who find the Pageant worthy of encouragement and support will be given opportunity to contribute.






